7/27/25 The Seventh Sunday After Pentecost

In the Gospel of Luke (11:1-13) one of the disciples asks Jesus to teach them how to pray. Jesus gives them the Lord's prayer. We often say this prayer without considering the meaning. 8/3/25 The Eighth Sunday After Pentecost

LAY LEADER VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

LECTORS

Lectors read holy scripture during service. Currently the lector will read the two lessons and lead the psalms. It is expected that lectors will practice the lessons ahead of time to read smoothly and to familiarize themselves with the pronunciation of interesting biblical names and places. If you have never been a lector, but can read clearly and have a willingness to practice you can be a lector.

ACOLYTE

The Acolyte serves the priest on the altar. Acolytes will carry the cross or torches, will receive oblations and offerings, and hand the to the priest, and will help the priest set the altar for Holy Communion. One must be able to carry a cross and follow directions to be an acolyte. An acolyte can be any age.

ST. PETER'S PEACE GARDEN

We celebrated 10 years the Peace Garden on Sunday, August 17, 2025, with a Parish Picnic. From the Lily wall to the St. Francis alcove & the Perennial gardens, all plants have donated by Parishioners. Vestry Minutes—August 19, 2025

Present: : Mother Mindy, Scott Fernhaber, Breck McHenry, Mark Bardenwerper, Eda Wilson, Angie Hoffman, Amy Reynolds, Bob Krumm, Terrie Knox, Laurie McHenry, Liz Collins, Kathy Camara. Meeting began with prayer at 6:04 p.m.

I. Minutes: Breck made the motion to accept the July minutes as presented. Scott seconded. Motion passed.

II: Financial Report: Laurie reported that we are above last year. The line 'hold for endowment' is money that needs to be transferred to the Endowment fund. Member contributions are down again but about 4 or 5 people give only a couple times a year which causes the numbers to fluctuate. Medical insurance went down because Mother Mindy changed to an 'employee plus one' instead of family coverage.

III. Old Business:

A. **Website:** Mother Mindy emailed Bexs at the diocese to get contact information for Fr. Sam who will be working on the site. Not much progress has been made in turning over the site. Fr. Sam will build the site and then schedule training. Mother Mindy will let people know when training is scheduled. Mother Mindy hasn't heard back from Bexs about the Facebook progress.

B. **Parish Picnic:** There was a good turnout and it all went well. A thanks was given to Liz for coordinating.

C. **T-Shirts:** Orders are due by Sept. 1. Mother Mindy emailed Caren to put a reminder in the bulletin.

D. **Rectory Door:** It is up and working but there are some details that need addressing. Mark will be working with the guy to finish up when the weather gets cooler.

E. **Music Director:** Claire Allen has been hired and is doing well. Mother Mindy is meeting with her after service next Sunday to pick music for September to help her get to know the process.

F. **Columbarium:** The trip to check out existing columbariums has not yet been scheduled and will be put off till later.

G. **Creeping Jenny:** Scott reported that he will be using his method of removal in the fall.

IV. New Business:

A. **Cookbook:** Kathy reported her idea of doing a church cookbook. It will be a half-page, spiral book with recipes from the congregation. She has already made a template on her computer where she will type in the recipes that she receives. Larry offered to donate the materials. She would like to see at least 100 recipes and even have a line about the people who sent them in. She wants

recipes in by October 31 so she can have a month to get things together and have it ready to sell at the Cookie Cupboard. She will write an article for the September newsletter. All were excited, the project was approved and thanks were extended to Kathy.

B. **B. Rummage Sale/Pancake Breakfast:** Amy shared her idea that came after Mother Mindy's sermon about too much stuff which led to mention of past auctions and the fact that there is still stuff stored at Jones' warehouse. We could have a rummage sale and breakfast in conjunction with the Farmer's Market.

C. **Automatic Door Opener:** Scott reported that someone offered to pay for an automatic door opener on the side door to ease entry for those who are handicapped or carrying loads. Scott offered to take lead on the installation.

D. Evangelism/New People: Scott reported that Angie's question about the need for improvements when the church membership is decreasing hit him hard. He wants to start a committee to address the issue of church growth. Amy volunteered to serve on this committee.

E. Dream List: Mark presented his spreadsheet showing the estimates he had for projects. More estimates are needed. It was decided that the rectory roof needed to be the focus for this year. A tree has to be dealt with first. Breck made a motion to go with Reliable at a quote of \$450 to be done as soon as possible. Scott seconded. Motion passed. Mark was concerned about where the money was going to come from. Breck reminded everyone that is the job of the financial committee and their suggestion will have to come before the vestry for approval. Another estimate is needed for the roof. Mark will be gone next week but will work on it when he returns. Mark split his spreadsheet to show things for this year and next.

V. Reports:

1. Parish Nurse: There are 2 more Holy Motions programs which will be filmed. They have been bringing in non-members for participating and for help. This project has expanded into the community with interest from the hospital and fire department to have a Fall Prevention program at the Fort Atkinson Club. Liz is asking for 3 volunteers to help with that meeting on Sept 30th. She also is asking for volunteers to do a card ministry. Kitty Martin has done it in the past. Liz has an account set up with Lisa Tuttle for free cards. Liz also announced her new LLC, Longevity with Liz, as a health coach.

2. Jr. Warden: Mark mentioned the church's front door bottom latch is now working. He also mentioned that there was more flooding so Badger was contacted. Mark, Breck, and Scott will discuss the issue and Mark said an estimate is coming.

3. Rector: Mother Mindy reported that is has been a busy month with funeral and parish picnic. With the passing of Milo and Elsie, Jim is our only shut in. She saw him recently and requested continued prayers. Mother Mindy reminded people that she would like to catch up and visit with people over coffee or lunch. Contact her to set a date.

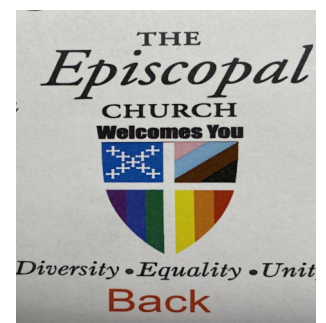

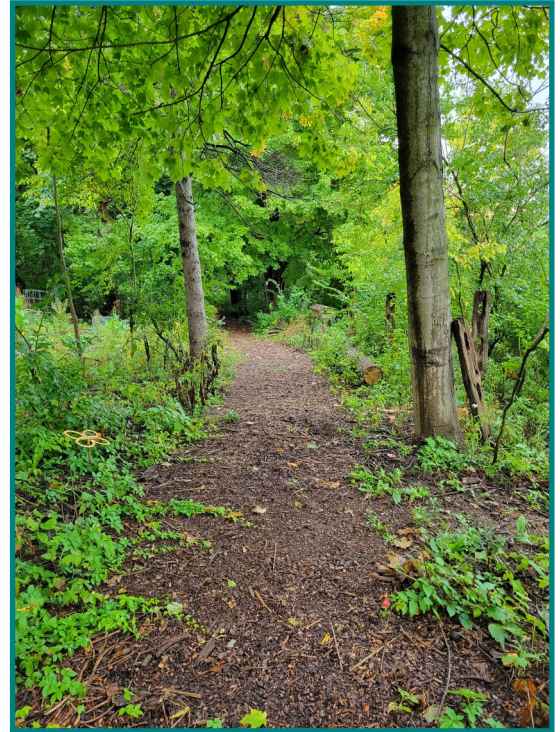
PRAYER WALK

BOOK REVIEW

The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World By Robin Wall Kimmerer

One of the first lessons high schoolers learn writes Kimmerer, “is that economics is about decision making in the face of scarcity. Anything and everything in a market is implicitly defined as scarce.” Robin Wall Kimmerer, a member of the Potawatomi Nation and a biologist, disagrees. Nature, she says, shows us a different way, a way of giving as we see through the Serviceberry.

The word for Serviceberry in Potawatomi is Bozakmin. The important part of the word is min. It appears in the words for Blueberry, Strawberry, Raspberry, apple, maize and wild rice. She writes, “That word is a revelation, because it is also the root word for ‘gift’. In naming the plants who shower us with goodness, we recognize that these are gifts from our plant relatives, manifestations of their generosity, care, and creativity.”

The theory that argues the privatization of land comes with the assumption that someone will abuse the trust, misuse the land and ruin it for everyone. Elinor Ostrom defied that long-held theory and showed “that collective action, trust, and cooperation can lead to the mutual well-being of land and people without degrading commonly held resources.” Dr. Ostrom was given the Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences for her research.

Competition has steered our understanding of evolution and natural ecosystems. But as research continues, we find that plants network above ground providing food for many insects, birds and animals in exchange for pollination and dispersal and below ground they actually share nutrients with mycorrhizal fungi and other microbial communities.

“Regenerative economies that reciprocate the gift”, writes Kimmerer, “are the only path forward.” If we pay attention, gift economies are everywhere. Friends ask us to dinner, used clothes, books, and outgrown childhood equipment is passed on. A good example of moving beyond sharing with friends to sharing with communities is the Little Free Library movement which has spread throughout the country. Public libraries are great examples of a “civic-scale practice of a gift economy and the notion of common property.”

The Serviceberry gives us a lot to think about and reminds us that it is up to us to choose how we will live in this world.
