PILGRIMS OF HOPE: Dreaming with St. Vincent Pallotti


This day I call the heavens and the earth as witnesses against you that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Now choose life, so that you and your children may live" (Deuteronomy 30:19). We are always left with the option to choose life or death. As Christians, we will always

choose life. We are an Easter

people.

With the lack of vocations to religious life and priesthood, and with the advancing age of many of our Pallottine confreres, the choice in favor of life, by no means, is an easy one. The growing secularism, individualism, and anti-Church mentality for a variety of reasons, make our choices and actions even harder. Regardless of all these shadows of death, the Christians are called to be a people of hope, trusting in the promises of God. The journey to the unknown Promised Land is the hallmark of a genuine faith in God.

Relentless search for vocations, international collaboration with other Pal-



lottine entities, closing down of houses and apostolic works, opening new missions and apostolic works, etc. were some of the solutions sought after by various Provinces and Regions. At the diocesan level, the bishops created pastoral units for lack of priests. There have been many stories of success and failures. Looking at the current situation of the Church and the world, we do not see clearly the end of the tunnel. Yet God is the Master of our history and destiny. At the same time, the more than 2000 years of the history of the Church assures us that we can continue our journey to the promised land without undue fear. God continues to walk with us.

Addressing the participants on the occasion of a seminar organized by Dicastery for the Laity, Family and Life on 16th February 2023, Pope Francis uttered these significant words:

"This means recovering an "integral ecclesiology", like that of the first centuries, when everything was unified by membership in Christ and by supernatural communion with him and with our brothers and sisters. It means leaving behind a sociological vision that distinguishes classes and social rank, and is ultimately based on the "power" assigned to each category. The emphasis needs to be placed on unity, not on separation or distinction. The lay person is more than a "non-cleric" or a "non-religious"; he or she must be considered as a baptized person, a member of the holy People of God, for that is the sacrament which opens all doors. In the New Testament, the word "layperson" does not appear; we hear of "believers", "disciples", "brethren" and "saints", terms applied to everyone: lay faithful and ordained ministers alike, the People of God journeying together".

Pope Francis, during his General Audience on 15 March 2023 uttered these words regarding the Christian vocation and the common dignity shared by all the members in the Church: "It is a call that concerns both those who have received the sacrament of Orders, consecrated persons, and all lay faithful, man or woman: it is a call to all. You, the treasure you have received with your Christian vocation, are obliged to give it: it is the dynamic nature of the vocation, the dynamic nature of life. It is a call that empowers them to actively and creatively perform their apostolic task, within a Church in which "there is a diversity of ministry but a oneness of mission. Christ conferred on the Apostles and their successors the duty of teaching, sanctifying, and ruling in His name and power. But the laity too: all of you, the majority of you are lay people. The laity likewise share in the priestly, prophetic, and royal office of Christ and therefore have their own share in the mission of the whole people of God in the Church and in the world" (Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity, Apostolicam Actuositatem n.2).

This is the spiritual and apostolic patrimony that the Pallottines have inherited. The Church needs holy priests. So also, we need holy consecrated persons and lay men and women. While the pastors have an immense role to play in the Church, they are not alone. We are the Church and we walk together. This is also one of the reasons why Pope Francis chose "Pilgrims of Hope" as the motto for the Holy Year 2025.

Do you still have Holy Cross Parish? No, it's St. Vincent Pallotti now. I went to Pius High School in the 60's. Good for you.


What is the church near the freeway? Oh, that's St. Therese Parish. Pallottine Parade Group

The Funeral service held in Pallottigiri, Kerala, India on 3rd April 2023, Thursday morning 9.00 am (Indian Time). Last 17 years he served the Catholic Church in Milwaukee. On October 2022 he was elected as the Provincial of Mother of God Province Milwaukee. Kindly do remember the deaprted soul of Fr. Davies Edassery SAC in your prayers.



Shopping Guide for "Dirty" and "Clean" produce. The USDA and FDA annually test 35,200 samples for traces of toxic residue, taken from the 47 most popular fruits and vegetables. In 2022 they found that 70% of the non-organic, conventionally-produced samples sold in the US contain residue from potentially harmful chemicals and pesticides. The worst of these comprise the "Dirty Dozen," whereas the best comprise the "Clean 15".

The Dirty Dozen (listed from most residue to least) were found to be: 1 Strawberries; 2 Spinach; 3 Kale, and collard and mustard greens; 4 Nectarines; 5 Apples; 6 Grapes; 7 Bell and hot peppers; 8 Cherries; 9 Peaches; 10 Pears; 11 Celery; 12 Tomatoes

The Clean Fifteen (listed from none or minimal residue to only a little) are: 1 Avocados; 2 Sweet Corn; 3 Pineapple; 4 Onions; 5 Papaya; 6 Sweet Peas (Frozen); 7 Asparagus; 8; Honeydew Melon; 9 Kiwi; 10 Cabbage; 11 Mushrooms; 12 Cantaloupe; 13 Mangoes; 14 Watermelon; 15 Sweet Potatoes

Our Earth Ministry encourages you to take these lists with you while grocery shopping, and to buy organic whenever you can. Regardless, be sure to wash ALL produce when you come home from the store!

Our aim is to bring solace to these families by providing them a ration kit for four persons in a family for a month.

During the Covid 19 pandemic we stepped out to support many more needy families in different places like Arunachal, Nagaland, Madhya Pradesh, Delhi and Kerala. At present we distribute the ration kit regularly every month to Rui Village, Dongergaon, Vela and Pipla Grampanchayat in Besa, TV Tower in Seminary Hills, Governor's Palace Road, Pallotti Nagar and Gorewada in Nagpur.

It is our small endeavour to reach out to the needy and the under privileged responding to the call of Jesus to feed the hungry, cloth the naked, visit the sick and those who are in the prison. (Mt 25:36-40). We welcome you to join with us. Let us be together to reach out the needy.

The Chef's Corner

Beef Taco Skillet - Three Ways!



One evening a friend of mine invited me over for a quick supper and served this wonderful casserole type dish.

Immediately I thought of my cooking column and asked her for the recipe, which she admitted she had found on the Campbell's Soup website. In appreciation and fairness to them I will give you their website here:

For those of you who don't have a computer or just don't want to take the time to look the recipe up, here it is:

What You Will Need:

1 lb. ground beef
1 can (10 3/4 oz.) Campbell's
Tomato Soup (regular or less sodium)
1/2 cup salsa
1/2 cup water
6 flour tortillas (6"), cut into 1" pieces
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Here's What You Do:

Cook beef in a 10" skillet, stirring to break up the meat.

Pour off the fat.

Stir in soup, salsa, water and tortillas. Heat to a boil. Reduce heat to low and cook for 5 minutes. Stir.

Top with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

FOR TWO OTHER VARIATIONS:

1) Creamy Mexican Fiesta:

Stir in 1/2 cup of sour cream with the soup.

2) <u>Ranchero Style:</u> Use corn tortillas instead of flour tortillas (a great idea for you gluten free people!) and then substitute shredded Mexican cheese blend for the Cheddar cheese.

Did You Know???



Blessed Richard Henkes was born on May 26, 1900 in Ruppach-Goldhausen in Germany. He wanted to be a priest and a missionary; and thus joined the Pallottine minor seminary in 1912. He studied Philosophy and Theology and was ordained a priest on June 6, 1925. From 1931, he was a teacher and a preacher as he clearly exalted the Christian image of a man in the face of the ideology of the National Socialist movement in Germany.

On April 8, 1943, during a sermon in Branitz, he openly took a stand against the deportation of disabled patients from the hospital and was immediately arrested.

He was sent to prison and finally the Dachau concentration camp. At the end of 1944, a major epidemic broke out in Dachau. This affected Block 17 where Father Henkes worked as a secret pastor. When the block was quarantined because of the risk of infection, Father Henkes volunteered to stay in the Block and assisted the sick in a human and spiritual way. After about 10 weeks, Father Henkes was infected with typhoid. He died on February 22, 1945. Blessed Richard Henkes was called to be a true beacon of faith; a fearless spokesman against injustice and persecution, and a martyr of love of neighbor as he offered up his life while caring for the sick and dying imprisoned with him.
