ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

Welcome to St. Mary's Cathedral

From its dedication in 1926, St. Mary's Cathedral has stood as the gracious center of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon. The cathedral belongs to the 400,000 Catholics of the archdiocese and serves as a place of ceremony and celebration for those who come here. The cathedral is also a parish church, and as such it is home to its parishioners and a welcoming place for all visitors. More history of the Cathedral can be found on our website.

The cathedral was designed in 1925 by the firm of Jacobberger and Smith. It is in the Romanesque style with some Byzantine features and covers an area of 12,000 square feet. The stained glass windows in the transept date from one of the earlier cathedrals. Statues of the Sacred Heart and the Blessed Mother were brought in by the Benedictine monks of Mount Angel. The Stations of the Cross and the Povey Brothers dome above the altar date from 1926. Other artwork, including the paintings in the apse, the lights, the stained glass windows, the etched windows in the vestibule, and the icons were either installed at the time of the 1996 restoration of Archbishop Leveda or in the years since then.

FROM THE RECTOR

As I write the column - I am in the middle of the Priests' Convocation here in Newport. We are having a really powerful time with presenters Dr. Bob Schuchts and Sr. Miriam, SOLT. The theme of the convocation is "Healing the Whole Person". The whole history of salvation is God's intervention into the world to bring healing to our entire being. Pope Benedict said in his book Jesus of Nazareth: "Healing is an essential dimension of the apostolic mission and of Christianity. When understood at a sufficiently deep level, this expresses the entire content of redemption." The recognition of our wounded-ness and the acceptance of Christ as the divine healer is the start to the restoration of the whole person in communion with God. I hope to be able to share more with you in the coming weeks.

Finance Council - we had our first Finance Council meeting of the new fiscal year a couple of weeks ago. I will now prepare a financial report (via video) to present to you the three major areas of the cathedral finances. (Operating Budget, Capital Campaign and Ongoing Collections.) I hope to have something soon and I will email it to you all and address the same topics at all Masses one Sunday. The very good news is that after 5 years in the red we ended the year in the black and we have a balanced budget for this new fiscal year which should keep us in the black.

Seminarian Appeal - this appeal has started and there are envelopes in the pews for you to donate. This is a very worthwhile cause as it directly supports those young men who have decided to give their lives to the service of Our Lord and his church. Please be generous to this appeal and thank you in anticipation.

Holy Communion - Please remove your mask before you receive Holy Communion. It is still an issue with people touching the host to their mask and dropping the host because they are messing with their mask while holding Our Lord in their hand. It is really simple - please drop your mask before you accept the Sacred Host.

White Mass - on behalf of health care professionals the annual White Mass will be celebrated by Archbishop Sample Saturday, October 16 at 5:30 p.m. at St. Mary's Cathedral. The annual White Mass Dinner with guest speaker, President of the National Catholic Bioethics Center, Joseph Meaney, PhD, KM, will follow in the cathedral school. Lord Jesus Christ, only begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. First Reading Wis 7:7-11

I prayed, and prudence was given me; I pleaded, and the spirit of wisdom came to me. I preferred her to scepter and throne, and deemed riches nothing in comparison with her, nor did I liken any priceless gem to her; because all gold, in view of

her, is a little sand, and before her, silver is to be accounted mire. Beyond health and comeliness I loved her, and I chose to have her rather than the light, because the splendor of her never yields to sleep. Yet all good things together came to me in her company, and countless riches at her hands.

Second Reading Heb 4:12-13

Brothers and sisters: Indeed the word of God is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart. No creature is concealed from him, but everything is naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must render an account.

Gospel Mk 10:17-30

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up, knelt down before him, and asked him, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus answered him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: *You shall not kill; you shall not commit adultery; you shall not steal; you shall not bear false witness; you shall not defraud; honor your father and your mother.*"

He replied and said to him, "Teacher, all of these I have observed from my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions.

Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" The disciples were amazed at his words. So Jesus again said to them in reply, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of

God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were exceedingly astonished and said among themselves, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God." Peter began to say to him, "We have given up everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age: houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and eternal life in the age to come."

Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

At the words that follow, up to and including and became man, all bow and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
