

Here's another line of thought for our consideration, the last line of the first reading: "The LORD's power shall be known to his servants." That's us. The Lord's power is expressed, not in destruction, but in nourishment and warm comfort. We are the fortunate receivers of this kind of power. The line is the summary of a snippet in which Isaiah gives us an image of the city of Jerusalem as a nursing, comforting mother. Just knowing this lifts up the heart, makes the body grow. This is how the Lord's power is made manifest to Israel and to us. In today's Gospel, Jesus sends seventy-two disciples out two by two. Where they will first go, he will follow. This is the opposite of what we usually think of when we think of disciples. The teacher normally goes first and the disciples follow. This is the order of missionary work—to continue the work the master has set out for them. But not in today's reading. Today, the disciples prepare the way for the master, who will come later.

Their own preparation is brief and to the point. They will go as sheep among wolves. That in itself seems to be a heart-stopper. Given this caution, the disciples might be expected to ask what defense they have. None, apparently. They are not to visit the unsuspecting population with messages and warnings. They are not to go well armed with thought-out arguments or skills of oratory and debate. They are to move about the countryside empty-handed and barefoot. They are to carry no supplies. They are to go as people expecting to be received. They are to knock on a door, any door. They are to wish the householder peace, shalom, God's healing salvation. They are to share in the hospitality offered them—no more, no less. This, Jesus seems to imply, is the setting in which miracles can happen. The house of peace and generosity of spirit is precisely the place of God's saving presence. It hasn't to do with fine foods, aged wine, or a well-lit and warm room. It has to do with generosity of spirit and vulnerability.

NOTE ON STEWARDSHIP


In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus inviting his disciples to be evangelizers. "The harvest is abundant," Jesus says. But those who are willing to invite others to a deeper relationship with the Lord are few. Good stewards who are willing to witness their Catholic faith to others know they are "like lambs among wolves." They are encouraged to be gentle, patient and loving, knowing they may face rejection and even fierce opposition. Jesus invites us to be better stewards of our faith, to give positive, courageous, joyful witness to others who have turned away from their relationship with him. Reflection

It is always this way. With this attitude, we Christians can expect the good times to roll. When the door of our heart swings open, salvation begins. We are healed, darkness is cast out, malice crashes headlong to the earth, poisons are counteracted. This is God's salvation right at the door. This is God's power, manifest in comfort and nourishment. This is what being created anew feels and acts and looks like. The closing lines of Paul's letter to the Galatians are an impassioned plea. He opens his heart and bares his soul—for their sake. He has no shield or sword here. He is vulnerable. The word comes from the Latin word meaning "to wound." Paul is willing to be wounded. Indeed, he has been. He has his own unnamed weakness and scars to prove it. This doesn't matter, and it doesn't stand in the way of his ministry.
