ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

Welcome to St. Mary's Cathedral

From its dedication in 1926, St. Mary's Cathedral has stood as the gracious center of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon. The cathedral belongs to the 400,000 Catholics of the archdiocese and serves as a place of ceremony and celebration for those who come here. The cathedral is also a parish church, and as such it is home to its parishioners and a welcoming place for all visitors. More history of the Cathedral can be found on our website.

The cathedral was designed in 1925 by the firm of Jacobberger and Smith. It is in the Romanesque style with some Byzantine features and covers an area of 12,000 square feet. The stained glass windows in the transept date from one of the earlier cathedrals. Statues of the Sacred Heart and the Blessed Mother were brought in by the Benedictine monks of Mount Angel. The Stations of the Cross and the Povey Brothers dome above the altar date from 1926. Other artwork, including the paintings in the apse, the lights, the stained glass windows, the etched windows in the vestibule, and the icons were either installed at the time of the 1996 restoration of Archbishop Leveda or in the years since then.

FROM THE RECTOR

Bell tower - I would like to update you on the repairs taking place on the bell tower and other parts of the roof. As part of the water infiltration project certain urgent repairs were begun on the bell tower as the structure is compromised and could possibly cause safety issues. This initial stage of the project is estimated to cost \$400,000. Whilst repairing the bell tower and replacing loose bricks, it was discovered that the two columns facing Davis street are cracked and dangerously close to failing. Since they are supporting the upper tower they have to be replaced immediately. This will mean a five-week extension to the project and an additional cost of \$90,000. I am grateful to the donors to the Capital Campaign who have agreed that the remaining monies can be used for the roof. This is only phase 1 of the project. Phase 2 is estimated to cost between \$900,000 - \$1,124,000. This does not include repairing the water damage inside the cathedral.

Thank you - to the seminarians who hosted coffee & donuts after Mass on Thursday 22 July. It was a great event and it was nice to see so many of you attend. They would like to do it again before the leave.

RCIA - starting on Tuesday 14 September we will be joining with St. Patrick's Parish to offer the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Brigid Young will be the coordinator of this

joint venture. RCIA sessions will take place on Tuesday evenings at 7:00pm in the cathedral school library. RCIA is for those non-catholic (baptized or not) who would like to enter the Church. It is also for those who were baptized catholic but never received any formation and adults seeking confirmation. If you are interested, or know of anyone interested please contact Paulette Peynet (paulette@prinstitute.org) or see me or Brigid Young after Mass.

Confirmation - we will start our confirmation class in September - this will be taught by our Pastoral Associate Brigid Young. In the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, young Catholics who were baptized as infants are confirmed in the freshman or sophomore years in high school. Collections - can I encourage you to sign up for electronic giving? It really is very easy to set-up an account and it gives the cathedral a consistent income stream. Going forward I don't think we will reintroduce a physical collection during Mass and therefore it is even more important that our parishioners have a regular way of giving.

Lord Jesus Christ, only begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

First Reading Ex 16:2-4, 12-15

The whole Israelite community grumbled against Moses and Aaron. The Israelites said to them, "Would that we had died at the LORD's hand in the land of Egypt, as we sat by our fleshpots and ate our fill of bread! But you had to lead us into this desert to make the whole community die of famine!"

Then the LORD said to Moses, "I will now rain down bread from heaven for you. Each day the people are to go out and gather their daily portion; thus will I test them, to see whether they follow my instructions or not.

"I have heard the grumbling of the Israelites. Tell them: In the evening twilight you shall eat flesh, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread, so that you may know that I, the LORD, am your God."

In the evening quail came up and covered the camp. In the morning a dew lay all about the camp, and when the dew evaporated, there on the surface of the desert were fine flakes like hoarfrost on the ground. On seeing it, the Israelites asked one another, "What is this?" for they did not know what it was. But Moses told them, "This is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat."

Responsorial:

The Lord gave them bread from heaven.

Second Reading Eph 4:17, 20-24

Brothers and sisters: I declare and testify in the Lord that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their minds; that is not how you learned Christ, assuming that you have heard of him and were taught in him, as truth is in Jesus, that you should put away the old self of your former way of life, corrupted through deceitful desires, and be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and put on the new self, created in God's way in righteousness and holiness of truth.

Gospel Jn 6:24-35

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they themselves got into boats and came to Capernaum looking for Jesus. And when they found him across the sea they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?" Jesus answered them and said, "Amen, amen, I say to you, you are looking for me not because you saw signs but because you ate the loaves and were

filled. Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him the Father, God, has set his seal.” So they said to him, “What can we do to accomplish the works of God?” Jesus answered and said to them, “This is the work of God, that you believe in the one he sent.” So they said to him, “What sign can you do, that we may see and believe in you? What can you do? Our ancestors ate manna in the desert, as it is written: He gave them bread from heaven to eat.” So Jesus said to them, “Amen, amen, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave the bread from heaven; my Father gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.” So they said to him, “Sir, give us this bread always.” Jesus said to them, “I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst.”

Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

At the words that follow, up to and including and became man, all bow

and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins

and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
