

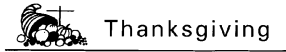

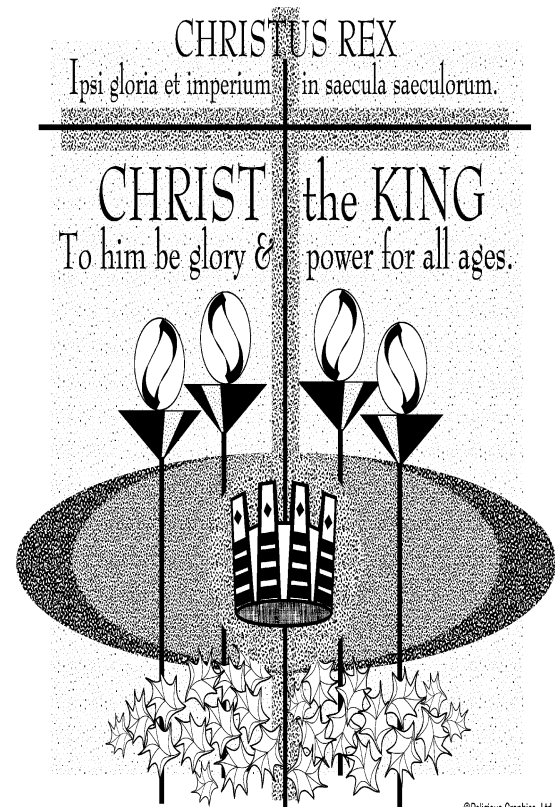

Reflection

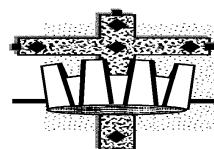
We might ask, why this difficult Gospel? Is this the Church's idea of saving the best story until last? Here is God's chosen one, right here, stretched between heaven and earth. He is surrounded by second-rate rulers who jeer and swagger so knowingly. And here is one criminal who wants to get off easy, a con man to the last. And here is the other, the unnamed one, the one who uses the precious little energy and time he has left to seek repentance. What does he see in Jesus?

Apparently, he sees a king, a Messiah, a righteous one. The thief stands in sharp contrast to rest of the hangers-on Luke mentions. The thief asks to share in the reign of God, a reign that is not geographical. Jesus spoke about this earlier in his public life: "The coming of the kingdom of God cannot be observed, and no one will announce, 'Look, here it is,' or, 'There it is.' For behold, the kingdom of God is among you." (Luke 17:20-21) This unlikely place is not God-forsaken—just the opposite. It is God's power manifest, and the thief is the first to see it. He is already home. "This day" he is in paradise, the place of the just.

One cannot get any more inclusive than this. The one outside the walls of Jerusalem, outside the civic laws of Rome, presumably without friend or family, is offered a share in royalty. The all-inclusiveness of Jesus' pardon of this man tells us what we need to know about the dimensions of the reign of God. NOTE ON STEWARDSHIP

In today's Gospel we hear of the rulers who sneered at Jesus, the soldiers who jeered at him, the criminal who reviled him, and the people who just stood by. At our own parish church the cross stands high. Yet, every Sunday there are those who sit in front of it and are not moved by it. There are people who walk right by the cross, unmoved by it. Perhaps they've walked by it so many times they no longer give it a second thought. Could it be they are unmoved because the heart of this unbelieving thief is in them? Good stewards walk by the cross, notice it and ask themselves: "All this you did for me, what have I done for you?" (International Catholic Stewardship Council)

That is what Estelle Hijirida did. St. Rita received \$183,629.60 for the building fund this past week from her estate. We are truly grateful.

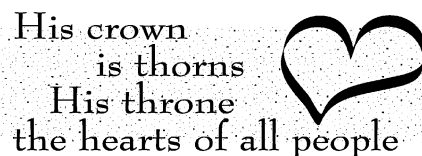
Jesus is a descendant of the second and greatest king of Israel, David. The first reading reminds us of this royal lineage. David inherited a divided kingdom. In today's reading, he is anointed by the elders of the northern kingdom, Israel. He had already been anointed in the southern kingdom, Judah.

This man, the Lord's anointed, would restore the two kingdoms' faithfulness to their one God. He would bring them back to their former glory, lost during the irresponsible and troubled leadership of Saul.

David would go on to move the capital from Hebron to Jerusalem, and his power would express itself in relative peace and solidarity. His reign is a high point in the history of God's people. However, in the centuries that followed, the kingdoms would finally divide. The people would be exiled to Babylon. They would return and rebuild, only to be conquered again by the Greeks and, finally, the Romans. Then in the fullness of time in the town of David, a child would be born. And in Jerusalem some thirty-odd years later, that child would be crucified and above his head the inscription would read, "This is the king of the Jews."
