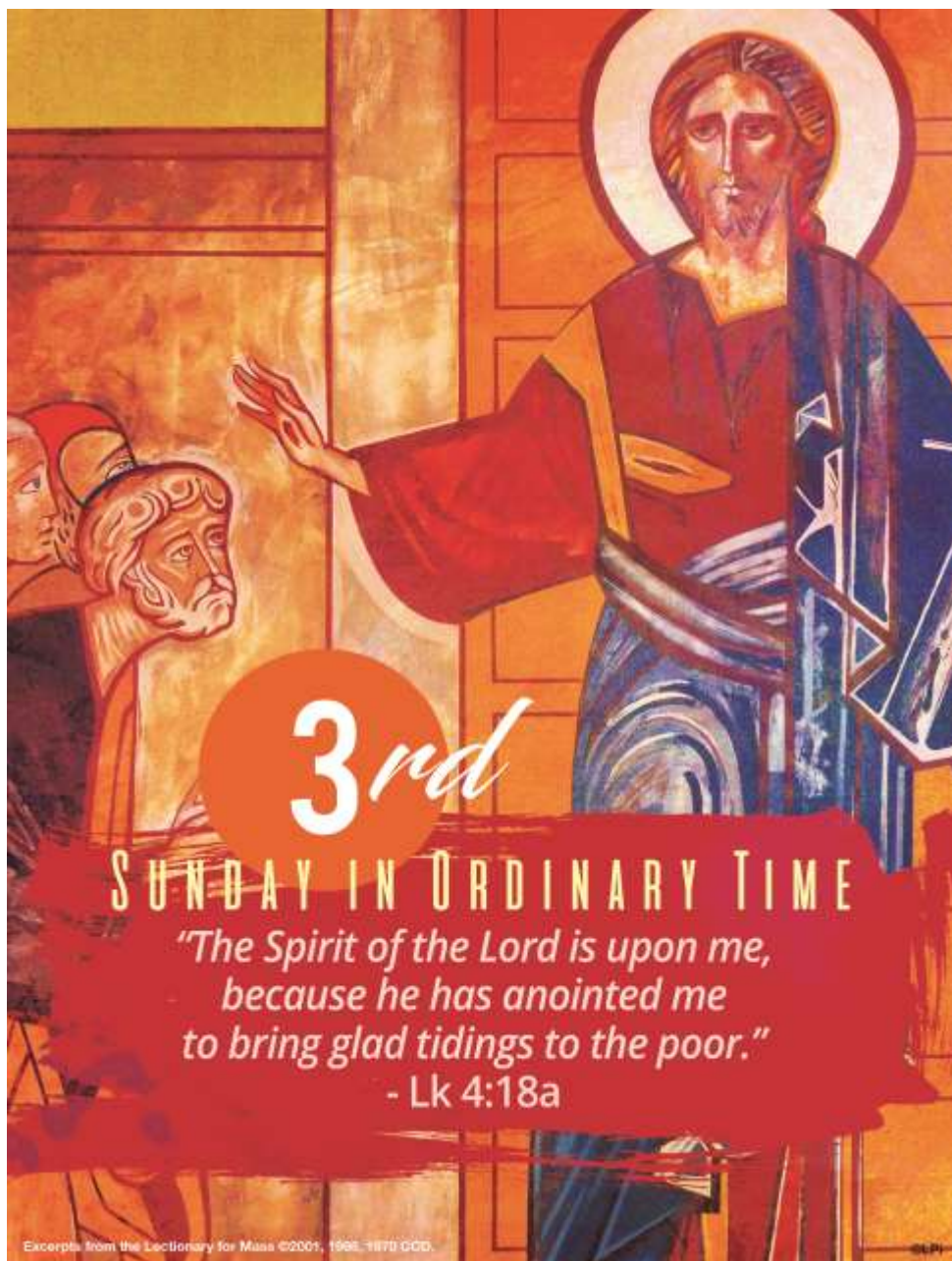

FR. ANTONIO'S CORNER



A Reflection for the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Prophet

"There was a wedding in Cana of Galilee." In a remote and unknown

village of Galilee called Nazareth, villagers gather in the synagogue on a Saturday morning to hear the Word of God. After a few years in the wilderness in search of God, Jesus returns to the town in which he grew up. This scene is very important in order to know Jesus and understand his mission.

According to Luke's account, Jesus makes his own official presentation, as a prophet of God,

in this almost unknown village, and it is in this village, that he makes known his own program, applying to himself the text of the prophet Isaiah. After reading the text, Jesus comments it with just on single sentence:

"Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

According to Luke, "the people's eyes were fixed on him." Everyone's attention moves from the read text to the person of Jesus. In today's situation, in this particular historical moment, what is it that which can make our gaze fix upon Him? Let us fix our eyes on some of the firing elements, which inspired the life of Jesus.

The Spirit of God

The breath, the love, and the power of God guided and inspired the entire life of Jesus. The very life of God. Jesus said, "I do what I see God does." It is not about the confession of a dogmatic Christological doctrine of Jesus developed by different Councils in the history of the Church. Fain in Jesus is about an existential appropriation and personalization of the tenderness and fire, the words and actions of Jesus, which, we believers call "God." This God is a mystery of life, which takes the form of a very concrete lifestyle, which each one of us

must try to find for ourselves.

Prophet of God

No one anointed Jesus with the holy olive oil, as kings used to be anointed in order to deliver the governing power or the high priests, which symbolized the empowerment of the sacred.

Rather, it was the very Spirit of God who "anointed" Jesus. Thus, Jesus was not to come to rule a nation nor the Sacred Temple. Jesus is the prophet of God, and as such, his mission is to heal the sick, restore sight to the blind and



to return to life the dead. Only, if we decide to live with his same prophetic spirit, will we be able to follow Him.

Good news for the poor

This was to be the heart of Jesus' mission.

His work in favor of the marginalized and destitute, of those in the margin of the society, in favor of those discarded by the financial, political and religious powers. To these despised people Jesus had Good News to announce, that they were the beloved children of God! To be like Jesus, means, then, that we must begin to live our lives, showing our love and solidarity with the poorest of the poor. This is not optional. It is a commandment.

Inviting all to Freedom

Jesus invites us all to come out from of all kinds of slavery. Jesus shows us the way to be free from all types of suffering, oppression and abuse. People felt Jesus as someone who could free them from meaninglessness and despair. The blind received new sight; sinners received grace and forgiveness. Restored dignity to all human beings.

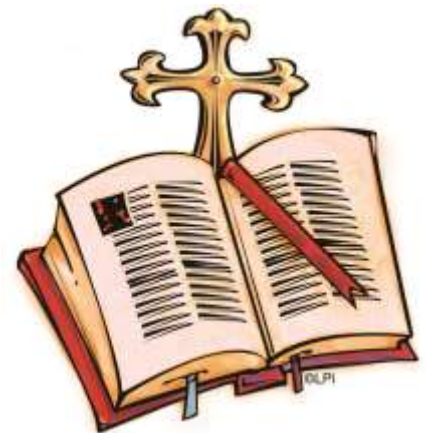

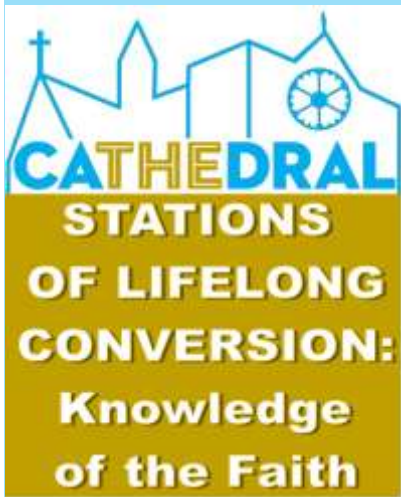

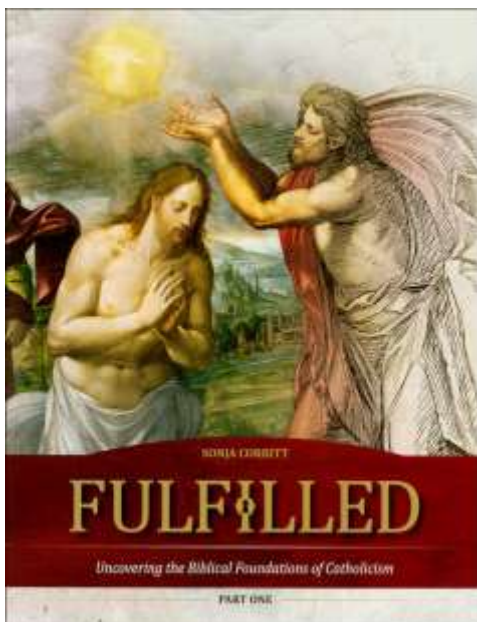

Según el relato de Lucas, Jesús hace su propia presentación oficial, como profeta de Dios, en esta aldea casi desconocida, y es en esta aldea donde da a conocer su propio programa, aplicando para sí el texto del profeta Isaías. Después de leer el texto, Jesús lo comenta con una sola frase: "Hoy, este pasaje de las Escrituras se cumple ante sus ojos".

Según Lucas, "los ojos de la gente estaban fijados en él". La atención de todos se mueve del texto leído a la persona de Jesús. En la situación de hoy, en este momento histórico particular, ¿qué es lo que puede hacer que nuestra mirada se fije en Él? Pongamos nuestros ojos en algunos de los elementos de fuego que inspiraron la vida de Jesús.

El Espíritu de Dios

El aliento, el amor y el poder de Dios guiaron e inspiraron toda la vida de Jesús. La vida misma de Dios. Jesús dijo: "Hago lo que veo

que Dios hace". No se trata de la confesión de una doctrina cristológica dogmática de Jesús desarrollada por diferentes Concilios en la historia de la Iglesia. Fe en Jesús es una apropiación y personalización existencial de la ternura y el fuego, las palabras y acciones de



Jesús, que los creyentes llamamos "Dios". Este Dios es un misterio de la vida, que toma la forma de un estilo de vida muy concreto que cada uno de nosotros debe tratar de hacer carne en nosotros mismos.

Profeta de Dios

Nadie ungió a Jesús con el santo aceite de oliva, como solían ungir los reyes para entregar el poder gobernante o los sumos sacerdotes, que simbolizaban el poder de lo sagrado. Más bien, fue el mismo Espíritu de Dios quien "ungió" a Jesús. Por lo tanto, Jesús no venía a gobernar una nación ni el Templo Sagrado. Jesús es el profeta de Dios,

y como tal, su misión es curar a los enfermos, devolverles la vista a los ciegos y devolverles la vida a los muertos. Solo, si decidimos vivir con su mismo espíritu profético, podremos seguirlo.

Buenas noticias para los pobres.

Este iba a ser el corazón de la misión de Jesús. Su trabajo a favor de los marginados e indigentes, de los que se encuentran en el margen de la sociedad, a favor de los descartados por los poderes financieros, políticos y religiosos. ¡A estas personas despreciadas, Jesús tuvo buenas noticias que anunciar, que eran los hijos amados de Dios! Ser como Jesús significa, entonces, que debemos comenzar a vivir nuestras vidas, mostrando nuestro amor y solidaridad con los más pobres entre los pobres. Esto no es opcional. Es un mandamiento.

Invitando a todos a la libertad

Jesús nos invita a todos a salir de todo tipo de esclavitud. Jesús nos muestra el camino para liberarnos de todo tipo de sufrimiento, opresión y abuso. La gente sentía a Jesús como alguien que podía liberarlos de la falta de sentido y la desesperación. Los ciegos recibieron nueva vista; Los pecadores recibieron gracia y perdón. Dignidad restaurada a todos los seres humanos.

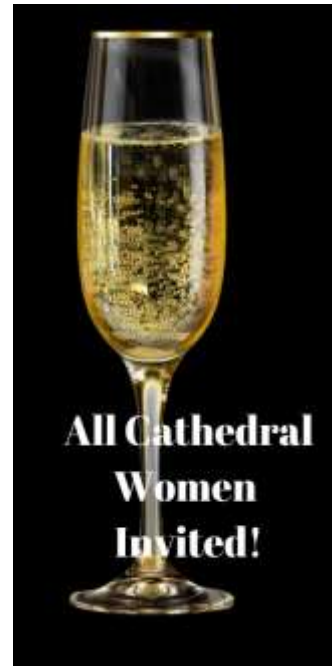
