

Introduction

When is your birthday? How do you celebrate it? When something really important happens, like a wedding or the birth of a new baby, we celebrate that event every year. Sometimes we have special traditions, meaning every year we celebrate it the same way. When God saved the Israelites from slavery and death in Egypt, he told them to celebrate that special day every year with the Feast of Passover. He told them exactly how to celebrate the feast so they would always remember how he saved them.

key Words

Moses

An Israelite who was adopted by an Egyptian princess. God chose him to deliver the Israelites from slavery. God gave Moses the Ten Commandments to auide his people.

Plagues

A series of disasters that God brought upon Egypt to convince Pharaoh to free the Israelites from slavery.

Sacrifice

Offering of something to God for the forgiveness of sin or in thanksgiving for God's great gifts. Jesus offered himself as a sacrifice so that our sins could be forgiven.

Unleavened bread

Bread that is made without veast so that it doesn't rise.

Passover

The event that recalls how God saved his people from slavery and death in Egypt.

F Let's Read God's Word

The Feast of Passover

From Exodus 12:14-28

When God sent Moses to bring the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, Pharaoh did not listen. God sent nine terrible plagues—such as a terrible hail storm and swarms of locusts—to show that he was the only God. But still Pharaoh would not let the Israelites leave. Finally, God told Moses there would be a tenth plague. In this final plague, all the first-born sons in Egypt would die, and then Pharaoh would finally let God's people go.

God gave Moses instructions for what the Israelites were to do on the night of the tenth plague. Every family needed to choose a spotless lamb and sacrifice it.

Then, God said: "They shall take some of the blood, and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat them. They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it" (Exodus 12:7-8).

When they eat it, they were to be dressed for a long journey because in the morning they would leave Egypt. God told

them: "It is the Lord's **Passover**. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike all the first-born in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you, upon the houses where you are; and when I see the blood, I will pass over you, when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as an ordinance for ever" (Exodus 12:11–14).

In the Mass, we remember how Jesus saves us from sin. Jesus brought us the gift of salvation. Have you ever been given a gift that made you thankful?

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Jesus replaced the sacrifices of the Old Testament with his sacrifice on the Cross. But we still offer our own sacrifices to God by praying and doing good deeds. The most important way we offer sacrifice to God is by going to Mass because this is where we celebrate Jesus's sacrifice for us in a very special way.

The Passover Seder Meal

The Passover meal is called the **Seder Meal**, which means "order." There is a special order to the prayers and the food eaten during the meal. This order teaches us about how God saved his people at the first Passover.

One of the most important parts of the Seder is when a child asks, "Why is this night different from all other" nights?" The father answers this question by retelling the story of how God saved the Israelites from Egypt.

God said that the Passover would be a memorial, which is a very special way of remembering something important. The story of Passover isn't just a story about something that happened a long time ago—it is the story of what God does for all his people. The memorial of the Passover sacrifice each year made God's saving power present to his people, even the ones born long after the first Passover.

Story of a Saint



Saint Catherine of Siena (1347-1380)

"What are you going to do?" Nick asked.


"Dig for buried treasure," he said. He put the shovel over his shoulder and walked off.
