Most of us Catholic Christians know and love the quote attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, "Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words if necessary"

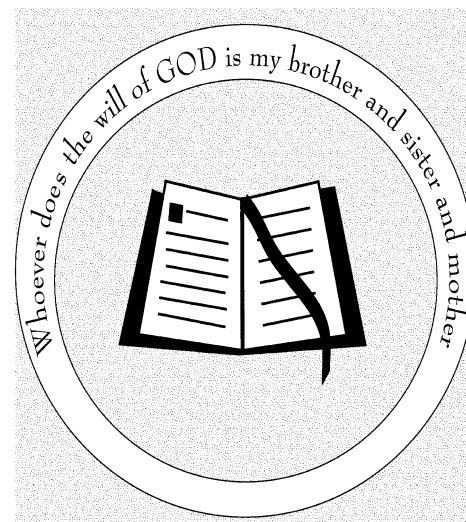

NOTE ON STEWARDSHIP

In today's second reading Saint Paul argues that a community's journey of faith culminates in the thanksgiving expressed in the Eucharistic meal, when the bread is broken, the cup of salvation is lifted up and the covenant with Christ is affirmed. In fact, he maintains that the entire community's "inner nature" is constantly being renewed in hope through this thanksgiving meal. Good stewards understand that the weekly celebration of the Eucharist is a communal gesture by which the gathered community reveals its faith and hope in the risen Lord. Moreover, that it is a profound communal act of faith that Christ is present and active in the world at this moment. Given that understanding, what responsibilities do we take on to lift up the faith of our community? What part do we play in giving it hope? (International Catholic Stewardship Council~e-bulletin)

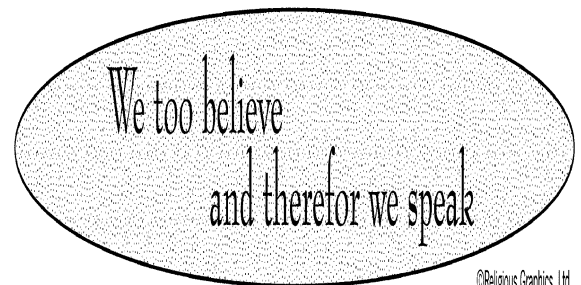
