I can tell you that we used the St. Vincent Ferrer Chapel for the first time on Saturday for Loryn Richard Whittington's funeral, and while that was an overwhelming crowd for the burial, everyone who entered the chapel was impressed by it. As people from outside of the community asked the Port Vincent residents about the chapel, you could see how proud they were to say that it was theirs and it was made from pieces and parts of St. William. That made me very happy! So I'm excited about building the chapel in Head of Island, too.

Finally, I want to let you know that we have successfully established our St. Joseph Cemetery & Mausoleum Endowments at the Baton Rouge Area Foundation. We are in the process of moving our cemetery fund, the Our Lady of Perpetual Help fund, and the Guy and Mary Alice AydeU estate fund into one fund that will eventually provide perpetual income to maintain our three cemeteries. This is good news for our community since it costs roughly \$7,800 a year for us to cut the grass and do repairs in our cemeteries. Thanks to all who support our cemetery fund each month which helps us to do improvements as we have done in Head of Island this week.
