
Attention Seniors

ASK FATHER!

Q Can you give us the hierarchy - priest to pope and how is their promotion taken (by vote, recommendation, etc.)?



A . A full answer of the above would require an entire essay, but I will summarize the best that

I can. First, we need to differentiate diocesan priests from religious priests. I (and all the priests without fancy abbreviations after their names) belong to a particular diocese. Once a priest is ordained for a diocese, it is the bishop of that diocese that determines what office (if any) he will have. Fortunately, most newly ordained priests in this diocese become parochial vicars for their first few years. In most dioceses this position is the absolute lowest in authority. Since we had so many priests (almost five hundred in 2001), our diocese had a personnel board that would give the bishop recommendations for which priest should go to which parish. As we jokingly say, every parish wants Jesus without any of his flaws;) The personnel board would also conduct interviews of priests who were applying for open pastorates - parishes that needed a new pastor. Ultimately, all diocesan assignments are done at the behest of the bishop: he is the boss. It is not an easy thing to know all the names of our priests let alone know their personalities and qualifications. In most dioceses there is a level of middle management between pastors and the bishop called deans. If you guessed that the bishop appoints deans, you get a gold star!

To be named a bishop is even more complicated. Every three years each bishop sends a letter with at least three names of suitable priests to the Papal nuncio - the direct representative of the Pope to a country. The nuncio then prepares a short list of three names called the "terna" and requests further information about these priests. The nuncio will send letters to priests who would know or have worked with these priests to get more information. The nuncio then sends the information he has gathered and his own recommendation to the Congregation of Bishops in Rome. This committee is free to do whatever it wants with the information; sometimes one of the priests is selected and sometimes the congregation asks for an entirely new list. When they do select a priest, they send his file to the pope, who then also must decide whether to follow the recommendation or not. If he does, he asks the nuncio to contact the priest and ask for his consent to become a bishop. Next week we will go over how bishops become archbishops, cardinals, and even pope!

The Lord be with you!

I hope that everyone had a joyous and blessed Christmas this past week. This week we will start an in-depth examination of the Descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. As some may be surprised to learn, Pentecost was originally a Jewish holy day.

Question 425. On what day did the Holy Ghost come down upon the Apostles?

Answer. The Holy Ghost came down upon the Apostles ten days after the Ascension of our Lord; and the day on which He came down upon the Apostles is called Whitsunday, or Pentecost.

Question 426. Why is the day on which the Holy Ghost came down upon the Apostles called Whitsunday?

Answer. The day on which the Holy Ghost came down upon the Apostles is called Whitsunday or White Sunday, probably because the Christians who were baptized on the eve of Pentecost wore white garments for some time afterward, as a mark of the purity bestowed upon their souls by the Sacrament of Baptism.

Question 427. Why is this feast called also Pentecost?

Answer. This feast is called also Pentecost because Pentecost means the fiftieth; and the Holy Ghost came down upon the Apostles fifty days after the resurrection of Our Lord.

My commentary.

I have to admit that I had never heard of Whitsunday before reading the above questions. The word "Whitsunday" is Old English and can be traced back to at least the 14th Century. "Whitsunday" is a simple shortening of "White Sunday," but the reason for white being associated with the feast in England is far from clear. One theory has it that the "whit" is a play on "wit" to denote that wisdom came upon the disciples on that day. Another explanation is that the Sunday marked the typical day for Catechumens to enter the Church; since they would wear white albs after their baptism, the Sunday became known as Whitsunday. The most likely explanation is that there existed a now lost liturgical tradition in England that centered on Pentecost and gave it this name. Ironically, the use of Whitsunday has all but ceased whereas everyone knows it as Pentecost - its original name.

Many Christians erroneously believe that Pentecost is so named because it occurs fifty days after Easter. Instead, Pentecost is named for fifty days after Passover and is the Greek name for the Jewish holy day of Shavout or Feast of Weeks. As the Acts of the Apostles clearly states, "Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem" (Acts 2:5). These observant Jews had gathered for this celebration in which the Covenant of Mount Sinai was liturgically renewed. The seven weeks and one day from Passover allowed for the first harvest of grain to occur so that it could be offered to God in thanksgiving for the Promised Land.

Whereas the Jewish feast of Pentecost marks the giving of the Law, the Christian feast reveals the gift of grace. The parallel was obviously intended by God to highlight that the New Covenant would perfect and deepen the Old. Moreover, the tongues of fire upon the Apostles replace the pillar of fire seen upon the meeting tent to show that God now dwells in our hearts! Likewise, Peter's announcing of the Good News of salvation replaces Moses' presentation of the Ten Commandments.

Reflecting on both the events of Sinai and Jerusalem is the best way to understand Pentecost - as we will see in the next few bulletin articles. God meant for the Descent of the Holy Spirit to inaugurate the Church's public life with an outpouring of mercy just as He meant the Ten Commandments to ground the life of Israel on a life of love. Journeying ever more deeply into His Love, we discover that Pentecost continues in the stories of our hearts.
