Reflecting on God's Word

In today's Gospel, Mark says that the invitation to journey to a new and different shore comes from Jesus. He is the one who suggests, "Let us cross to the other side" (Mark 4:35). Yet that invitation comes as evening draws on, as so often happens in life. It comes amid the shadows of life where clarity of action is seldom sharp or distinct. Then to step into the boat is indeed an act of faith. Who would ever choose a crossing at such a time? Yet it was "as evening drew on" that Jesus said to his disciples, "Let us cross to the other side." And so they go.

It is at this point that they take Jesus into their boat, which is always what is expected of the disciple—that the Lord be invited on the journey, and that the journey to the other side be made together. The Jesus story ends in calm and stillness, but that is not its promise. What is assured is that faith can bring one to the other side, which is also the assurance given to Job out of the storm—that it is God who made the thick darkness and put limits on the sea, all along knowing its ability to burst forth. It is God who knows creation and is in control, it is Jesus who knows the human journey and accompanies us, and it is faith that sustains us in the midst of storms.

ALIVE FOR CHRIST

If we lived for ourselves, we would give little thought to others. We would spend only on our own desires and not on the needs of others. We would limit family activities to the ones we enjoy. We would not give away money or possessions beyond the deductions that lower our taxes. We would build up the economy at home, even if it meant that people abroad starved or suffered from AIDS. Living for ourselves would be costly to others.

Paul says we should live for Christ. People in his day were sadly living for themselves. In Paul's view, they were "dead." Yes, they were breathing, but they were morally dead. Paul said Christ died for all in order to bring life to those who had died. Yes, he would bring eternal life to the physically dead, but Christ would also bring interior life to the morally dead.

If we live for Christ, we will live for others. We will think not just of ourselves but of the whole community. We will care about our neighbor, our municipality, and all the countries of the world. We will pay the taxes that improve life for others. We will lay down weapons that impoverish and kill. We will think differently about how we live.

"Whoever is in Christ is a new creation," Paul says. "The old things have passed away; behold, new things have come." We live for others. We live for Christ.

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NOTES ON STEWARDSHIP

In today's Gospel, we listen to Jesus' disciples crying out in fear of a great storm. Their cry echoes the cries of people around the world during the pandemic. It is the ultimate cry of fear, doubt and abandonment. It is a parable of the situation of all of us when cast adrift in the storms of our lives, seemingly without God's presence and care. But God is with us. Jesus does calm the storm of his disciples. Good stewards have faith that they do not live in a world where they should live in fear and chaos, seeing themselves alone and abandoned by God. Reflect this week on your own faith in the promises of Jesus. Do you believe Jesus is in our midst and can calm the storms in our lives? International Catholic Stewardship Council
