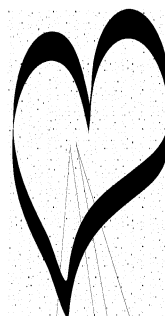

New life in Christ means being a living testament to this joy that is within you. New life is choosing what keeps us in right relationship with God. Even when it means being placed inside a fiery furnace.

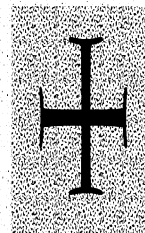

NOTE ON STEWARDSHIP

When the risen Christ encounters his disciples in the locked room he adds a new Beatitude to the ones we've heard proclaimed before: "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Stewards of the mysteries of God's love do not need proof of the risen Christ. They know it because their lives have been transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit who has breathed new life into them and through the Sacrament of the Eucharist which strengthens and sustains them. As stewards of this great gift it is appropriate to reflect on how we in turn add new life into our parish communities. (**International Catholic Stewardship Council~e-bulletin**)

Reflection

Any artist who has ever painted a picture or created a sculpture of the risen Lord owes a debt to "doubting Thomas." Thomas wanted an absolutely clear image of the risen Lord; he wanted to see and touch the wounds of Christ. Ever since, artists have been in sync with Thomas' visual and tactile demands and have provided us with such images. Even so, the image of the "wounded" Lord is not simply a matter of artistic representation or taste. It is, rather, a matter of faith. Lacking those wounds, the risen Lord is not the crucified Lord. Thomas has helped artists and all the rest of us recognize that before a resurrection, there comes a death. Thomas has helped us feel in our bones that our God is a God who takes human suffering seriously and out of it—even out of its seeming meaninglessness—can bring wondrous significance and new life.

The risen Lord whom Thomas demanded to behold and examine is the only Lord worth believing in. That Lord wears the wounds of death yet promises the healing of life. That Lord assures us that our faith in him is not misplaced, that hope in him will be fulfilled, and that loving him even in suffering is what resurrected life is all about.

Resurrection Faith

When daffodils and crocuses crowd the garden walk, when the sun breaks over a clear spring morn, when all around is blossoming or in bloom, it's almost too easy to believe in the goodness of life, in the resurrection of the world. But when a child dies at the hands of an abuser, a family suffers the loss of a farm it has long tended, or a whole people become victims of human greed and cruelty, we wonder. How can this happen? How can God allow this to happen? How can we believe in resurrection with all these "deaths" around us? Resurrection faith demands such belief. Resurrection faith calls our attention to the fact that life comes out of death. There, in the passage from death to life, we encounter the risen Lord. The sign of Easter and its abiding joy is not the lily, not the newborn babe, but the empty tomb. A sign of meaninglessness, death, and contradiction, yes.
