Reflecting on God's Word

It is an ancient tradition in the Church to commemorate saints on the anniversary of their death because that was the day on which they were born into eternal life. We celebrate the same reality in our funeral liturgies and on the anniversaries of the death of our own loved ones. In Mary's case, her "birthday" has been celebrated on August 15 for approximately fifteen hundred years.

Throughout most of that time, theologians commonly thought that both Mary's body and her soul were taken up into glory. This is the same glory that we believe all Christians await on the last day. Her perfect cooperation with God in her lifetime and her honored place as mother of the Messiah made her the first to enjoy the fullness of the Resurrection. In answer to a century of calls to proclaim this opinion as a doctrine of the Church, Pope Pius XII defined Mary's assumption as doctrine in 1950.

NOTES ON STEWARDSHIP

In today's Gospel we hear Mary's cousin, Elizabeth, bestow the gift of two blessings on Mary when she greets her. Elizabeth blesses Mary not only because she believes that Mary is the mother of the Lord, but also because she recognizes that Mary has complete faith in God's promise. When Elizabeth prophetically pronounces Mary "blessed...among women" and proclaims that the fruit of Mary's womb is blessed, she uses the same term Jesus uses to bless people in the Beatitudes. Good stewards recognize the Spirit-driven love and courage that inspired Elizabeth's hospitality toward a young, unmarried, pregnant woman and the honor Elizabeth bestowed upon Mary who would ordinarily be shamed for bearing this child. In what ways can we extend the blessings we receive in the Eucharistic celebration to others in order to honor them and offer them God's hospitality?" International Catholic Stewardship Council

PREPARING A PLACE FOR MARY

In the Catholic tradition we believe that God accepted Mary, body and soul, into heaven. Just as a leader might assume a place at the head of a room, Mary's assumption establishes her as our queen and mother.

The Bible never tells how Mary died. According to a legend, at the end of her life all the apostles were miraculously transported to her side. They gathered around and prayed for her. Then Mary was taken up to her son, who was waiting to have her at his side. You sometimes see images of Mary's assumption showing the apostles gathered on earth, looking up. You may also see images of Mary resting in the arms of her son at the end of her life, just as she held him at the beginning of his.

Although the Bible does not tell of Mary's death, St. Paul says to the Corinthians that we will all be raised up in Christ. "For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order." Jesus, of course, was the first to rise from the dead. But our tradition holds that his mother followed, in proper order.

Our faith in Christ is strong. We believe he is risen and has assumed his place as head over all. In Mary's assumption Christ shows us he prepares a place for all who believe.

DIOCESE OF HONOLULU WITNESS TO JESUS

COMMUNITY OF HOPE

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Jesus was born homeless. It wasn't his foster father Joseph's fault. He just ran into a confluence of circumstances. A government-ordered census. An overbooked inn. A pregnancy come to term. Nightfall. Even the son of God was subject to natural and human-made situations. Amazing, no? You'd think the Father would have planned better. Jesus would later say, "Foxes have dens and birds have nests, but the Son of Man has no place to lay his head."

I can imagine Jesus and the Twelve hunkering down for the night on the side of the road to Galilee, or sleeping in their boats, as he was once recorded doing.

Our own homeless who inhabit our beaches and byways often find themselves in their predicament because of their own perfect storms. A mental illness. A lost job. A drug addiction. A debilitating injury. Exorbitant housing prices. A chronic disease. Simple bad luck.

You would hope that God could give them a break and show a little mercy. But that is where we come in. It is our duty to house them, our obligation. Because we are supposed to be vessels of God's mercy. Because housing is a basic human right.

It is difficult to see Jesus in the unwashed, mentally ill, drug-addicted street dweller, or the family living in their car, but that's him, he is there, as he said, in the least of our brothers and sisters.

The world exists for everybody," Pope Francis says in his encyclical Fratelli Tutti, "because all of us were born with the same dignity As a community, we have the obligation to ensure that every person live with dignity.

St. Gregory the Great said, "When we provide the needy with their basic needs, we are giving them what belongs to them, not to us."

Living with dignity at the very least means having a decent, safe, affordable place to sleep, eat and keep clean. Not the street.

But homelessness is such a huge and complex problem, we can feel powerless to do anything about it. We cannot always literally put a roof over someone's head. Like the Good Samaritan, our charity is often limited to what we can do with our two hands and how much we have in our wallet. But the Good Samaritan was also a pragmatic Samaritan. He left the robbery victim with an innkeeper who could provide shelter and sustenance, promising to cover the costs.

Catholic Charities Hawaii is the innkeeper. With our donations, it houses people, feeds them, supports them, accompanies and dignifies them, and puts them on the road to recovery.

The homeless need our help. Catholic Charities will provide it. But Catholic Charities can only give what it receives.

This Catholic Charities Sunday, please be generous.
