country for a period of five years, circumnavigating North and South America. Chip was proud and honored to have contributed to operations aboard USS Enterprise, responsible for the safe navigation of the ship when underway during the Viet Nam War combat operations. Chip was present in the Gulf of Tonkin in the South China Sea in January 1973, when the cease fire went into effect and U.S. hostilities ceased.

It was during his navy time that Chip met his future wife, Connie. A NOTE FROM YOUR PARISH NURSE: TINY CAN LEAD TO BIG!

Tiny is mighty when it comes to behavior change. That's what I am learning from Stanford University's Behavioral Scientist, BJ Fogg, in the Tiny Habits Certification program I started this month. We all struggle to stay committed to our goals. How many times have you made a New Year's Resolution, for example, and not followed through. Often we criticize ourselves for not meeting our goals which can lead to a cycle of failure. However, the research shows that we change best by feeling good! We are not the problem, our approach is.

Failure to meet our goals is not a personal flaw, but a behavioral design flaw. In this course, I am learning to identify an anchor behavior and attach a new habit to it. For example, after I take my first sip of coffee in the morning, I will write my three top priorities for the day in my planner. The method of Tiny Habits gives me hope that I can change and actually achieve my goals. And most importantly, I believe I can help others achieve their goals.

In order to design successful habits and change behaviors, it's important to keep in mind three principles:

- 1. Stop negatively judging yourself and celebrate your tiny successes.
- 2. Take your goal and break it down into tiny (very tiny) behaviors.
- 3. Embrace slip-ups as insights and use them to revise your plan.

As I work through this course, I am imagining ways to teach this method at St. Peter's. It will likely be a blend of individual and small group learning opportunities. I invite you to identify one or two health goals that you would like to work on over the upcoming year. With this Starter Step in place, you will be ready when we start our Tiny Habits journey at the beginning of the new year. Stay tuned for more information in the coming months. 


BOOK REVIEW


Finley writes, "...I was able to realize that my newfound sense of repentance mingled with mercy was

VESTRY MEETING

Vestry Minutes, October 18,2023 On ZOOM



<u>Present</u>: Scott Fernhaber, Mother Mindy, Bev Wille, Liz Collins, Matt Bills, Ginny Laurent, Matt Bills, Bill Cannon.

Absent: Terrie Knox

Check Ins: People went around

- I. Mother Mindy opened with prayer.
- II. Minutes from September Meeting: Ginny moved to accept the minutes as presented. Mark Seconded, vote taken and all in approval.
- III. Financial Reports: Nothing of note with the Financial Report. Balance sheet looks good.

 Contributions are not keeping up with the budget, but usually this is rectified at the end of the year.

IV. Business:

- A. Tree Bids we have 3 bids, ranging from \$3,450. \$3,595. and higher.
 - Mark explained what the situation was with the two trees. One is on the lot line between the rectory and the neighbor's, it is badly damaged by the last big storm. Matt is leaning toward Beaver tree because they have a long reputation. He also recommended to make sure they have proper insurance. Scott, Ginny and Bill agreed. Mark made some further comments about the Genesis as well as Mother Mindy, saying that Terrie and Brian had a very good experience with them. Scott moved to accept Beaver Tree's quote. Ginny seconded. Discussion followed. Hand raised Vote taken. Ayes have it. Mark will reach out to schedule Beaver Tree.
- B. Carpet Cleaner Research has been done and The Rug Dr. is being put forward as the best candidate, with three components: (A Paper was Submitted with all the specifications). Bill motioned to go ahead and buy the proposed machine. Mark Seconded. Matt suggested we give Amazon the Tax Exempt information. Mother Mindy pointed out that this would mean that we as a church would have to have our own Amazon Account.
- Vote was taken and the Ayes have it to purchase the Rug Dr. Matt will check to see what the cost would be on his business account, including the cost of taxes and shipping. Matt checked and it would only save \$35 in taxes. Not enough to worth the bother it would be to use his business account.
- C. Refrigerator \$5000 was budgeted for the Rectory. There is remaining \$3,750 of that budgeted amount. Mark fixed the leaking refrigerator, but there's no guarantee that it will stay fixed. Bill moved to buy new refrigerator, Bev seconded. Ginny suggested getting something comparable to the current one. Bill accepted the friendly amendment. Vote was taken. All were in favor.
- D. Jefferson County Christmas Neighbors We have been generous in the past. But this year we will also be spending some of our Outreach money for Agape Ministry. Bill moved to give Christmas Neighbors \$1,000. Friendly amendment is to do what we send last year, if it is more than \$1,000. Ginny seconded. Vote was taken and all were in favor.
- E. Re-Keying the church building: Proposed rekeying the doors, and adding a crash bar on the Sacristy door. Start a Master Key System. Master would be Office Door, and Sub-Master would be the outside doors, which the Support Groups would be getting. Quote was \$864. Scott made motion to accept the bid from FA Glass and Mirror, and Bill seconded. Vote taken and all in favor. Barb will check Vestry minutes to see what the amount was that we decided to have for deposit for Keys.

- V. Reports
- A. Sr. Warden No report
- B. Jr. Warden Mark and Breck have been mounting cupboards and getting the drawers in place. He also asked about the surplus folding chairs, which we have already given Breck the go-ahead to sell those chairs.

Ginny remarked that when people are using the sink and dishwasher, there seems to be a lot of water on the floor. This should be addressed. Mother Mindy asked Ginny to find a mat at Ace hardware and charge it to the church.

We are still having issues with water coming in to the closet from foundation (near double doors into Parish Hall).

- C. Parish Nurse Liz highlighted items from her report. She started the Tiny Habits training. She's super excited about implementing this at the church. They meet every Tuesday. Two CPR classes coming up, Hands only on the 29th. Taught by someone from the Fire Dept. Then November 9th is the Heart Saver, participants will receive a certificate. BP screening is this Sunday, October 22. A man from the WI council of Churches is going to come and write an article for their Newsletter.
- D. Rector Mother Mindy will be gone October 31-November 7. All Saints on Wednesday by Louise, but there will be no Communion. Louise will also be doing Sunday November 5. Also, if people want Communion on All Saints (November 1st), they would be able to go to Sussex.

Louise will be ordained on January 6 at the Cathedral in Milwaukee. Mother Mindy would love to see as many people from St. Peter's there. There will be a bus that will go from Janesville, at a charge of \$25 per person. You would need to get yourself to Janesville.

Agape – off to a slow start, but Mother Mindy really wants to get it going after she gets back from her trip in November. Most likely things will pick up with our month at the Food Pantry in Dec. Sunday School – two girls attended. It went great! Anne Grover helped. Needed is a second adult for the 29th.

Mother Mindy closed in prayer. Bill moved to adjourn, Matt Seconded. All in favor.

Chapters 10-11 Setting out for the promised land.... And the beginning of Moses' troubles

Chapter 12 Sedition of Miriam and Aaron Chapters 13-14 The 12 spies sent to Canaan

Chapters 15 More Laws

Chapter 16 Korah' rebellion against Moses...3 rd time God offers to wipe out everyone and start over with Moses....Moses intercedes again.

Chapter 17 Building of Aaron's Rod Chapters 18-19 Duties of Priests and Levites/ Laws of purification Chapter 20 Miriam died....Moses' error at Kadesh. The waters of Meribah which means quarrel. (in Cobern's "Recent Explorations in Palestine" Cobern thinks that Moses struck the Rock above the Dry Spring in an oasis called Ain Kadees. He believes that Moses struck twice and two new springs burst forth and they are still flowing.)....Moses sin seems to be his failure to give God the credit for the miracle of the water.....Moses was banned from Promised Land.... Death of Aaron because of the water issue? Not Moses? Death of Aaron...Final start for Canaan. There seems to be a gap of 38 years between chapter 19 and 20 from first arrival at Kadesh and final departure from Kadesh to Canaan.

Chapter 21 From Kadesh to the Jordan...God told Moses not to harm Edomites, Moabites or Ammonites, even though they tried to stop Israel. Firey Serpent is historical fore-picture of Gospel. As those who were bitten by poisonous serpents looked to the bronze serpent were healed, so we, if we who have been wounded by sin, look to Jesus, we live. (John3:14)....When Amorites attacked, they fought back. When Bashan attacked, Israel defeated them and won the region east of the Jordan....How could the wilderness support 3 million people for 40 years? Only by the hand of God. Recent excavations have revealed the ruins of hundreds of fortified cities that once covered the hills of Moab, Ammon and Gilead, indicating dense population and powerful peoples in time of Moses.

Chapter 22-25 Balaam and his talking donkey.

Chapter 26 2 nd Census...of 600,000 above 20 at first census, only 2 beyond 60 survived, Caleb and Joshua. The book of Numbers is named from these censuses.

Chapter 27 Inheritance laws....daughters of Zeolphehad is first instance of Biblical appeal for women's rights. All 5 daughters manifest a balance between a spirit of confrontation and one of cooperation shown by their attack on injustice and their compliance with the elder's decision. Moses is shown Promised Land and told to set Joshua, son of Nun, as leader.

Chapter 28-30 Various regulations. Interestingly, in chapter 31 Moses is told that he will die after vengeance on the Midianites. But he is mentioned throughout the rest of Numbers. Moses' death is recorded in Deuteronomy 34:5-8.

Sunday, June 25, 2023

Chapter 31 God told Moses to take vengeance on the Midianites for the children of Israel. Then you shall be gathered to your people. They killed kings of Midian and Balaam but let all the women and their little ones live. Moses was angry. Evidently Balaam returned to Midianites and advised them in the matter of Baal Peor. Vs 16, "Look, these women caused the children of Israel, through the counsel of Balaam, to trespass against the Lord in the incident of Peor, and there was a plague among the congregation of the Lord." God ordered them to kill all male children and every woman who has known a man intimately. Keep the young girls." They fought to get out of Israel and they fought to get into the promised land. It is still a thing to have a priest or rabbi to go with army. Moses rescued from slaughter of innocent but now ordering another. Our response to violent scripture always has to be in faith for the God of love and relationship. We must accept the fact that we don't understand it all. What do we tell

ourselves in order to stay in relationship with God? Was it God or Moses that took it to a death sentence?

Purity laws for worship were not a big deal. Ritual cleansing was not a huge deal because everyone is unclean at some time. The Israelites needed purification after this much death. They were told to stay outside camp for 7 days whoever has killed any person and purify yourselves on 3rd day and 7th. Also told to cleanse all loot by fire or if can't pass through fire by water. Division of plunder, half to those who fought and half to rest of congregation. From first half, take one of every 500 and give to Eleazar, from congregation's half take one of every 50 and give to Levites. If people stopped giving to the church, we would have no priest or place to meet. Note that the captives were included in the booty. The specific numbers were probably rounded off, not likely to be even. Note that not one of the Israelites were missing! So they brought an offering for the Lord! When we receive a big blessing in our lives do we think of giving a memorial for it?

Chapter 32—The Tribes settling east of the Jordan

Rueben and Gad were Joseph's brothers, Jacob/Israel's children. They were 2 of the 12 tribes of Israel. Rueben and Gad wanted land on this side of the Jordan. Were told not to discourage others like fathers did when spies came back from their trek into the promised land. Do not repeat history!

Sunday, July 9 2023

Chapter 33 Review of the journey from Egypt

Chapter 34 Appointed boundaries of Canaan

Mother Mindy reviewed a bit about Chapter 35, Cities for Levites and cities of refuge which are cities for people who accidentally killed someone. Remember intentional is murder. Unintentional is manslaughter. People who had unintentionally killed someone could go to these cities of refuge and be safe. They had to stay within the city until the high priest died, then could leave. How do these laws compare with the noted eye for an eye? There is mercy but there are also consequences in both the Old and New Testaments.

Chapter 36 Marriage of female heirs. They assigned land by lots to the tribes but if a daughter inherited and married outside her tribe, the land would be taken out of the tribe. So they made a law that if a woman inherited she had to marry within her tribe. The daughters of Zelophehad agreed and did so.

Deuteronomy... means Second Law. Moses probably did not write it since he died during it. It starts out with a let's go! Then a summary of where they have been. I include the cross references where we read it earlier.

Vs 9-18 Moses sets leaders among people. Ex. 18:13-27

Vs 19-33 The 12 spies and Israel's refusal to enter the land. Numbers 13:1-33 Anakim-Num 13:22, 33 Like Nephilim (as I checked spelling if found that it comes from the Heb. Word napal to fall, thus probably the fallen ones), size and strength legendary. Israelites had no faith even after all they witnessed.

Vs 34-46 Consequences for rebellion. God promises no one of unbelieving generation will enter the promised land except Caleb and Joshua. Num. 14:20-45 And they lost the battle that they refused to go to but when told they sinned went even after God said too late.

Chapter 2 Desert years. Traveled through land of kindred- Easu who was given Mt. Seir. God was working through him too. Were told to purchase food from them but don't mess with them.

Vs 8-15 Israel obeyed and passed by. Then came to Moab. God said will not give you this land because already gave it to Ar, descendants of Lot (were looked down at as descendants of incest)

16- Crossed to Ammonites, don't touch because it too is given to Lot. Then God will put dread and fear of Israelites into Amorites. Yes, take the land.
