

Eucharistic Revival

On June 11, the Feast of the Body & Blood of Christ (formally Corpus Christi), parishes in the United States kicked off the Eucharistic Revival. The U.S. Bishops called for a year of renewal, healing and formation in the Eucharist. Throughout the year I will devote this space to the Eucharistic Revival.

The Feast of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is one of the most widely practiced and well-known devotions in the Roman Catholic Church. It takes the physical heart of Jesus as representation of His Divine love for humanity. The Feast of the Sacred Heart has been in the Roman Catholic Liturgical calendar since 1856, and is always celebrated 19 days



after Pentecost Sunday. The feast of the Sacred Heart always falls on a Friday. The devotion especially emphasizes the unmitigated love, compassion, and long-suffering of the heart of Christ towards humanity. This year the Feast is celebrated on June 16.

The origin of the devotion to the Most Sacred Heart in the modern form, derived for a French Roman Catholic Saint, St. Marguerite Marie Alacoque, whose feast day is October 16th. She learned the devotion from Jesus during a mystical experience. Her revelations were numerous. On December 27, 1673, Margaret Mary reported that Jesus permitted her to rest her head upon His heart, and then disclosed to her the wonders of his love, telling her that he desired to make them known to all mankind and to diffuse the treasures of his goodness, and that he had chosen her for this work. In July 1674, Jesus requested to be honored under the figure of His heart, also saying when He appeared radiant with love, He asked for a devotion of expiatory love, frequent reception of Holy Communion, especially Holy Communion on the First Friday of the month, and the Observance of Holy Hours.

In the Roman Catholic tradition, devotion to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus has been closely associated with Acts of Reparation to Jesus Christ. The "Golden Arrow Prayer" on page one of this newsletter directly refers to the Sacred Heart.

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May/June Highlights

Saint of the Month: St. Rita of Cascia

Saint Rita was born Margherita Lotti in Italy in 1381. At an early age, she begged her parents to allow her to enter a convent but was instead arranged to be married. Young Rita became a wife and mother at only twelve years of age and her husband, Paolo Mancini, was a man of violent temper. He often mistreated Rita verbally and physically.

He was also known to pursue other women and he had many enemies but Rita's influence over him eventually led him to be a better man. Even though he renounced a family feud it continued to grow turbulent and one of Paolo's allies betrayed and killed him.

Following her husband's death, Rita gave his murderers a public pardon, but Paolo's brother was still angry and encouraged Rita's two sons to join the feud. Under their uncle's leadership, each boy became more and more like their father had been before Rita married him, and they wanted to avenge their father's murder. Rita prayed to God, asking Him to take her sons before they lost their souls to the mortal sin of murder. One year later, her prayers were answered when both of her sons died of dysentery.

Following the deaths of her sons, Rita attempted to enter the monastery of Saint Mary Magdalene in Cascia, but was not allowed to join due to her husband's family feud. When Rita persisted, the convent told her she could join if she could find a way to mend the wound between the families.

After seeking help from John the Baptist, Augustine of Hippo, and

Nicholas of Tolentino she attempted to end the feud. The conflict was resolved when Paolo's brother became ill during the bubonic plague and ended the family feud. Rita was allowed to enter the monastery at the age of thirty-six.

While at the monastery, Rita performed her duties faithfully and received the sacraments frequently. Rita had a great devotion to the Passion of Christ, and when she was sixtyyear-old, she asked, "Please let me suffer like you, Divine

> her. It left a deep wound, which did not heal, and it caused her to suffer until the day she died.

She died on May 22, 1457. Following her death, she was buried at the basilica of Cascia, and was later

> discovered to be incorrupt. Rita was beatified

Savior." After her request, a wound appeared on her forehead, as if a thorn from Christ's crown had pierced

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by Pope Urban VIII in 1627 and canonized by Pope Leo XII on May 24, 1900

St. Rita is the patron saint of Impossible Causes, Difficult Marriages, Infertility and Parenthood.

Monthly Minute: Nativity of St. John the Baptist

Saint John the Baptist was set apart from the womb to prepare the way of the Lord and was a significant figure connected to the Incarnation and the Redemption. For this reason the Church honors him because of his role in preparing the way for Christ. Besides the Nativity of Our Lord (Dec. 25) and the Nativity of His Mother (Sept. 8) the Nativity of John the Baptist is the only other birthday celebrated in the Church's liturgical calendar.

John spent his time in the desert living an ascetic lifestyle. He began to announce the coming of the Kingdom, and to call everyone to a fundamental reformation of life. His purpose was to prepare the way for Jesus. His baptism, he said, was for repentance. But one would come who would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire. John was not worthy even to untie his sandals. His attitude toward Jesus was: "He



must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30).

The greatness of John, his pivotal place in the history of salvation, is seen in the great emphasis Luke gives to the announcement of his birth and the event itself—both made prominently parallel to the same occurrences in the life of Jesus. John attracted countless people to the banks of the Jordan, and it occurred to some people that he might be the Messiah. But he constantly deferred to Jesus, even to sending away some of his followers to become the first disciples of Jesus.

Perhaps John's idea of the coming of the Kingdom of God was not being perfectly fulfilled in the public ministry of Jesus. For whatever reason, when he was in prison he sent his disciples to ask Jesus if he was the Messiah. Jesus' answer showed that the Messiah was to be a figure like that of the Suffering Servant in Isaiah. John himself would share in the pattern of messianic suffering, losing his life to the revenge of Herodias.
