

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR





On January 1st, New Year's Day, we celebrated the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. As we begin a new year, and as we ponder the mystery of Mary and Jesus, it might be a good time to review some of the history and tradition of our Marian theology and feasts. Even Protestants seem more interested in Mary these days. Time magazine a few of years ago featured Mary on its cover, calling her "the most powerful woman in the world." Despite all this, there is a still a lot of misunderstanding about Mary, her place in the Church, and her important role in the history of our salvation.

In the early Church, reflecting on the biblical image of Mary, three themes began to emerge: 1) that Mary is the new Eve who, by her obedience, overturned the sin of the first Eve, and brought life, not death, into the world; 2) that, despite her maternity in bringing Jesus into the world, Mary's virginity remained throughout her life; and 3) that Mary's role as mother of Jesus justified her title as Theotokos, "Mother of God." All of these themes were not without controversy, but future councils would consistently repeat them even as a "theology of Mary" began to develop. For example, Mary's title as Theotokos (God-bearer) was challenged by Nestorius, the patriarch of Constantinople. Nestorius said that Mary could be called "the Mother of Jesus" but not "the Mother of God." The Council of Ephesus (431) corrected this heresy and declared that since Jesus is one divine person (with a human nature), she can rightly be called the Mother of God. This declaration gave great impetus to Marian devotion and piety.

In the middle ages, Mary became known mostly as the "mediatrix" of grace, the idea that Mary had a maternal influence over God—she was the mercy of God's justice. This close relationship between God and Mary would lead to the notion that God could, and would, gift Mary with certain privileges befitting her dignity. This would give weight to the developing theologies of Mary's Immaculate Conception and Assumption, which would be dogmatically defined by papal decree in the 19th and 20th centuries. The first, the Immaculate Conception (1854), stated that Mary was conceived without original sin; and the second, the Assumption (1950), stated that Mary, at her death, was given the gift of resurrection (i.e., she was taken body and soul into heaven).

Thus, the Church teaches four major doctrines about Mary, two from the early Church (her perpetual virginity and her maternity of God), and two from the modern Church (her Immaculate Conception and her Assumption). Liturgically, we celebrate four solemnities of Mary: the Mother of God (January 1st), the Annunciation (March 25th), the Assumption (August 15th), and the Immaculate Conception These solemnities summarize (December 8th). our Catholic beliefs about Mary. There are, of course, more feasts (e.g., the Nativity of Mary) and memorials (e.g., the Presentation of Mary and, most recently, Our Lady of Loreto), and these add to our appreciation of the Mother of God. May Mary, the Mother of Mercy, intercede for us in the new year!

Monsignor Patrick Brennan is a native Oregonian and and attended high school and college at Mount Angel Seminary (1965-1973). He studied theology at the Gregorian University in Rome (1973-1977; 1979-1980), and studied Canon Law at The Catholic University of America (1983-1985). He was ordained a priest in 1977, and became the pastor of St. Mary's Cathedral in 2011. His role as pastor is to assist parishioners in living out the Gospel in their daily lives. He loves architecture, travel and digital photography.



toward a wealth not dependent on possessions toward a wisdom not based on books toward a strength not bolstered by might towards a God not confined to heaven


but scandalously earthed, poor, unrecognized...


