Lent begins, and therefore ends, earlier this year! I invite you to participate in this season with acts of penance, attending extra weekday Masses, and taking advantage of the Parish Mission that runs from Sunday through Tuesday night, February 25-27. The Lenten regional Penance Services are Monday-Thursday March 4-7. There will be a Mass each Tuesday in Lent at 7:00 PM to give an opportunity to attend for those working during the day.

The Lenten Fish Dinners begin on Friday, February 16 – March 22. Volunteers are needed and welcomed! Please call the Office to volunteer and welcome our guests.

Second collections during Lent are dedicated towards providing, in our charity, alms for the Christians in the Holy Land. You, no doubt, are aware of their special need as the

war rages on in Gaza. My visit to the Holy Land is dependent upon the situation with the war, but regardless of that situation, I will be sending funds directly from bank to bank to be distributed to those in need if I am unable to go this year.

In your prayers, please remember those from our parish who are preparing to enter the Church this Easter Vigil. They count upon our example and our prayerful support.

During Lent, we extend our **Eucharistic exposition** from after Mass on Thursday through 7:00 PM Friday **Benediction** and the **Stations of the Cross** that follow. This gives extra opportunity for those passing the church to come in and pray before the exposed Eucharist.

There will be an **Easter Egg Hunt** in various places in the Hall on Saturday, March 23 at 11:00 AM. Crafts and games will be available, and there will be a visit from the Easter Bunny!

"Thanksgiving" is the meaning of the Greek word "Eucharist." The attitude of thankfulness is central to Christian spirituality. 

What time is it? We have finished Christmas and now enter into Lent and preparing for Easter. "Bethlehem is the prelude to Calvary. We may not merely stand adoring at the crib; we must also follow to the cross." (Magnificat Dec. 26, 2012) Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14, and ends before the celebration of the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, March 28. The 40 days of Lent evoke all other uses of

"40" in the Scriptures. For 40 days Jesus fasted and prepared to proclaim the Good News. Long before Jesus, Moses and Elijah had their 40-day fasts. It rained on the earth and on Noah's ark for 40 days, and the earth had a new beginning. And for 40 years the people of Israel wandered in the wilderness toward the Promised Land. In the Bible, the number 40 means that something important is taking place. We enter Lent with ashes on our heads. Ashes symbolize mourning, mortality, and penance. To repent means to turn from sin and dedicate oneself to the improvement of one's spiritual life. We begin with prayer and increasing the time and depth of our conversations with God. Reading Scripture, reflecting on God's word to me, receiving the sacraments of the Eucharist and Reconciliation. reading the lives of the saints, and other spiritual reading. We fast in various ways, perhaps by eating less food and foregoing treats. As we think about those who do not have enough to eat we give alms, which means that we find ways to share what we have, our time and our goods. In these ways we remember our Baptism and so try to grow more deeply in the Christian life. May we all have a blessed Lent and Easter time.

Our St. Mary Parish cemetery is Mt. Olivet Cemetery, located on the west side of Freer Road next to the railroad tracks in Chelsea. Lots are available to purchase rights of burial. Each grave site cost is \$800. A grave site can be utilized for 1 full burial and/or 3 cremation burials. New to Mt. Olivet is the St. Peter Columbarium. The cost of a niche is \$2000, and can be used for 1 or 2 cremations and includes

It's a safe bet that you would have a great answer if someone were to ask, "what do *you* like most about being Catholic?" We could probably come up with several good answers, couldn't we? However, should answering this question depend on who asks it or where you are at the time? For that matter, what is stopping us from

asking that question of others? We may wisely conclude that it's not the time or the place. Maybe you believe it's way too personal. Maybe, *maybe*, it's the wrong open-ended question altogether!

Picture yourself standing in a long line at the grocery store and you happen to notice a magazine with the image of a beautiful Angel on the cover. Some people would start reading it (I might!) just to pass the time. However, you and I are called to spread the Gospel and *this* magazine cover gives us a perfect conversion starter! Noticing the person standing behind you holding a bag of onions and a six pack of soda, you point to the magazine and ask, "Do you believe in Guardian Angels"?

What a perfectly good, innocent, and open-ended question! Whether or not they believe in God or in his angels you are provided a wonderful opportunity to share your faith with someone who may really need to hear that they are loved. Who knows, by sharing your story, by planting a seed, you may see that person six months (or six years) from now entering the RCIA program at church!

If you missed the restorative justice classes, "Harm, Healing and Human Dignity", that took place at St. Mary Church during Lent of 2022, you have another chance. Kathie Gourlay will be leading them again at the St. Joseph Parish Center, 3430 Dover St. during Lent.

In our families, our relationships, the Church, and society we suffer from hurtful words, violence, and deep divisions. How can we show love and bring people together as the children of God? "Healing in Our Families and Our Communities" is a series of three sessions that will show us a way to repair after harms that have been done to us by another person, institution or society, or that we have done to others. These presentations and discussions will be based on the book "Harm, Healing and Human Dignity, a Catholic Encounter with Restorative Justice". Topics to be covered include: mercy, forgiveness, responsibility, human dignity and Catholic social teaching. Lent is the perfect time for us to look at painful issues in our lives and begin the healing for ourselves and others. These talks will be held on Sunday afternoons from 3:00—5:00 pm on February 18, March 3 and March 10 at the St. Joe Parish Center.

The cost to attend these three sessions is \$20.00 which includes the book. We welcome people, high-school age or older. You can register by calling the St. Joseph Parish Office 734-426-8483. Why Go Back to Confession? Call it sin. Call it wrongdoing. Call it failings, or transgressions, or brokenness, or "the human condition." It goes by many names. It's the desolate knowledge that things are not right because we have acted wrongly. Sin divides and shatters. It separates us from God, from those we love, and from ourselves. This knowledge burdens us. We can't undo what we've done, but we long for relief — a new start, an end to guilt, freedom to act rightly, a path out of the wilderness. We want forgiveness. We want to be restored. That's what God offers us in confession. The salvation that Jesus accomplished for the human race is something we can experience personally. Forgiveness is ours through confession. It's the road back to God. It's a channel of grace to live with new joy and freedom. A few decades ago, the Catholic Church began referring to Confession as the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. It did this to emphasize reconciliation. That's the short answer to the question, "Why go back to confession?" We do it to be reconciled. Reconciliation literally means "to meet again." We've lost our way. Confession is the way back home. (from Our Sunday Visitor pamphlet "Why Go Back to Confession?") Sin wounds our relationship with God and others as well as our human dignity. Faith reveals to us the destructive force of sin in our lives and the world. (from the United Sates Catholic Catechism for Adults)
