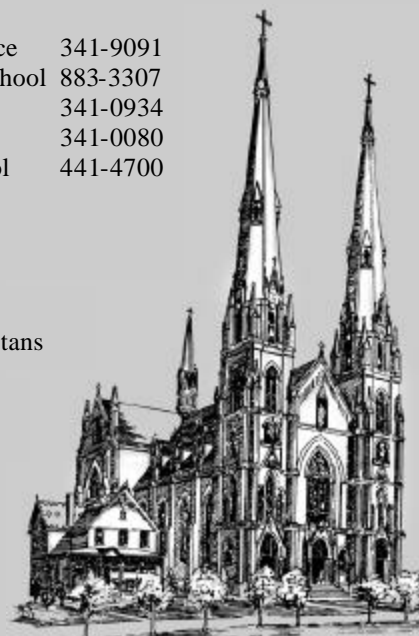

So, would you rather be rich and miserable or poor and miserable? To what extremes would you go to acquire those "necessities" of life as the hundred-foot cruiser or the thousand-acre ranch or the million dollar painting or the hundred dollar tennis shoes? If your neighbor has any of those things, does it bug you to no end? People have killed others for all of the above and continue to do the same, whether or not they ever acquire those highly desirable treasures themselves.

### You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

As the book of Wisdom points out, "Through the devil's envy death entered the world." The apple shared by our first parents was the beginning. The pair of \$100 tennis shoes or \$1M boat are simply the ongoing drama of the human condition, simply more roadblocks to be encountered on the path to finding happiness, the path which leads to eternal life, to God. Other's possessions, their "stuff," will never aid any one of us on that path. Envy of those people, whether of their things, their way of life or their position in the world will only result in more evil.

St. Francis tried to set an example of liberation from this type of sin. Any of you lucky enough to have participated in last week's *Transitus* would have heard the accounts of Francis' divorce from the world and his marriage to something so much greater, his journey at an end, finally being taken into the bosom of Sister Death. He didn't arrive to that destination on a yacht. He wore no fancy tennis shoes. He wanted to meet Sister Death wearing nothing, but obeyed his superior and was covered with a robe. The detachment from possessions, from things, from detours, made his path clearer. It can work the same way for all of us.

**CALL THE COPS**

Last weekend we celebrated our culture and community with the most successful parish Polish Festival ever. Over ten thousand meals were served to thousands of visitors, who came from all over northern Ohio — and beyond. What a marvelous testimony to the strengths of our parish and community!

In his column last week, Fr. William described the many positive things going on to revitalize our neighborhood. We can be proud that St. Stanislaus has been a catalyst for much of this through the efforts of the *Pulaski Franciscan Community Development Corporation*. This is funded separately from parish finances — not a dime of parish money is mixed in with this project. Yet the *PFCD* has been able to

acquire control over dozens of properties, has built or sold four new homes, brought three new businesses into the neighborhood, provides quality moderately priced rentals, has done some renovation and restoration of historic structures, has beautified 65th Street with flower baskets, and has been able to improve the overall quality of life here in the St. Stanislaus neighborhood.

We are sure that our many guests last weekend were impressed with the improvements they saw. Yet those of us who live here are aware that much remains to be done. This is not a bad neighborhood with a few bright spots — it is a good neighborhood with a few bad spots. We know where they are, and we can deal with them before they get out of hand. Yet, when we confront the authorities about some of the issues, they say that nothing seems to be wrong. Where do they get that idea? ***Because hardly anyone reports when things go wrong!***

One of the great strengths of this neighborhood has been the high level of involvement of residents in the life of the community. Neighborhood block clubs are abundant — and effective. People watch out for each other, and they recognize unusual activity very quickly. Also, Polish people are famously stubborn! We have a kind of ethos that insists, we are not going to be pushed around.

But we have got to get back on the stick here, folks. If the police say there is nothing being reported, then we have to do our job and make the calls. Call for everything! Even if it takes a while for the police to come, and even if there is nothing they can do to solve the incident we bring to them — at least there is a report. And lots of reports lead to more police coverage, which leads to better enforcement, which leads to better quality of life.

In this week's bulletin is a list of phone numbers to call whenever you see something amiss in the neighborhood. Cut it out, and keep it handy. Don't hesitate to call when you need to report something. It is a way to fight back and not feel so powerless. This is our neighborhood, our home, and we have the right and duty to keep it solid and attractive. People are happy to live here, and more people are looking forward to making their homes with us. Let's all do our part! **Fr. Michael**

**24 LATA PONTYFIKATU**

W tym tygodniu, 16 października minie 24 lata od momentu, kiedy świat obiegła ogromnie zaskakująca wiadomość: 111-osobowe konklawe kardynałów wybrało metropolitę krakowskiego - kardynała Karola Wojtyłę na papieża. Po raz pierwszy od 456 lat na Stolicy Piotrowej zasiadł biskup nie Włoch, na dodatek przedstawiciel słowiańskiego kraju, który w tamtym czasie należał jeszcze do bloku sowieckiego. Niektórym trudno było uwierzyć, inni podchodzili do tego z wyczekiwaniem, jeszcze inni z wielką nadzieją. 24 lata pontyfikatu Jana Pawła II w pełni potwierdziły słuszność wyboru. Cokolwiek by nie napisać w tym momencie o tej wielkiej osobowości świata, będzie niewystarczające. Chyba najważniejszym, dzisiaj, będzie przypomnieć najważniejsze wydarzenia z życia Wielkiego Rodaka.

Karol Wojtyła urodził się 18 maja 1920 r. w podkrakowskich Wadowicach. W wieku 9-ciu lat stracił matkę — Emilię z Kaczorowskich. Po uzyskaniu gimnazjalnego świadectwa dojrzałości, w 1938 r. przeniósł się wraz z ojcem do Krakowa, gdzie rozpoczął studia polonistyczne na Uniwersytecie Jagiellońskim. Wojna przerwała jego naukę, musiał rozpocząć pracę jako robotnik w kamieniołomach. W 1941 r. zmarł ojciec, a Karol rok później wstąpił do konspiracyjnego Seminarium Duchownego w Krakowie. Od 1 sierpnia 1944 r. do 18 stycznia 1945 r. ukrywał się wraz z kolegami w pałacu kardynała Sefana Sapięhy.

1 listopada 1946 r. otrzymał święcenia kapłańskie. Przez kolejne dwa lata kontynuował studia filozoficzne w Rzymie. Po powrocie do kraju był wikariuszem najpierw w Niegowici, a później w parafii św. Floriana w Krakowie. W 1948 r. obronił swoją pracę doktorską, by w pięć lat później habilitować się w Uniwersytecie Jagiellońskim. W tym czasie też pisze sztukę teatralną "Brat naszego Boga" - o Adamie Chmielowskim. W 1954 r. rozpoczął pracę naukową w Katolickim Uniwersytecie Lubelskim; szybko zostaje kierownikiem Katedry i Zakładu Etyki. Na pełnym etacie wykładowcy tej uczelni pracował od 1958 r. aż do wyboru na papieża. W 1958 r. papież Pius XII mianował go pomocniczym biskupem krakowskim; w wieku 38 lat został najmłodszym członkiem Episkopatu Polski. W 1963 r. został mianowany przez papieża Pawła VI arcybiskupem metropolitą Krakowa, zaś w 1967 r. otrzymał kapelusze kardynalski. Pełnił wiele odpowiedzialnych funkcji w Episkopacie Polski, równocześnie był też członkiem kilku watykańskich kongregacji.

Jesienią 1969 r. kard. Wojtyła odbył półtoramiesięczną podróż po Kanadzie i Stanach Zjednoczonych; wówczas to gościł również w parafii św. Stanisława w Cleveland.

Prze cały ten czas intensywnie pracuje naukowo, czego owocem jest wiele dzieł z zakresu etyki ("Miłość i odpowiedzialność" oraz "Osoba i czyn" - to najbardziej znane).

W czasie trwania Soboru Watykańskiego II kard. Wojtyła bierze aktywny udział w jego pracach (nieoficjalnie mówi się, że jest on autorem wielu dokumentów soborowych).

W 1976 r. specjalnie zaproszony przez papieża poprowadził doroczne rekolekcje w Watykanie. W dwa lata później zostaje już na stałe na Stolicy Piotrowej jako 264 z kolei zwierzchnik Kościoła. **Dokończenie - za tydzień. ks. Jerzy**
