REFLECTING ON THE READINGS

ASKING THE QUESTION

Questions are sometimes more important than answers. We often use questions to find answers. We ask a question when we are looking for some information. Therefore when we find that information, we sometimes imagine that question is no longer necessary, that it can be discarded and set aside. But that is not always the case.

Look at today's gospel. There are plenty of questions. All kinds of people come up to John the Baptist and they ask the same question: what should we do? Because of all of these questions, on first hearing we imagine that the focus of the gospel is going to be on John's answers. But the answers that John gives are disappointing, even comical, in their simplicity. He tells people to do what they certainly knew they needed to do already. He tells the crowds that they should share their clothes and food with the poor. He tells tax collectors they should not cheat their clients. He tells soldiers not to abuse their power. John's answers are neither new nor penetrating. He basically tells them to do what any decent person would already be doing.

So it does not appear that the emphasis of this gospel passage is on the answers. This opens the possibility that the real point of the passage is the question, that this gospel is calling us to ask the question, "Lord, what should I do?" It suggests that asking the question might be more important than knowing the answer. How is this possible? It is possible because that question, "Lord, what should I do?" is a question for which 95% of the time we already know the answer. We know what are supposed to do. We are supposed to be more patient with our spouse, more affirming

of our children, more just in our dealing with others, less judgmental, more thankful for our blessings. We know all the answers. Yet the gospel suggests it is still important for us to find some quiet moment and sincerely ask the Lord, "What should I do?" Because in asking that question, two things happen. We are able to identify a particular action, and we are able to personalize it.

When we take a few moments and sincerely ask, "Lord, what should I do?" that question helps us to identify a specific action. Our minds are filled with things that we are supposed to do. But when we take a few moments and sincerely ask the question, nine times out of ten, one specific thing will rise to the surface. That one thing becomes the action that God is asking us to do today. It might be something at work or at home or at school, but whatever that action is, we can know that it is God's will for us today.

The question identifies the action. It also personalizes it. Because when an action flows from prayer, it becomes a part of our personal relationship with God. For example, if we are moved to give some of resources to the poor, if that action flows from prayer, it is not an action resulting from a command or obligation. It is a response to a personal request from Christ. When we pick up the phone to talk to our Aunt Louise in an attempt to make peace with her, if that action comes from prayer, we do not act because two thousand years ago Jesus taught us that we should be reconciled to one another, but because today Jesus has asked us, "Make peace with Aunt Louise." When we ask the question, the actions that flow from it are more significant and powerful because

we see them as a response to a personal request from the Lord.

So the gospel today is not really about the answers, but about the question. It invites us to ask, "Lord, what should I do?" If we really take the time to pose that question, the answer might surprise us. But it is more likely that it will not. It will probably be something that we already know we should do. But asking the question will identify it and will give us strength and energy to do it, because it comes out of a dialogue with the Lord who loves us.

But none of this will happen unless we ask the question. So let's ask the question, and let's do it now. In every liturgy after the homily there is a moment of silence. I would suggest that each person here this morning should use that silence to ask the question. Close your eyes. Remember that God is here. In the presence of the Lord, set aside all the things we need to do in the next few days, and ask the question, "Lord, what should I do? What do you ask me to do today?"

John calls out in the wilderness, "The kingdom of God is coming!" Paul whispers in our hearts, "God will always be faithful." If we can hear the voice of John, we must also believe the words of Paul. God does not begin something and then give up. What is begun will be finished. God has made us and God has blessed us. That good work will not be abandoned. It will be brought to completion.

STEWARDSHIP

It's About More than Money!

What first comes to mind when you hear the word “stewardship”? If you immediately thought “money,” you’re not alone. Even though we have been taught that stewardship is about more than this, many people still think stewardship is just another way to ask for money. Let us be clear about what stewardship is so that we can begin to understand that it is about much more than money. Stewardship can be a way to put our faith into practice in our daily lives.

WHAT IS A STEWARD?

A steward is one who cares for something that belongs to another. The steward of the vineyard, for example, cares for the vines, cultivates them, and prunes them when necessary in order to bring about a fruitful harvest. The steward is entrusted with the vineyard and is responsible for it. “An ‘oikonomos’ or steward is one to whom the owner of a household turns over responsibility for caring for the property, managing affairs, making resources yield as much as possible and sharing the resources with others. The position involves trust and accountability” (“Stewardship: A Disciple’s Response,” U.S. bishops).

When we apply this meaning of the word steward to our lives, we come in touch with a powerful realization: All we are, have, and will be is God’s. Every good gift and blessing — our life, talents and abilities, relationships, faith, resources — belongs to God. “The earth is the Lord’s and all it holds, / the world and those who dwell in it” (Ps 24:1). We are called to steward it well. Not to simply care for it, but to nurture it and make it fruitful.

With the deeper meaning of stewardship in our minds and hearts, we can think again about stewardship of money. Why is money included in the

call to give as good stewards? Don’t we earn the money ourselves through our effort and hard work? Surely this is true, but we do so through the use of the gifts that are entrusted to us by God.

We could not earn money without the time, talents and skills, education, and opportunities that have been given us.

Jesus sometimes spoke about the proper use of money, recognizing how difficult it

is for people to keep financial resources in the proper perspective. Jesus’ parables and responses about money show us he understands that the way we use money is a sign of our priorities: “No one can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be

devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon” (Mt 6:24); “For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be” (Lk 12:34).

of talents, skills, and abilities; relationships with family and friends; our faith. All of it is a gift. Yet we do not always see the gift because we aren't looking for it. We rise in the morning, perhaps grumbling because we have to get the children to school and ourselves to work, without recognizing the gift in rising, or the blessing of family or employment. Perhaps we are experiencing unemployment or underemployment, illness, or the death of a loved one. How can we think about blessings at this time of life?

Stewardship begins with awareness of the blessings that surround us, even in the most challenging of moments in our lives. This is not to make light of difficulties, but actually to put them into perspective in light of our faith in Jesus Christ. Understanding ourselves

as stewards helps us to put our trust in God, who entrusts us with much. This attitude of gratitude makes a tremendous difference in our lives. In fact, many studies show a connection between gratitude and happiness. Perhaps this is not surprising, since the word gratitude comes from the root word "grace." To be thankful is to recognize God's grace in our lives!

With the foundation of gratitude in our minds and hearts, we can now see that stewardship is not only about money, but so much more. Our giving is a sign of our thanksgiving, our gratitude to God for bountiful blessings received. Attentive to the abundance of God's grace in our midst, we are sure to find opportunities to be good stewards every day. This truly is a way to bring faith to our daily lives!



AN ACT OF LOVE

Catholic stewardship calls us to act not so much out of responsibility or duty but out of love. Love provides the ultimate motivation. And yet love, at times, demands sacrifice on one level or another. As Dorothy Day, founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, liked to say, "Love in action is a harsh and dreadful thing."

Perhaps that's because we humans find ourselves incapable of the perfect, unconditional love of God. Still, we're called to perfect our love, day by day. We're called to open our hearts again and again, to proclaim our love and also to act upon it.

What sacrifices do you make for love?


