surprise and joy that awaits them in the resurrection. This study traces events around these characters, along with Paul and the disciples at Emmaus, and how the resurrection transforms their lives.




BOOK REVIEW

Spiritual Direction: Wisdom for the Long Walk of Faith

By Henri Nouwen with Michael J. Christensen and Rebecca J. Laird

Whether our need for spiritual direction is long term or occasional, it is an important one. We cannot get around the truth of the fact that we all need help at times. We need others to help us discern when we are on a path of self-delusion. We need others to encourage us when our call seems unclear or absurd. The people God brings into our lives are often for the purpose of our spiritual growth.

A spiritual director is not a counselor, a therapist, or an analyst. A spiritual director is a "mature fellow Christian to whom we choose to be accountable for living our spiritual life and from whom we can expect prayerful support in our constant struggle to discern God's activity."



Many people have turned to Henri Nouwen for spiritual direction. Though Nouwen has written many books, this is one area he did not cover in his published works. Christensen and Laird worked together to include notes from a class Nouwen taught on spiritual direction and excerpts from unpublished pieces of Nouwen's which form this book. They arranged the book according to the three disciplines that Nouwen taught: the discipline of the heart, the discipline of the book and the discipline of the community.

Though Nouwen is no longer with us, this book gives us the opportunity to benefit from his wisdom and grace. Each chapter ends with Going Deeper Exercises that can help us sort through the most complicated questions of that trouble our hearts. If we want to dig deeper there are four pages of Further Reading that will help us. If you take your faith seriously, this is a great book for you.

BIBLE BOOK SUMMARY: GENESIS

Verses 1-11 in the book of Genesis is the story of God and the whole world. People are the reflection of God's character. We can harness creation's potential to create more beauty and order. The serpent lied when he told Adam and Eve to eat the apple so they could become like God. The irony is that they were already like God. This first part ends with the Tower of Babel and the scattering of the people.

The hinge to the second part is the genealogy from Adam to Abram. God calls Abram to leave and promises to bless him, changing his name to Abraham. Verses 12-50 tells the story of God working through Abraham and his family. It was God's plan to rescue and bless His rebellious world through Abraham's family. Abraham begot Isaac who begot Jacob (whose name was changed to Israel) who had twelve sons, the twelve tribes of Israel. The book ends with the story of Joseph. The brothers sold him into slavery but God put him in charge of Egypt where he saved the family during a famine. So though bad decisions and sin continued even through God's chosen people, God met them all with His never-ending love and faithfulness and turned things back to good. After several church services there will also be presentations on hospice and palliative care, grief support, and estate planning/financial resources.

1/28/24 Fourth Sunday After the Epiphany

2/11/24 Last Sunday of Epiphany/Canon Scott Leannah

An epiphany is a moment of insight, clarity, or understanding. The Transfiguration was the ultimate moment when Jesus was filled with glowing light, and glory! It was revealed to Peter, James, and John that Jesus was the Son of God. However, they needed to go back down the mountain to continue the work of God. In the face of what surrounds us in the world that is dark, we need more than ever to radiate God's presence. Once we see this light, we cannot not see it. It's everywhere!

2/18/24 The First Sunday in Lent

RECYCLING AT ST. PETER'S

We recently started a new trash and recycling program at Saint Peter's. You will now find red trash cans with black bags inside and yellow cans with white or clear ones. The red cans are for garbage and non-recyclables such as Styrofoam. The yellow ones are for co-mingled recyclables.

One of each type is in the general area of the kitchen. Another pair is in the furnace room north of the kitchen. They are on the north wall. The red one has a cover. To the right of them is a rectangular bin for small cardboard and paper and behind them is space for flattened boxes. All of the small red recycling bins are where they always were.

From now on, the small bins scattered around the building can be emptied into the larger ones for easier transport out of the building. We hope the new cans will encourage better and more complete recycling while adding some convenience for those who care for it.

February 20, 2024 Vestry Minutes

Present: Mother Mindy, Terrie Knox, Virginia Laurent, Bob Krumm, Angela Hoffman, Breck McHenry, Eda Wilson, Mark Bardenwerper, Liz Collins, Laurie McHenry.



Mother Mindy recently attended a clergy retreat where it was shared that there was a positive impact on meetings when started with scriptural study. So we began with a reading of Romans 12:1-2 and discussed the importance of resetting our thinking according to God's love and direction.

Minutes of the January 2024 vestry were sent out. Mark made a motion to accept them as written. Breck 2^{nd} the motion. Motion passed.

Financial Report: Laurie reported that the diocese is now requiring that the fixed assets be listed on the balance sheet. They suggested the insurance replacement value divided by 2 would serve as the amounts. Thus Rectory, Church building, equipment and furniture are listed as fixed assets. Mark suggested we should have a pictorial inventory for the church and the rectory.

Auxiliary fund is up a bit due to market swing. Parish Nurse and Deposits are not on the budget but listed as liabilities because they are funds earmarked for specific things, ie the grant for the parish nurse and the key deposits to be refunded when keys are turned back in.

Budget vs Actual for the month shows we overspent but must keep in mind that much of our funds come in later in the year.

Access and contents of the safety deposit box was discussed.

Business: Mother Mindy welcomed the new vestry members and shared expectations. Remain calm and remain kind. She reminded us all that we may not always agree but we need to respect each other. We also need to vote our conscience even if it is in disagreement with the majority. But once a decision is made, all are expected to work together in community.

Dossal Curtain: The curtain behind the altar is over 500 years old and was donated by past members of the Jones family. It needs to be taken down and restored. An estimate was quoted at \$11,500. The present Jones family was contacted to discern their concerns.

Maintenance Plan Priorities: The continued maintenance of the church and rectory is a constant concern. There are many repairs and updates that need to be addressed, such as fixing the plaster and painting, bathroom updates, carpeting, etc. Laurie suggested gathering info to make a list of all the needs and vestry can prioritize them so we can make a plan. Laurie also reminded us that if we do not spend all that's budgeted, leftover moneys will be rolled over to next budget and not be lost. Mother Mindy asked vestry members to start looking around so we can start compiling a list.

Oral Reports:

- Sr. Warden: Nothing to report. All has been calm.
- Jr. Warden: Furnace room in the back has been put in order and recycle and garbage bins arranged.
- Nurse: The Peaceful Transitions Program will begin April 21 after church with a brunch. She is

partnering with Deacon REGS from the diocese. There is also an End of Life Coaching Course in March that she will be attending. Note the bulletin board downstairs that is designated for the Health Care Ministry. A Mental Health First Aid program is being offered at Oconomowoc in March.

Rector: The added time for Caren's training has been a challenge but she catches on quickly and is becoming much more independent. She has responded to several pastoral needs. A goal is to do more visits, especially getting communion to Kitty.

Closed with the General Thanksgiving. Breck made the motion to adjourn. Bob seconded. Motion passed. Meeting ended at 7:30 pm.
