Red Chimney, neighborhood treasure was down but not out BY ROB JAGELEWSKI

The Red Chimney Restaurant, at the corner of Fleet Avenue and East 65 Street, was shut down after a fire upstairs in the building. The downstairs restaurant suffered water damage and needed reconstruction. Many neighborhood individuals stepped up to make a re-opening a viable conclusion.

The Red Chimney is a neighborhood institution that began in the 1970's under different ownership. Joe Koffol and John and Linda Turk, who owned Grabowski's store across the street teamed up to re-model the old Montowski's Hardware building into the Red Chimney Restaurant. This was also at the beginning of the Slavic Village Association. Pete and Lou Skantzos are the current owners of the restaurant. When it first opened the Red Chimney was opened twenty-four hours a day. Many policemen and women would eat at the restaurant When there was a wrestling event downtown or at the Richfield Coliseum many famous wrestlers including Hulk Hogan ate at the Red Chimney. The latest brush with the famous for the Red Chimney came when a portion of the new Superman movie was filmed at the business. Nathan Fillion, the Green Lantern was seen eating and watching television at the counter.

Many neighborhood people and those from outside the neighborhood would meet up for good food and fellowship. The employees knew many regulars and the owners have always been friendly. Food portions were a good size and the sampling of Polish food was good. The main ingredient for the Red Chimney was the fellowship amongst the diners. People would plan to east there every week or some ate there every day. The employees were friends with customers and vice versa.

Here's hoping that the Red Chimney's revival is a success and it can continue to be the neighborhood mainstay that it has been and continues that into the future.

Christopher Roy Thursday, January 29, 2026 at 7pm OTTO MOSER'S RESTAURANT & VAUDEVILLE AGE



The GREETERS STORY -3 questions answered;

Q#1.— What is an Alumni Greeter?

Ans.- We are the welcoming face for the entrance to the food and bar area, be happy!

Q#2.— What do they do?

Ans.- Find out if someone is new to the festival, give them more help time. • Pass out the Festival Book to all who want one, have the booklet open to the page showing menu items & cost for while they wait in line. • Point out the two food lines—same food on either side.

Suggest: That they get a tray and carry out containers for "food to go" while in line — FILL UP THE TRAY WITH FOOD—pay with cash or credit card at the end. • Point out Restroom location. • Call attention to the really 'good bakery' for sale and the bar area. • Encourage visitors to go upstairs to the gym for dancing & various booths. • Thank them for attending on their way out, be happy!

Q#3. — How can I become an alumni greeter?

Ans. - Some folks have an attitude of "I never want to see those characters from school ever again"- then being a greeter is NOT in your future. But— if you are outgoing and personable, like to meet old and new friends for a 2.5 hour welcoming greeter shift, then this may be a great chance for you in October 2026.



Over the years most of us have a tendency to hold onto what we feel is meaningful in our life. Certainly family photos and letters, but overall girls may save special jewelry or favorite recipes; guys might hold onto certain old baseball cards, comic books or team jerseys. This may be an attempt to help us savor special memories & times.

With this in mind, I reflected on a special cluster of my older books I see passing by a hallway shelf several times a day, and usually think "I'm glad I still have them all here with me". This SPECIAL CLUSTER is just a corner of several shelves loaded with science reference books that I used over 35 years teaching high school science at Garfield Heights.



This cluster of books that gives me a warm feeling is actually from SSHS Religion Class Texts titled "Our Quest For Happiness". (I didn't steal them! We were told by our homeroom teachers at the end of each year to take them home from our locker -or- they would be "taken care of". So I kept them.) Also on the hall shelf is my CRUSADE -Bible & Catholic Heritage Stories. I subscribed to them starting in 1955 at Sts. Peter & Paul Elementary — I have a complete set saved in binders.

I do take these old cherished books off the shelf and enjoy looking them over every once in a while even today. You would think that if books like these were of great interest to me as a youth — I should have done better than getting my usual "C or C-" as the grade for Religion on my report card while in school. Oh well.

All of this religious exposure from over the years has left its mark and in my case call it "love of Life". This CLUSTER OF BOOKS REFLECTION makes me think of the old Oscar winning movie CITIZEN KANE and the importance the old sled "Rosebud" to the W. R. Hearst character in the closing scene of the film.
