LIVING CATHOLIC IN THE 808

For the Apostles, didn't Confirmation Come AFTER 1ST Communion?

Last week I began answering a question from one of our parishioners: didn't Confirmation come third in order for the Apostles, since they experienced Pentecost/Confirmation AFTER the Last Supper, aka, First Communion?

*What a question! In terms of biblical events, when you look at Jesus' baptism in the Jordan by St. John the Baptist, you see it connected not just to Baptism but also to Confirmation. Jesus is baptized in water and then when he comes out of the water, the Holy Spirit comes down upon him like a dove and the voice of God the Father is heard (God the Father **confirms** Jesus' baptism by the gift of the Spirit and his words.) Here you see the intimate connection between Baptism and Confirmation.*

*You are correct to associate Confirmation with Pentecost as well. But here the connection is between the death and resurrection of Jesus (which we **experience** in Baptism and which we **celebrate** at Easter) and the coming of the Spirit of Pentecost (which we **experience** in Confirmation and which we **celebrate** on the 50th and the last day of the Easter season). Baptism begins the Easter season, and Confirmation concludes the Easter season. Again the intimate connection between Baptism and Confirmation seen.*

I'll continue expanding on this issue in one final way next week.

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NOTES ON STEWARDSHIP

From and early age, we tend to distort the concept of “fairness”: “I am good. I deserve good things. I am not receiving good things. Something must be wrong. Who’s going to fix I?” We also know the age-old expression: “Who ever said life was fair?” Jesus knew this expression when he offered his parable in today’s Gospel reading. Christian stewards acknowledge, with humility, that they receive good things from the Lord in abundance; even if these gifts are not the ones they think they need when they need them. Consider which servants you identify with most in the most in the Gospel reading, the ones who demand “fairness”, or that final servant who, seemingly, deserves the least.

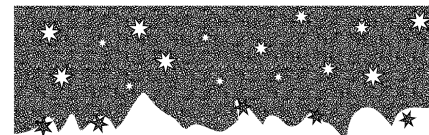

STANDING IDLE

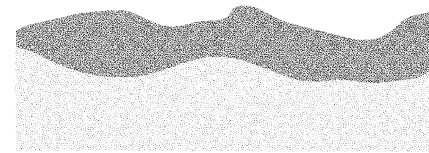
Today’s Gospel probably leaves those of us with a strong business sense scratching our heads in confusion. What would possess any boss to pay the same wages to a person who worked only a few minutes as someone who worked a full day? This parable calls us to dig deeper into the reality to which the story points. Consider the actions of the landowner. He goes out in search of laborers a total of five times during the day: at dawn, at nine, at twelve, at three, and at five. In this parable, Jesus summons us to consider the landowner’s actions as the kind of actions our God performs. In our lives we each have moments of standing idle, like the people in today’s parable. God is always on the prowl for us, inviting us into the vineyard. God’s persistence is immeasurable. Whether we respond at the dawn of life or at the “five o’clock” of our lives, God’s love and mercy are still showered upon us.

ARE YOU SAVED?

When I was in high school my best friend became “born again.” He carried a small blue card in his wallet. On that card was written the exact date that he was “saved.” Knowing that I had been raised in the Roman Catholic Church, he asked me, “What day were you saved?” I told him that I was saved the day I was baptized and that I honestly expected to keep getting saved, I hoped, many more times for the rest of my life. A spiritual mentor once told me to expect to be born again, and again, and again, and again. Today’s Gospel reminds us that even when we stray, when we become complacent about God’s tremendous action in our lives, God still calls us back into a loving relationship. Perhaps it is at those times when we stand idle that God hounds us all the more, summoning us into the vineyard of new life, new possibilities, and renewed hope.
