


## BISHOP LEE'S VISITATION: RECEIVED AND REDEDICATED

#### FROM RECENT SERMONS

#### July 31

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities. All is vanity.

Ecclesiastes 1:2

The author of Ecclesiastes probably felt the way we often do, especially now, when so much seems wrong in the world. All is pointless, meaningless. We may wonder, Was it worth it all? Were my prayers heard? Were my actions useless? Where is God in all this?

But everything matters! Our actions affect those around us. We may make a difference, even if it is the life of one other person. Our actions affect our soul. Jesus's words, *Peace I leave you*; *my peace I give to you*. "Let not your heart be troubled," may not be so much a feeling but rather a choice we need to make over and over. So, whatever is good for your soul, do that!

#### August 7

Keep the Faith

Have assurance of things unseen. Do not lose heart when you wrestle with faith but be obedient to God. Love your neighbor without passing judgment, offer kindness, reflect on your own sins, consult scripture, tradition, reason, experience and share your faith stories with others. Remember, Jesus never leaves you.

#### August 14

I have come to bring fire upon the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled. Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. Luke 12:49

When reading scripture, it is important to remember it is not always about us. These words were most likely about prophecy fulfilled. John the Baptist spoke of another who would baptize with spirit and fire. At Pentecost, the flames rested above the people and they were given powers to prophecy. The church has propagated through divisions. Yes, we are different, but we are the same in our love for God. We pray that we can be one by following Jesus's example of radical acceptance of all. Allow the Holy Spirit to burn inside you and share your faith by being a follower of the Way of Jesus through loving kindness.

#### August 21


person's hotdish. Other topics covered were far reaching and just as fun.

#### PARISH HALL WALL HANGINGS



I was reading the Jefferson County Union one day when I saw an article about the Lorine Niedecker mural downtown being painted by Jeremy Pinc. The article identified him as an MFA student at UW and a former Oak Park, Illinois resident. Joleen and I used to live in Oak Park (for 30 years) and I was pleased to learn that Jeremy was a graduate of Oak Park River Forest high school from which our daughter, Sarah, graduated in 2015. I went downtown and interrupted his painting to meet him and let him know about our shared connections. That day I asked him if he

would consider a commission for our church since the echo in the undercroft was causing some people distress. To my joy Jeremy accepted. Now we have a nationally famous artist's work in our church. - Bill Cannon -

## Here is something the Artist wrote to explain his process in the creating of these tapestries:

I am the artist who did the artwork Bill commissioned, and I would love to tell you a little more about it. At the time that I received the commission I was studying early Renaissance art and philosophy. Of particular interest to me was the sculptor Aostino di Duccio and the paintings I made are based on bas-relief sculptures he made in the 1400s. This was a time period of vastly shifting world views. The Middle Ages were coming to a close and there was a rebirth of interest in the arts (among other things). Although Duccio lay more on the medieval side of this divide I have always found his artwork to be timeless, and to transcend the shifting ideologies that were prevalent during his life. My paintings were intended to be a hymn to life and a positive affirmation of the beauty we can all find if we cultivate our better selves. These are the qualities I find in Duccio as well and I think that attitude is applicable in any time period.

I hope this resonates with you and if you have any additional questions feel free to ask! -Jeremy Guzzo PincIn her poem, "Shallow Waters Are Not Safe," Angela Hoffman reflects on what it means to delve into one's soul. This poem was first published in Agape Review.

#### **NEW KEY DISTRIBUTION PROCESS**

St. Peter's has always had a warm welcome for those who need a place to worship, a place to pray, a place to meet, and a place to work. As a result, there have been many keys given out to many people, some of which have never been returned. After many, many years, we have lost track of the number of keys that are out and who has them.

After a detailed discussion of the situation, the vestry noted that it has been decades since the church has had new keys for the doors and there is no record of how many keys have been made or who has them. Thus, the vestry has determined that the outside doors of the church will get new locks and keys.

A new Building Use Policy will be put into place with the new keys. In an attempt to keep track of who has keys and to inspire some accountability with their use and return, there will be a deposit required of \$20.00 for members and \$50.00 for non-members when the new keys are issued. Your name and contact information will be necessary as well as a second contact person in case we are not able to reach you.

You will be kept informed as to when this will take place. If you will be needing a new key, please inform Barb in the office so an estimate of numbers can be determined.

Here is a quote about the evening from out Diocesan Website:


"Get ready to feel inspired to keep loving the world and renew the right spirit in our hearts.


writings into a rich collection of essays that ask candid questions about the stories we've been told—and the stories we tell—about our faith, our selves, and our world.



Vestry Meeting August 17, 2022 (Zoom)

Present: Mother Mindy, Breck McHenry, Laurie McHenry, Scott Fernhaber, Terrie Knox, Bill Cannon, Ginny Laurent, Matt Bills

Mother Mindy opened with a reading from the Gospel according to Luke, starting in Chapter 10. Thoughts and impressions were offered by all.

- I. Check-ins We went around the group and shared how we are doing.
- II. Prayer Mother Mindy opened in prayer
- III. **Minutes** Bill moved to accept July Minutes as presented, Ginny seconded. No discussions. Vote to accept minutes. All were in favor.

#### V. Business -

A. Building Use Policy - Mother Mindy said she has had some conversations with others about our current Building use policy. She doesn't feel the current one reflects our values. For instance, we don't charge for the use of the Church for funerals. She and Scott are going to work on re-vamping the policy. Matt suggested a two-tier policy: Members vs. Non-members.

**B. Re-Keying-** A key was given out and it got lost. Mother Mindy recommend re-keying the outside doors of the church. Mother Mindy recommended a deposit for anyone who gets a Key. Then we have a list with contact information, and also a contact person for the key holder. There is a significant cost is to re-key the doors.

#### Two items on the table:

- 1) Should we RE-Key the outside doors? Matt moved we re-key, Scott seconded. Matt suggested not all 4 doors be the same. Terrie asked about cost. We don't know. Breck can re-key Schlage locks. Scott said we should get new locks, not just re-key. For the motion on the floor. Two are in favor of re-keying, Four for not rekeying. Motion does not pass. Scott made motion to get new locks for the three doors. Bill seconded. Discussion followed; Vote was taken for getting new locks. Motion passed.
- 2) Should we require a deposit for anyone who has a key? What should deposit for the keys be? Many suggestions were made. \$10 and \$20, \$15/\$25. Scott suggested members we could charge just \$5, but \$50 or for those outside the church. Others said \$10, but \$20 might be more worthwhile for someone to return. Terrie made a motion to vote. Members would have to make deposit of \$20, for those outside the church it would be \$50. For non-members we would hold their check for a certain number of days to be

determined by the rector. Ginny Seconded. Terrie offered to write an article for newsletter about re-keying the church and the reasoning behind the required deposit.

Matt Bills left the meeting due to another obligation.

**C. Sound System** – There are differing thought processes regarding this. Breck presented his thoughts about the sound issues: Streaming video system is both audio and visual. We had a grant from the Diocese and we purchased equipment that was recommended by the Diocese at the time. This has evolved. Now we have buzz and a hiss.

Breck explained problems with amplifier; his proposed solution that would be less expensive but is likely to not play well with the T.V. ears that Bev's mom uses. We may be able to find a solution for this.

Mother Mindy showed the breakdown of cost for sound system.

Scott explained the sound system he's proposing. It is a long-term solution (for the next 10 years). Base price is \$9,000. Adding a sub-woofer would bring it to \$12,000. Mother Mindy summarized the pros and cons of each. Discussion followed. Bill said he's with Scott, Terrie would prefer not spending \$1700, then find that it doesn't solve the problem. Breck clarified that the amplifier that he's proposing is the same one that Scott's company recommended, so if we needed to move on to have their whole plan in place, we would already have one component of it. Ginny would prefer starting with the smaller fix, then moving on to the larger solution if necessary. Mother Mindy mentioned that the larger quote includes a "limiter" which, right now, the function of adjusting the sound to the person speaking/singing, is in the hands of the person running AV.

Scott pointed out that his solution will be a long-term solution, which we need to bring us into the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

Mother Mindy asked each person what they think:

Terrie - understands the problem and the wisdom of both solutions. She is torn.

Ginny - also torn between the two options.

Bill-would like to go with the Peak Systems option

A Suggestion was made to buy their (Peak Systems) amplifier and try it, and if needed, move on to the more expensive solution. Scott will call Peak systems and connect Breck with Jason, the tech from Peak Systems so he can also discuss camera questions and issues. A proposal was made to approach Peak systems to suggest we buy their recommended amplifier, and try Breck's solution. Then if we need to do more, we budget for it for next year.

Scott made motion to table the current proposal. Ginny Seconded. Motion passed. This will be discussed at the next Vestry Meeting.

Due to the time, Mother Mindy recommended someone make motion to adjourn. Bill moved Terrie seconded to adjourn. Mother Mindy prayed to close. She thanked everyone for being kind in these discussions.
