HEALTH MINISTRY

Notes from your Parish Nurse: Peaceful Transitions

Are you one of the 70%? Statistics show that about 70% of people do not have an advance care plan. Planning in advance for decisions in the moment is helpful for those you love and those that provide your care. Whether a person is well or facing a terminal illness, end-of-life planning helps ensure that wishes are honored and needs are met. While it may be a difficult subject to consider and discuss, it is important for a person to have their affairs in order to help facilitate a smooth and peaceful time during and after their passing. After I attended "Consider the Conversations" in September, a training offered by the Community Health Ministry, the local Parish Nurse group, I developed a better understanding of the importance of working through end of life issues and was inspired to create a program for St. Peter's.

Peaceful Transitions will be a program for parishioners and friends of St. Peter's. Everyone is at a different place in planning these sensitive matters but what we all have in common is that we will all experience death or what we believe through our faith is a transition of our life. These steps typically include discussions with loved ones and healthcare professionals, along with completing a variety of documents. Thinking about the end-of-life of care may not be easy, but making these decisions ahead of time can offer peace of mind to both the person and those responsible for carrying out their wishes.

Community members that support end of life planning such of Nitardy and Dunlap Funeral Homes, Rainbow Hospice, Fort Healthcare and others will be part of this program. It will start after Easter with offerings through the Fall of 2024. There will be three Workshops (2-3 sessions each) updating or completing your Advance Directives, creating your own funeral service, and writing your obituary. You can attend one or all of the sessions which will be led by experts and myself which will help guide you through these processes. The Sunday presentations will follow the 10am Service and will cover the topics of Hospice and Palliative Care, Grief Resources, and Estate Planning/Financial Resources. Stay tuned for more information as the plans continue to develop. Please let me know if you have questions or ideas.

BIBLE STUDY NOTES

August 6

Deuteronomy 8:1-10 Moses is still reminding the new generation of God's promises about this new land and that in return they should follow God's commandments. Vs 3 Man does not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord.... Jesus refers to this in Mat 4:3-4 when He says it is written.

Distance from Mr. Sinai to Canaan is 11 days yet they were in the wilderness for 40 years. God is constantly testing us so we can know who we are. The Old Testament talks about fire a lot. Fire can be refining. There are lots of trials and tests in our lives and how we get through them depends on the choices we make. We are all changing in our faith journeys, growing. He humbles us, like when He fed the Israelites manna, to remind us that we are totally dependent upon God. We all need to be dependent upon God to live in our promised land. We are called not to forget about God in our prosperity. God disciplines us not out of anger but love to correct us. We are told to eat our fill in the land God has given us. We eat our fill of God's generosity in the Eucharist.

Vs 11-20, Again, don't forget God in your prosperity! God gives us strength to gain wealth. If you forget and worship other gods, you shall perish. That's a corporate you, the nation will perish. This is a foretaste of the Babylonian exile. But remember, if you call upon the Lord, He will answer you. Do we wait till we are at the end of our ropes before we call upon God? 40 years? There is a song by Jelly Roll, Need a Favor...I only talk to God when I need a favor, I only pray when I ain't got a prayer, so who am I to expect a Savior, but God I need a favor.... God is faithful even when we aren't.

Deuteronomy 9:1-7, Starts out with Hear O Israel! The Shema, more than just listen, but also do! God did not give Israelites land because of their good behavior, but because of wickedness of nations that He drove them out. Hard not to compare our not so bad behavior to their wickedness. God will be a consuming fire to drive them out quickly! Compare to Deut. 7:22 when it says God will drive them out little by little.

Vs 8-21, A reminder about the stone tablets and the golden calf incident. Moses alone interceded and God relented.

Vs 22-29, Reminding of when the Lord told them to go into the land and they refused. They were defiant. Moses interceded and God relented...again.

August 13 2023

Deuteronomy is basically Moses' message to the new generation, a recap of laws and a reminder to worship God alone. Some highlights:

Deut. 10:12, What does the Lord require of you? Fear God. Walk in all God's ways. Serve God with all your heart, soul, and strength. Keep God's commandments. Also found in Micah 6:8, Joshua 24:14.

This is what God is demanding of Israel, NOT all nations.

Chapter 11 - Love therefore the Lord your God!

Deut. 11:26, Blessings if obey and curses if disobey. Remember the Bible was written looking back and they figured idolatry had brought on most of their disasters. This is especially clear with the exile.

When the north, Israel, was exiled, the south, Judah, felt it was because they disobeyed the call for One God, One Temple since they were worshiping at their own temples in the north.

Deut. 32 is a long poem spoken by Moses.

Deut. 33 Moses blesses the tribes of Israel.

Deut. 34 God shows Moses the promised land and then Moses dies. No one knows where his burial place is.

To sum it all up we watched the Deuteronomy video from the Bible Project.

August 20, 2023

The book of Joshua! Joshua took over leadership after Moses died. They are just now moving into the promised land. Joshua comes from the same root word as Jesus which means savior. Caleb is only other one alive from the old generation because he had faith.

Joshua 1 God tells Joshua to proceed and He will be with him as He was with Moses. Be strong! God will be with you wherever you go. You will take the land not by your own strength but by God's strong arm. They did not take women or livestock into battle.


Joshua 2 Sent spies into land, especially Jerico. They spent night in house of Rahab the harlot. She had heard of God's works with Israel and believed and feared. She hid them and lied to protect them. Rahab is one of 4 women mentioned in genealogy of Jesus.

Joshua 3 Sanctify yourselves. Priests with ark of covenant which contained the ten commandments are leading people. They were told to stand in middle of river and waters stopped so all Israel could cross. Just like at the Red Sea with Moses! New generation was getting first hand look at what God could do. Selected 12 men, one from each tribe, picked up a stone to take to other side for memorial. Priests stayed in middle till all was done. Waters returned. Memorial was so they could tell children and others that the hand of the Lord is mighty!

The scriptures were written with no vowels and no punctuation! All the details we see were added by translators.

12/3/24 Keep Awake

We begin Advent at the end of time (as heard in the gospel), but the end isn't the end. It is a new beginning due to our Christian hope in a new creation. We need to have the audacity to wait for better things to come, for it will be better than we can ever imagine. Christ not only comes as the baby in the manger, but He comes and walks with us daily.

12/10/23 Peace

We have been praying for peace in the Holy Lands and Ukraine, but peace is more than the absence of war. It points to something better in place of conflict. Shalom means completeness or wholeness. The first step to healing relationships is forgiveness, but forgiveness is a path and involves time. With God however, it is instantaneous. Sometimes a place brings about feelings of peace (the ocean, mountaintop, garden, glacier, etc.). Sometimes there may be an active release of emotion (a good cry, a baby finally falls asleep, a good therapy session). John the Baptist preached the baptism of repentance and the forgiveness of sins. Repentance leads to change, change leads to wholeness, and wholeness leads to peace. Grab onto God with both hands and be immersed in peace!

12/17/23 Joy (Louise Austin)

Today's lesson from Isaiah spoke of binding up the brokenhearted. Our wounds may be physical, emotional, or spiritual. We all grieve losses (loved ones, relationships, jobs, homes, routines, etc.). We must be gentle with ourselves and not rush our goodbyes. We can be the voice in the wilderness offering hope and comfort to others. Help make the path straight by offering hope. Be God's hands, feet, and arms. Make a soft bed for our Lord, Christ through your kindness.

12/24/23 Fourth Sunday in Advent: Love

It is human nature to want to box things in. In the first reading, David wanted to put God in a house of cedar, but it was God who said he would build David a house (dynasty). We may box God in the Sunday box, the miracle box, the Christmas/Easter box, the vengeful box, the Old Testament or New Testament box, or the old man in the sky box, but we cannot contain God nor fully understand God. God emptied himself to become man (kenosis). We can only begin to understand Him through the life of Jesus. God is Love.

12/25/23 Christmas



BOOK REVIEW

Encountering Mystery: Religious Experience in a Secular Age By Dale C. Allison Jr.

Some say the mysterious experiences described in the Bible are not for this age. Others disagree. And those who have had 'near death experiences', visitations from angels, or other unexplainable events are often disregarded, chastised or even accused of being

insane. Allison writes, "Numinous experiences may not be common, but they are not, even in our so-called secular world, uncommon."

In 1969 Sir Alister Hardy started the Religious Experience Research Center at Oxford. He discovered that large numbers of UK citizens "experience mystical raptures, see apparitions, feel the presence of the dead, perceive the unity of all things, and hear guiding voices. Many also report being overwhelmed by a loving, transcendent reality while others recount being utterly terrified by a stifling, malevolent something."

Charles Tart founded The Archives of Scientists' Transcendent Experiences which is "an online safe place for scientists to post, anonymously, and without fear of personal ridicule or professional reprisal, their mystical, religious, and paranormal experiences.

Allison digs deep into these data sources as well as many others and gives us a scholarly study of both sides of the subject. He writes, "How is it that so many mainline Protestants can pay attention to the visions, voices, dreams, and mystical experiences of the olden times yet be apathetic about the visions, voices, dreams, and mystical experiences that come to people today? Does it make sense to esteem the former while deeming the latter to be, for every practical and theological purpose, bogus? ... Confusion and disagreement attend everything in life that matters. Scripture is not the exception to the rule."

St. Peter's Vestry Minutes December 19, 2023

Present: Mother Mindy, Terrie Knox, Bev Wille, Scott Fernhaber, Bill Cannon,

Virginia Laurent, Laurie McHenry Absent: Matt Bills, Breck McHenry The meeting began with prayer.



Minutes: Virginia Laurent made a motion to accept the November Vestry Minutes as written. Bill Canon seconded. Motion passed.

Financial Reports: November Balance Sheet shows we have more money than last year at this time. Premier Bank trust is up substantially. Budget Sheet: Secretary position is up. If paying through a temp service it would be more than hiring outright. Budget will go down about 5000 and add Social Security if hire ourselves. Member contributions have declined; \$192,000 in 2021, \$178,000 in 2022, and so far \$160,000 in 2023. 2024 budgeted for \$170,000. Outreach funds are down, Cookie Cupboard brought in \$1800. Discretionary fund gets \$1200 from Outreach plus any specified donations. Concern was stated about the need to add another fund raiser. Expenses: Secretary depends on how fulfilled, through temp service or hired by us. \$10,000 was put toward rectory maintenance and \$20,000 to church which includes \$1500 for the new furnace. Any shortfall should be taken from the Auxillary Fund so we can leave the Endowment alone. Bill Canon made a motion to approve the budget as presented. Scott Fernhaber seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Annual Meeting: The annual meeting was set for Sunday January 28, 2024. All reports should be in by January 15.

Housing Resolution:

HOUSING RESOLUTION 2024

The following resolution was duly adopted by the vestry of St. Peter's at a regularly scheduled meeting held on December 19, 2024, a quorum being present: Whereas, Section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code permits a minister of the gospel to exclude from gross income the rental value of a rectory furnished to her as part of her compensation, and a church-designated housing allowance paid to her as part of her compensation to the extent used for actual expenses incurred in maintaining the rectory; and

Whereas, the Reverend Melinda R. Valentine Davis is compensated by St. Peter's exclusively for services as a minister of the gospel; and

Whereas, St. Peter's provides the Reverend Melinda R. Valentine Davis with rent-free use of a c hurch-owned rectory as compensation for services that she renders to the her ministry; and Whereas, the Reverend Melinda R. Valentine Davis incurs expenses for living in church provided housing; therefore it is hereby Resolved, that the annual compensation paid to the Reverend Melinda R. Valentine Davis for calendar year 2024 shall be \$52,710, of which \$300.00 is hereby

designated to be a housing allowance pursuant to Section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code, and it is further Resolved, that the designation of \$300.00 as a housing allowance shall apply to calendar year 2024 and all future years unless otherwise provided by the vestry.

Bill Cannon made the motion to approve the Housing Resolution as presented. Laurent seconded. Motion passed.

Newala School Project: The Diocese asked for donations to help cover their pledge. Cannon

seconded. Discussion again noted the decreased fund and the need to build it up. It was suggested a wish list for donating opportunities be published in bulletins and/or newsletters. Bev Wille made the motion to give \$200 from the Outreach Fund. Motion passed.

Senior Warden Update: The new keys are in. They will be installed sometime in January. Parish members who need a key will have to stop in to pick it up and give a deposit of \$20.

Jr. Warden Update: Now that the budget was approved, the furnace will be ordered.

Parish Nurse Update: Liz Collins was not present. She had great success with the CPR training. She continues the blood pressure screening and meeting with the advisory committee. She is now interning with the Tiny Habits class.

Rector Update: The temp agency has a couple of people that they suggested with resumes that are not that strong. There is also an outside application with a strong resume that will be interviewed. The Agape Ministry had 4 orders, 3 of which were fulfilled. The fourth missed the pick up time but will be given if he shows up or it will be put back with stock. Sunday School is going great. The kids are doing an angel a week during Advent. Mother Mindy did not have an assistant last Sunday. There should always be a second adult present. More help is needed.

Next meeting is scheduled for January 16, 2024

Bill Cannon made the motion to adjourn. Mark Bardenwerper seconded. Motion passed.

NEW KEY DISTRIBUTION PROCESS

St. Peter's has always had a warm welcome for those who need a place to worship, a place to pray, a place to meet, and a place to work. As a result, there have been many keys given out to many people, some of which have never been returned. After many, many years, we have lost track of the number of keys that are out and who has them.

After a detailed discussion of the situation, the vestry, in 2022, noted that it has been decades since the church has had new keys for the doors and there is no record of how many keys have been made or who has them. Thus, the vestry has determined that the outside doors of the church will get new locks and keys.

A new Building Use Policy will be put into place with the new keys. In an attempt to keep track of who has keys and to inspire some accountability with their use and return, there will be a deposit required of \$20.00 for members and \$50.00 for non-members when the new keys are issued. Your name and contact information will be necessary as well as a second contact person in case we are not able to reach you.

We now have a plan in place to do this in the first week in January. If you currently have a key, please plan to bring your key to the church that week during office hours. You will fill out an information sheet, leave a deposit, and take a new key home with you.
