HOMILY AND HOMILIST

INSIGHT FROM FR. MIKE

In the Acts of the Apostles after Jesus was raised from the dead, two of the disciples decide that the events of Easter Sunday were just too much for them so they decided to leave Jerusalem and walk to Emmaus. a town several miles away.

As they leave they are joined by a stranger who asks them what was happening in Jerusalem. They respond "you must be the only person in Jerusalem who does not know about Jesus of Nazareth; how he was put to death and now there are some who are saying he is raised from the dead."

As they walked this stranger began explaining everything to them that was in the scriptures that spoke about this Jesus. By the time they get to Emmaus they invite the stranger to break bread with them.

As they do so they recognize that the stranger was really Jesus Christ.

This is the foundational experience of the Christian liturgy. Even today the Church combines Old Testament readings with Gospel readings in the hope that, through the homily, the Old Testament may give enlightenment to the Gospel.

The homily is the proclamation of the good news of Jesus' presence both in the Word that has been explained and in the sacrament of the Eucharist.



A good homilist attempts to connect to the people through use of his own experiences and reflection on his faith. His goal is to uplift them so that they can grow in the joy of their relationship with Jesus Christ. A poor homilist uses the time to explain doctrine or to moralize in such a way that there is really no good news given to the congregation.

You have been taught to be kind to anyone who preaches, because it is natural for many to struggle to give the homily. My hope is that at the present moment you find the homilies at St. Joe's to be inspirational and enlightening.

SAINT JOHN'S HERITAGE BIBLE AT ST. JOE'S!

St. Joe's is excited to announce that it has been gifted a Heritage Edition of the Saint John's Bible.

What is the Saint John's Bible?

The Original Saint John's Bible is the first completely handwritten and illuminated Bible that has been commissioned by a Benedictine Abbey since the invention of the printing press.

In 1998, Saint John's Abbey and University commissioned renowned calligrapher Donald Jackson to produce a hand-written, handilluminated Bible, which is housed at St. John's University.

This work of art combines ancient Benedictine tradition with the technology and vision of today that is said will "illuminate the Word of God for a new millennium."


The Bible measures two feet tall by three feet wide when open, has seven volumes, along with an eighth volume of commentary that describes the Saint John's Bible and its historical context and several of the illuminations.

The Heritage Edition of The Saint John's Bible – limited to 299 sets, is true to the scale, beauty, and artistic intent of the original manuscript.

The Bible is made of vellum, with 160 illuminations. Many of the illuminations are touched up by hand, including the burnishing of gold leaf. Michael Patella, who worked on the committee overseeing illuminations on the Bible, said, "The illuminations are not illustrations. They are spiritual meditations on a text. It is a very Benedictine approach to the Scriptures."

The version of the Bible contained in the Saint John's Heritage Edition is the New Revised Standard Version Catholic Edition.

The Bible is on display in the Gathering Space and open to the public for viewing.

CATHOLIC SERVICES APPEAL FOUNDATION 2019

20 MINISTRIES. ONE FAITH.

Once again this year, St. Joe's is participating in the Catholic Services Appeal Foundation (CSAF) annual campaign. As you saw on the video introduction the weekend of February 23/24, CSAF is a response to the Gospel call to serve the poor and spread the Good News. The foundation works as Christ's hands and feet throughout the 12-county Archdiocese and is an independent non-profit organization that partners with 20 various outreach ministries, thousands of individual donors. and over 185 parishes. Together, we serve the poor, support life, and strengthen the Catholic faith.

For those of us familiar with CSAF, we know the many stories of the lives and organizations that have

benefited from the foundation's financial assistance in the past. In addition to the ministries who have benefited from the foundation's generosity previously, two additional ministries have been added this year: Abria Pregnancy Resources and the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Each are targeted to receive \$50,000 in 2019 from CSAF. The overall total goal for the 2019 appeal is \$9.2 million.



6 FAMILY IDEAS FOR LENT

Lent is the Church's season for reflection, forgiveness, and almsgiving. It starts with Ash Wednesday and lasts until Holy Thursday. Lent is six weeks (six Sundays) and the last one is Palm Sunday, which begins Holy Week. Lent lasts 40 days, which is also reflective of the 40 days Christ spent in the desert praying and fasting. Lent prepares us for the most important date in the Church Calendar – Easter!

Sacrifice, time for prayer and reflection, and forgiveness can seem like a heavy concept but here are a few practices to incorporate into your 40 days to propel you forward towards Easter.

TAKE SOME TIME TO PRAY: Print out some simple blessings or readings on index cards and put them in a box in the center of your table. Draw one for each night of Lent and take turns reading them.

PRACTICE RANDOM ACTS OF KINDNESS: St. Joe's information desk has printed copies of some suggestionsstop by and pick up a list!

SERVE: Sign up for a session at Feed My Starving Children, babysit for a neighbor for free so tired parents can have a night off, sign up to be a greeting family one Sunday, or sign up to help serve at Loaves and Fishes.

GIVE: Go through your home and choose 40 things to donate. We all have too much stuff. Why not decrease your clutter and increase your good will to the world? Check out the needs list for Hope4Youth.org or Alexandrahouse.org, or Believe Guatemala on mystjoes.org. Another way to give is the annual Rice Bowl where you collect your change and return the bowl during Holy Week and it will go towards serving the poor.

SLOW DOWN: Take some time to read, listen to music, unplug, or go for a walk in the woods. Appreciate God's creation.

FAST: From swearing, from gossip... watch less TV... instead, reach out to 4 people a week through text, talk, a written note, or face to face and give them a compliment or share something about your life.

Video storytelling is something I believe in and have done for 20 years, in one form or another. While some may have been skeptical about including video and multimedia messaging in our Masses at first, I am proud to see folks ask why we don't have video announcements on a given weekend.

So what's next? Quite a bit actually! We're going to be adding a little more content to the announcements, in terms of faith sharing. Stay tuned to see what we mean by that – I think it's really going to add an element to the presentations that may reach even more people.

The easiest way to find how we produce the video announcements is to volunteer to read them.

We want you – and I know you can do it!

We're also very close to being able to add a third camera to the Worship Space production capabilities, and we'll be able to get closer to areas like the baptismal font and the choir for special presentations and events, including Holy Week celebrations and liturgies.

We hope you've noticed the addition of the recorded homilies from Frs. Mike and Ken on the St. Joe's website. In the future, we would like to be able to offer the video version as well. A few more clicks and kinks to work out, and that should happen.

The announcements and other videos we produce, as well as original programming like Café Jose are all currently playing on St. Joe's YouTube channel. Please be sure to check it out. We'll be adding videos of the homily in the future as well as more original content, including a brand-new segment called *Why Do We Do That?* which we hope will engage all members of the parish community and beyond.

The video programming and production aspects of what we're doing at St. Joe's is unique compared to many other Twin Cities parishes, and that's something for all of us to be proud of. I would love for more parishioners to be a part of this process! We are truly Changing Lives!





ST. JOE'S LIFELONG JOURNEY...THEN TIL NOW

We say "life is a journey." So too, St. Joseph of the Lakes Catholic Church has been on a journey for over 130 years. We know the beginning, but what about the end? Fortunately, there is no end. We are always evolving. Our mission statement: "Inspired by the Holy Spirit, we follow Jesus, worship God, serve others and spread the Good News." Our new vision statement: "We, the people of St. Joseph of the Lakes Catholic Church, as Christ's Body, strive to be the heart, hands and feet of Jesus Christ." You can see why we are still evolving – and our statements will continue to do so in the future.

We've had our trials, tribulations, and many goals set and reached over the years. Perseverance is in our blood.

In the late 1800s, as the population around our area grew, so did our membership. In the beginning, the people of the parish met in various nearby facilities and private homes. We were a mission church of St. Genevieve's of Centerville. Things began to quickly change as the parish boundaries grew in population and developed. Anxious to have our own church building, efforts were made to find land and raise money. Two acres of land were donated by a parishioner for the original church and cemetery. Parishioners each donated \$40 for materials, and the first church was completed in 1889. As time went on, more land was donated or purchased, giving us our current campus.

That first church was built of wood and was destroyed by a tornado in 1895. Not to be discouraged, we built a second church of stronger material on the same spot, completed in 1897. Eventually the membership grew to the point of needing a BIGGER church! *Praise God!* Besides the four Masses at the Historic Church, we rented space at Centennial Jr. High for two more Masses each Sunday.

It was determined that a minimum of \$1,263 in contributions each Sunday would be needed to fund the building of a facility to house the church and 8 rooms for an elementary school. Building a high school was in the long range plans. With that in mind, a gymnasium was built, which ended up being a "temporary" church (now known as the Great Hall). We moved into that church during Holy Week of 1963. The elementary school was opened in 1964, only to close in 1970. In between these years a convent was built for the nuns and a rectory for the priests.

Once again, in the middle 1980s, we had grown to the extent we needed a larger church and more space for meeting rooms and educational space. We were going to move out of our "temporary" church. *Praise God!* A research committee was formed to determine our current and future needs. With that information gleaned, a building committee was formed and a capital campaign drive was set in place. The new facilities cost \$4.3 million. The capital campaign had raised \$.8 million and a mortgage of \$3.5 million was obtained to cover the remaining costs. It was a very exciting time at St. Joe's Catholic Church.

And we're thrilled that the mortgage is now on target to be paid off by May, 2019!

SAN DAMIANO CROSS

Have you ever looked closely at our St Joe's procession cross? It has many interesting details!

This popular cross is known as the San Damiano Cross, which was in an abandoned run-down chapel in the town of San Damiano, near Assisi, Italy. Over 800 years ago, the young Saint Francis of Assisi knelt before this cross. As he prayed, our Lord miraculously spoke to him from the cross, telling him: "Francis, repair my Church." Francis answered that call, initially assuming that he was called to rebuild this and other nearby churches.

Over time, though, Francis came to understand that Christ desired that he build up the lives of God's people

through Christ. This evolved to the founding of the Order of Franciscans. Saint Francis of Assisi spent the remainder of his life devoted to leading Christians in returning to God and obedience to the Church.

The San Damiano Cross is an icon, probably painted some time during the 12th century by a Syrian monk. The original cross is quite heavy walnut wood, being 6'4" high and 4' wide and 5" thick. It is painted on cloth which had been glued to the wood.

The Risen Jesus

The Risen Jesus is the largest figure, looking directly at us with a compassionate gaze, regal, triumphant, and strong, radiating the hope of the Resurrection. He does not hang on the Cross, but rather His arms seem to be supporting it, standing in His full stature.

His wounds are present, though the nails and thorny crown are gone. Because He has conquered death, He is crowned with a halo, with the shape of the cross incorporated into His halo. Above the head of Christ is the inscription in Latin: "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews". The black background depicts the empty tomb. The seashells that frame the cross are symbols of eternity. The blood red indicates love and life, and the loincloth is the priestly garment worn after sacrifice.

The Hand of the Father

Within the semi-circle at the very top of the cross is the right hand of God is poised in benediction of His Son.

The hand of God shows two fingers up for the two natures, human and divine, and the three fingers down for the Trinity.

The Heavenly Welcome

Just under the hand of God, the Ascension is depicted.

On the top of the cross, one sees Jesus now fully clothed in His regal garments and carrying the golden cross as a triumphant scepter. He is climbing out of the tomb and into the heavenly courts. Ten angels are crowded around, five of whom have their hands extended in a welcoming gesture to Jesus, who has His hand raised in the form of a greeting.

The Astonished Angels

Six angels, gathered along the beam of the cross, are gesturing with their hands, suggesting that they are discussing the momentous event of Christ's Crucifixion, and calling us to marvel with them.

The Major Witnesses

The Major Witnesses are the five witnesses of the Crucifixion pictured standing below Christ's outstretched arms. On the left, we see Mary, Mother of Jesus, standing next to John, the Beloved. Jesus has handed His mother into John's care. On the right, we see Mary Magdalene and Mary Clopas, the mother of James. These four witnesses are saints and are therefore represented with halos. Their names are written beneath their pictures.

The final Major Witness is the centurion who proclaimed, "Truly this is the Son of God." Just beyond the centurion's shoulder, the face of his little boy who was healed by Jesus. Behind the boy are three more faces, thought to be the centurion's family who also accepted Jesus.

The Minor Witnesses

The Minor Witness are the smaller figures pictured on either side of the Major Witness. On the left stands the Roman soldier Longinus, holding the spear used to pierce Christ's side. On the right stands the Jewish temple guard Stephanos who is ready to offer Jesus his sponge soaked with vinegar wine. The blood running down the right and left forearms of Jesus begins at the elbows and drips straight down and will land on the upturned faces of Longinus and Stephanos.

The Rooster or Peacock

On the right side of the picture next to the left calf of Jesus, there is a small figure of a fowl. Some art historians have interpreted it to be a rooster, which recalls Peter's betrayal of Jesus as well as the new dawn of the Risen Christ and the hope it brings. Other commentators see it as a peacock, a frequent symbol of immortality in Early Christian art.

The Patron Saints of Umbria

Though debatable, the row of figures at the base of the cross are said to be the Patron Saints of Umbria. Scholars suggest the saints are Saint Damian, Saint Rufinus, Saint Michael, Saint John the Baptist, Saint Peter and Saint Paul.

The San Damiano Cross now hangs in the Basilica of Saint Clare (Basilica di Santa Chiara) in Assisi, Italy, with a replica in its original position in the church of San Damiano nearby.


MAKE & TAKE LENTEN LABYRINTH MARCH 9

Watch the TED talk by Shawn Achor.

He spoke about the Happiness Quotient – how our circumstances only make up about 10% of what makes us happy...50% is genetics, and 40% is our internal state of mind.

GRAND PIANO UPDATE

Thank you again to all of the donors who made the purchase of our new Grand Piano a reality. So many of you gave generously at the end of last year, and we are hoping to get the piano before Easter. Some may wonder why we couldn't just purchase a new piano outright, and have it delivered within a few weeks. The Grand Piano that we purchased is being built for us, at a much lower cost than purchasing a piano outright, thus the timeframe.

After we gave the vendor the go-ahead to rebuild the piano, it was refinished with an ebony black nitrocellulose finish and branded with the Steinway & Sons logo. At this point the keys were removed and sent to a piano key craftsman in California. He will make all new keys and top them with a product called Theran, this is a step up from the normal key tops and will have a similar feel to real ivory keys.

Next, the piano will be gutted and replaced with a soundboard, action, hammers, pin block, Steinway strings, and then the keys and key tops will be added.

Stay tuned...our new Grand Piano is a work in progress and will be a beautiful addition to our liturgies and other musical moments in the worship space.

RCIA

Each year at the Easter Vigil, the Church welcomes new converts to our faith through the process of RCIA.

What is RCIA?? It stands for Rite of Christian
Initiation for Adults. This is a process
by which someone who is not Catholic or
who has not received all of their initial sacraments
has the opportunity to more fully experience
what it means to be Catholic and how to
continue their journey of faith.

This process allows someone to peer into what the Church is, and provides an opportunity to discern if being Catholic is something that is for them. If you know anyone who is thinking about becoming Catholic, or just has questions about faith in general RCIA is a great tool!

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Just because someone initially starts RCIA doesn't mean they are fully committed to becoming Catholic. RCIA is a process to learn more about Catholicism to see if it is a right fit. It is usually around Lent that each individual discerns if they want to continue the process of RCIA to be fully initiated into the Church. During Lent, each individual will have certain blessings and more time for formation as they prepare to receive the Sacrament of Initiation.

MARCH 26, APRIL 2, 9, 16 9-10:30 AM OR 7-8:30 PM - ROOM 101/103


The prophets cry out to sinners to repent; the kings cry out encouragement to warriors; the apostles cry out salvation through Jesus.

St. Joe's and Believe Guatemala have been blessed to partner with Feed My Starving Children and last year we hit our 1,000,000 meal mark! It is such a rich experience to be able to share the love that's packed into that food with our Brothers and Sisters in the Guatemala City Dump. I have witnessed the tears on our mission trip team members as they hand the food out to a long and winding waiting line of people living in some of the most impoverished of circumstances.

What do we do on a mission trip?

We spend time with all the children at Believe, helping with tutoring and meals. We also create VBS style bible lessons and skits for the kids. High energy is always the name of the game – they love to sneak in a little soccer or basketball. As you get to know the kids throughout the week you become attached to their infectious spirit. There is nothing like having a small child slip their hand in yours and ask for your help with their schoolwork or an art project.

Life in the dump community is difficult, so we try to make it a little better by installing a cement floor, buying and delivering water filters to prevent illness from contaminated water, or distributing clothing, shoes, hygiene items and medical equipment to families. We may also visit an orphanage, schools or clinics, and even some homes.

Guatemala is a beautiful country, rich in coffee and cocoa farms, with mountains and lakes, tropical beauty, and a culture alive with color and spirit. We take time to get to know and appreciate Guatemala with a fun day which often includes some of our sponsor children so they can be exposed to life outside the dump, and so we can spend as much time as possible with them.

Listen to that voice inside that is nudging you or your kids towards a mission trip. It may well change your lives and your perspective on life. I can guarantee you will be blessed beyond measure.
