



Growing Together in Christ!

My friends,

This is an exciting time in the history of our Church as the bishops of the United States of America call us to a **Eucharistic Revival**. These three grace-filled years are a time for us all to grow in reverence and appreciation of the real presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. At the same time, our Holy Father wrote us a beautiful letter on the Sacred Liturgy, "I Have Earnestly Desired" (*Desiderio Desideravi*). In 2024, there will be two Eucharistic Congresses: a national congress in Indianapolis and an international congress in Equador! (Who wants to go??!!)



As a parish, we have begun Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament every Friday following the 9 a.m. Mass through to 9 p.m.! At 3 p.m. we will pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. At 6 p.m. we will offer Confessions. And at 7 p.m. we will celebrate the Holy Mass. My hope is to make the Sacraments more available to busy families. We will conclude at 9 p.m. with Solemn Benediction. Please make Eucharistic Adoration a part of your regular Friday routine and invite friends and family to join you! (Please sign up for Adoration in the church narthex or at www.St.Ignatius.net.)

As part of this initiative, we are also initiating an **Association of the Blessed Sacrament** here at St. Ignatius. We will meet the last Friday of the month from 10-11:30 a.m. The first session will be held on September 30 in classrooms 2 & 3. The goal of this introductory session will be to provide an overview of the Association and the spirituality of St. Peter Julian Eymard. In October, we will begin the 12 session formation process. Hopefully you will be able to make this commitment to grow in love with the Eucharistic Lord through these monthly meetings. I'm certain it will change your life! I would also like to invite you to join me for a book study on "How to Get More out of Holy Communion" by St. Peter Julian Eymard (Sophia Institute Press, 2000). We will begin on September 22nd and read a chapter a day. I invite you to join me via our parish Facebook as I share each day on the chapter. On Sundays September 25, October 2, and 9, we will gather to discuss the book while feasting on coffee and donuts! Copies of the book are available online as well as at our own Bethany Gift Shop!

This week, **Fr. Eva is returning home** to resume his teaching duties at the Catholic Institute of West Africa. Please join me in thanking him for joining us this summer. He is an amazing priest and a true friend. On behalf of Father and his Diocese of Nsukka, I would also like to thank you for your prayerful and generous support during this year's Mission Appeal. In total, our parish donated \$10,000 to the Diocese of Nsukka. May God bless you! Please keep Father and all of Nigeria in your prayers!

I'm also proud to report that our Knights of Columbus and members of our Polish community raised over \$9,500 to help Ukrainian refugees who have sought safety in our Diocese. The dinner was absolutely delicious. What a wonderful night! Thank you very much for your prayerful and joyful support for this important work of mercy!

Each week we will present a sentence or two of St. Ignatius of Antioch's letters. This week, we continue to reflect on the first paragraph to the Ephesians:

3.1 "I am not commanding you, as though I were someone important. For even though I am in chains for the sake of the Name, I have not yet been perfected in Jesus Christ. For now I am only beginning to be a disciple, and I speak to you as my fellow students. For I need to be trained by you in faith, instruction, endurance, and patience."



I'm impressed by the holy bishop St. Ignatius' humility. In our society, "Influencers" use their authority or popularity to change the thoughts or behaviors of others. Their efforts are usually fleeting and doomed to failure. St. Ignatius doesn't use his "holiness", his position as a bishop, nor his impending martyrdom to influence others. Instead he says that he is not perfect, that he is just a "beginner" as a disciple of Christ, and is in need of training by his fellow Christians. How amazing! What a great model for all of us who are called to leadership in the home, business, school, church, or larger community! We are all learners! We can learn from our children and grandchildren, from our employees and clients, from our students and coworkers. We all have much to learn from each other. We are all "beginners" in our journey of faith!

And what do we need to learn? Faith, instruction, endurance, and patience. Gluten Intolerant?



If you have an adverse reaction to the gluten found in bread, including the Holy Eucharist, you have several options. First, you are welcome to receive the Lord in the Precious Blood. Remember, He is fully in present in the smallest drop of his Precious Blood as well as in the smallest particle of the Host. Second, there are low-gluten or "gluten free" altar breads available which contain less than 0.00042% gluten. Saints of God



On Thursday, September 8, we celebrate the birth of our Blessed Mother Mary. It is also the feast of Our Lady of Charity, Patroness of Cuba, and Our Lady of Good Health, Patroness of India. Little is known of Mary's family from the Bible. From the second century apocryphal Protevangelium of James, tradition holds that Ann was her mother and Joachim was her father. They were an elderly couple who longed for a child. The feast of the Birth of Mary was first celebrated in the basilica of St. Ann in Jerusalem. Towards the end of the 7th century, the feast was celebrated in Rome and spread throughout the world in the following centuries. The date was later set to nine months after the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. There are only two Saints whose birthday is celebrated in the liturgical calendar: Mary and St. John the Baptist. This is due to their singular role in the Incarnation of our Lord. St. Mary, mother of God, pray for us! Today, why not take the time to spruce up your Marian shrine in your home or yard.

Mass with Kids – for a better experience! This article is adapted from 77 Ways to Pray with your Kids.

The Eucharistic liturgy (the Mass) is the height of Christian prayer, and so essential to Christian life that the Church requires all the faithful to attend Mass every Sunday, as well as on holy days of obligation. But many families find Mass challenging for different reasons: disruptive children, resistant teenagers, apathy, or boredom. Below, you'll find ideas for dealing with those challenges and making the most of your time at Mass.



More general suggestions for the Younger Children

- ▶ Play Mass at home. Prepare children to participate in the Mass by encouraging them to play Mass at home. You can purchase a play Mass kit from a Catholic store, or use materials around the house.
- ▶ Don't be afraid to use the cry room. If your parish has a cry room, take advantage of it, if it will help you participate in the Mass. Starting when they are around age three or four, try to keep your child in Mass so that they can begin learning how to participate.
- ▶ Should disruptive kids stay or go? Judging whether to remove a disruptive child is a balancing act. On the one hand, both you and your child are entitled to participate in the Mass, by virtue of your baptism. On the other hand, so are other people! So the question often becomes: Is my child preventing other people from participating in the liturgy? The culture of the parish often determines where that line is drawn. If you are unsure, ask the pastor or a member of the parish.
- ▶ Pray for help, and don't expect perfection. Hundreds of generations of moms and dads have experienced the same challenges as you; most of them are probably saints now, so you may as well ask them to pray for the strength and patience you need to get through Mass with small children. Remember, too, that the very work of lovingly managing children at Mass is a sort of prayer in itself.

On a Lighter Note:

One of our catechists said to her children, "We have been learning how powerful kings and queens were in Bible times. But, there is a higher power. Can anybody tell me what it is?" One child blurted out, "Aces!"

Adult Choir: Singing makes you feel good-literally!

1. Singing is a natural anti-depressant. Singing is known to release endorphins, the feel good brain chemical that makes you feel uplifted and happy. 2. Singing lowers stress levels. Making music in any form is relaxing. Singing releases stored muscle tension and decreases the levels of a stress hormone called cortisol. 3. Singing improves mental alertness. Improved blood circulation and an oxygenated blood stream allow more oxygen to reach the brain, improving mental alertness, concentration and memory. Our Adult Choir rehearses every Thursday evening from 7 p.m.-9 p.m. in the Church, beginning September 1st.

The Eucharistic Revival

"Why did Our Blessed Lord use bread and wine as the elements of this Memorial?

First of all, because no two substances in nature better symbolize unity than bread and wine. As bread is made from a multiplicity of grains of wheat, and wine is made from a multiplicity of grapes, so the many who believe are one in Christ.

Second, no two substances in nature have to suffer more to become what they are than bread and wine. Wheat has to pass through the rigors of winter, be ground beneath the Calvary of a mill, and then subjected to purging fire before it can become bread. Grapes in their turn must be subjected to the Gethsemane of a wine press and have their life crushed from them to become wine. Thus, do they symbolize the Passion and Sufferings of Christ, and the condition of Salvation, for Our Lord said unless we die to ourselves we cannot live in Him.

A third reason is that there are no two substances in nature which have more traditionally nourished man than bread and wine. In bringing these elements to the altar, men are equivalently bringing themselves. When bread and wine are taken or consumed, they are changed into man's body and blood. But when He took bread and wine, He changed them into Himself." - Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen

We continue to present a paragraph at a time...

10. To begin to comprehend the tremendous gift offered by Christ through his Incarnation, Death, and Resurrection, that gift that is made present to us in the Eucharist, we must first realize how truly profound is our alienation from the Source of all life as a result of sin. We have abundant experience of evil, yet so many of us deny the cause of much of that evil-our own selfishness, our own sins. The Mass is the most powerful of all prayers since it is a participation in the redemptive act of Jesus Christ. Throughout history, it has been praised as a sure means of assisting both the living and deceased to attain eternal salvation. Each Mass is offered for the intentions of all who are present. A special intention for the Mass may also be requested. In this case, it is usually announced in the bulletin and may be included in the prayers of the faithful. The suggested donation is \$20-15, depending on the day. You may also request an "unannounced" Mass. This Mass will be celebrated during a private celebration. It could be celebrated by one of the priests of the parish who are not scheduled for Mass that day or by a retired priest, foreign missionary, or a priest who is not assigned to a parish. The suggested offering is \$10. For more information, stop by the parish office.

Ask It Basket

"Why do Catholics worship Mary?" First of all, Catholics do not worship Mary. We worship God, and God alone. We honor Mary because she is truly "blessed among women" (Lk 1:26,42) since she is the mother of our Lord, the first disciple, and our mother (Jn 19:27). Part of the confusion is the word "pray". In English as in most languages, "pray" has two meanings 1) to humbly entreat or implore, 2)



to address God. When we "pray" to Mary, we are asking her to join us in prayer to her Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In Latin it is clearer. God alone gets latria or worship. Saints get dulia or praise and Mary receives hyperdulia or highest praise. (If you have a question, please email FrBill@Ignatius.net)
