

# **Eucharistic Revival**

#### **Eucharistic Adoration**

The doctrine of transubstantiation, the teaching that bread and wine are converted into the actual flesh and blood of Jesus Christ, is difficult. When Christ first told his followers of it, many rejected him. But Jesus did not clarify his statement or correct their misunderstanding. He simply repeated his command to the disciples at the Last Supper. Some Christians today still have trouble accepting this teaching.

Throughout history, though, many people have reported miracles that brought them back to the truth. The Church has recognized over one hundred eucharistic miracles, many of which occurred during times of weakened faith in transubstantiation.

#### The Miracle of Mass

The Real Presence Association is currently translating reports of 120 Vatican-approved miracles from Italian into English. The stories of these miracles will be available at www.therealpresence.org.



Faith, of course, should not be

based on miracles alone. Several of the recorded miracles are very old, and it may be possible to dismiss them. There is no doubt, though, that reports of these miracles have strengthened the faith of many in the instructions given by Christ and provided avenues for contemplation of the miracle that takes place at each Mass. The translation of these reports will permit more people to learn of eucharistic miracles and, like others before them, have their faith in Jesus' teachings strengthened.

Over the next several months we will be highlighting some of these Eucharistic Miracles so that we too may have our faith in Jesus strengthened.


#### Saint of the Month: St. Jerome

Saint Jerome, originally named Eusebius Sophronius Hieronymus was born around 342 AD, in Stridon, Dalmatia, in modern day Croatia or Slovenia.

Little is known of his childhood other than his parents were probably well-to-do and Christian. Despite their efforts to raise Jerome properly, the young man behaved as he chose. Around the age of 12 or so, Jerome traveled to Rome to

study grammar, philosophy, rhetoric, Latin and Greek. It is likely that due to his training in rhetoric, he may have considered a career in law. By his own admission, he quickly forgot his morals. While he was not studying, Jerome pursued pleasure.

In or around the year 366, Jerome decided to become a Christian, due to the influence of his Christian friend Bonosus, and was baptized. Now interested in theological



matters, Jerome set aside secular interests to pursue matters of the faith. He traveled with Bonosus to Trier where he attended schools for priestly training.

In 370, he entered a monastery that was run by Bishop St. Valeria, who attracted to the monastery some of the greatest minds in Christendom. While there, Jerome met Rufinus and the two became friends. Rufinis was a monk who became renown for his translations of Greek works into Latin. Jerome himself was developing his skills as a translator.

In 374, while in the city of Antioch, Jerome began writing his first work, "Concerning the Seven Beatings" while living as a hermit in the desert southwest of Antioch. After he emerged from his hermitage, Jerome was quickly entangled in conflicts within the Church at Antioch, something he didn't want. Jerome preferred being a monk or a hermit but Church officials in Antioch wanted him to be ordained. Jerome relented and he was subsequently ordained.

Making the most of his freedom as a priest, Jerome traveled to Constantinople where he studied under St. Gregory of Nazianzus until 382. He then traveled to Rome for a council of the Church. Following the council, Pope Damsus kept Jerome in Rome and made him his secretary. Jerome was a hard worker and he wrote extensively defending the virginity of Mary. Jerome was famous for his translation of the Bible. He spent his entire life translating the scriptures from Hebrew and Old Latin.

Jerome died on September 30, 420. He was laid to rest under the Church of the Nativity and his remains were later transferred to Rome.

Saint Jerome is the patron saint of archaeologists, Biblical scholars, librarians, students and translators. His feast day is September 30.

#### Monthly Minute: Holy Name of Blessed Virgin Mary

On September 12, 1683, the Battle of Vienna was fought. The Christian forces of the Holy Roman Empire and the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth, were victorious against the significantly larger Ottoman Empire's forces. The victory was attributed to her intercession, and in gratitude, Pope Innocent XI instituted the feast of the Holy Name of the Blessed Virgin Mary into the universal calendar of the Church the following year, 1684.

Of course, reverence for the Holy Name of the Blessed Virgin Mary did not begin in 1684. Prior to that, this feast was celebrated in various localities throughout the Church at various times. Reverence for the name of Mary, however, goes back much further. The Council of Ephesus in 431 taught that the Blessed Virgin Mary was properly called the "Mother of God," or "God-Bearer" (Theotokos). By the sixth century, the angelic greeting in Luke 1:28 was commonly used as a prayer, "Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you!" By the fourteenth century, the second part of the Hail Mary prayer was often used in conjunction, "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death." In the sixteenth century, the Council of Trent formally recommended this entire prayer, as we have it today, to the faithful.

It's also providential to note that the date of September 12 falls shortly after we celebrate the Feast of the Birth of the



Blessed Virgin Mary on September 8. When the Romans ruled Palestine, it was customary that newborn daughters were given their names at birth, or shortly afterwards. Thus, the Church celebrates Mary's naming day four days after the celebration of her birth. Mary and Jesus are the only two Who have liturgical celebrations honoring their names.

A name uniquely identifies and dignifies the person. For this reason, in praying to our Lord it is common practice to call on His name, "Jesus!" So also with Mary. Calling on her by name is a way of seeking her prayers in a personal and intimate way. Hence, the names of Jesus and Mary should be seen and understood as being powerful, compelling us to call upon them personally, with trust in Who they are.

As we honor the Holy Name of the Blessed Virgin Mary, reflect upon the depth of trust you have in her motherly intercession. Turn to her today, entrust yourself to her intercession, and have confidence that her prayers will win for you an abundance of grace and mercy from her Son.
