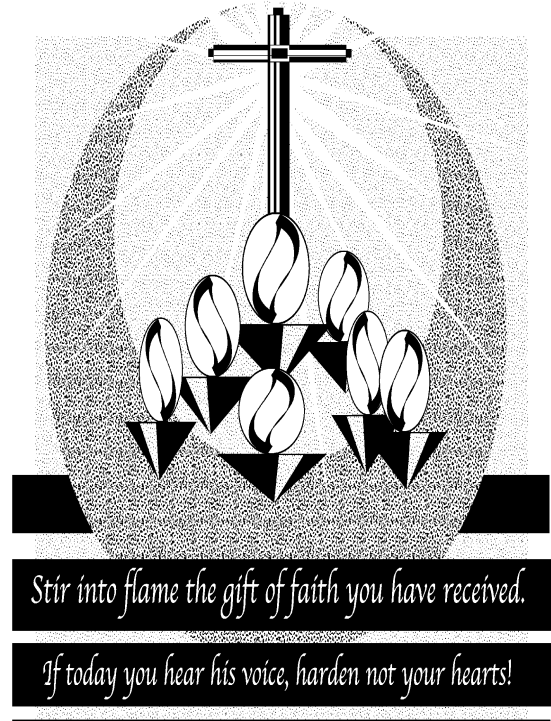

REFLECTION

As Church, today's readings are calls to self-examination. We may be proud that our doctrine is pure. But we must never forget that no doctrine is perfect. We are right to maintain that our mission is mighty, but wrong to presume it's almighty. We can treasure our traditions, declaring them worthy of respect. But we must never forget that they are not worthy of worship.

As Church, we have no meaning without Jesus the Christ, no power without his Spirit. All who minister in the Church do so at the service of the person who is Jesus Christ. Their function, therefore, is to represent the event and the person of Jesus Christ until time is no more. When faith is strong, it will be mountain-moving, and the representation will be vivid, passionate, and appealing. It will have beauty and aptness and the quiet melody of the holy. There will be small emphasis on law. There will be the felt magnetism of love.

Even when faith is weak, the re-presentation will continue. For although the Spirit can be quelled, it cannot be quenched. Still, the Church that turns inward, seeking status, prestige, and self-preservation, will be a creative re-presentation no longer. It will not speak the Good News with the eloquence of conviction born of love. Instead, the accent will rest on law and obligation. 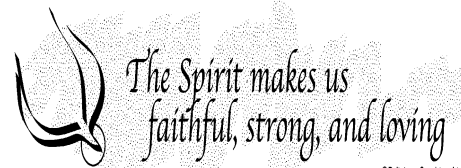

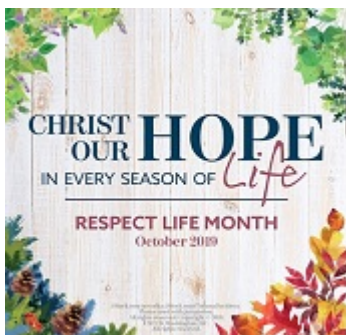

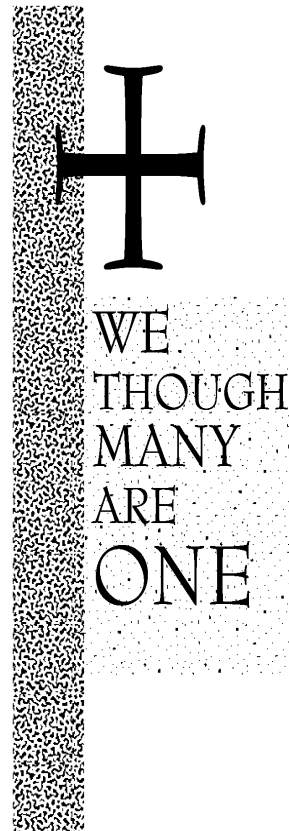
NOTE ON STEWARDSHIP

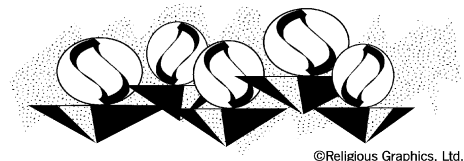
Mountain-Moving Faith

Jesus seems to be thinking ahead to our time and situation when he speaks in today's Gospel. Jesus assumed that his followers would be tempted in every way, and he was right. But Jesus also foresaw the possibility that the faith of his followers would come unraveled when he was no longer physically present. He knew that we would be tempted to pride and privilege when what he expected of us (especially those of us in authority) was quality service within the community. Like the apostles in the Gospel, we don't want to let our faith sag. Instead, we need to pull ourselves together, ask the Lord to increase our faith, and realize that mountains need moving.

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
