OUR MISSION

MAD SCIENCE PROGRAM POLICIES

- ★ If your child will be picked up after Mad Science, you must meet your child at the room location.
- ★ Failure to pick up a child within 30 minutes of dismissal time will result in a call to the Police Department, to assist in locating the child's parent or guardian.
- ★ For refund requests made prior to the start of the program, a \$10 processing fee will be deducted. Payments made directly to your child's school are subject to the school's refund policy.
- ★ No refunds will be issued once the program has begun.
- ★ All children are expected to maintain proper behavior while attending the program. If a child displays disruptive, disrespectful, or inappropriate behavior and repeated warnings by Mad Science fail to yield results, parents will be contacted. If the behavior continues, the child will be dismissed from the program and no refund will be given.
- ★ Space is limited. Registrations are accepted on a first come first serve basis.
- ★ If a minimum number of students is not reached class will be cancelled, and a full refund will be given.
- ★ The nature of Mad Science programs allows for grades K-6 to participate in the same classroom with one instructor.
- ★ Mad Science's average class size is 12-20 students per one instructor.
- ★ A \$25 fee will be charged for checks that are returned unpaid.

The Parents' Corner

★We're In your Corner★

This month we dive into *expectations*:

Happy New Year, and welcome back! January is a new beginning and a great time to remind ourselves—*we're all human*. It is also a good time to reflect on how that new-year reminder relates to our kids. As parents, we have expectations of our children—**and we should**. But what is developmentally appropriate? What should we expect from them, and what should we acknowledge and respond to as a teachable moment?

We are all born with emotional *reactions*. As your child gets older and has more life experiences, they can understand different emotions and learn self-regulation methods. This helps them deal with difficult situations. One thing we know to be true is that as *humans*, we have *grumpy moods, bad days, disrespectful tones, and bad attitudes*. **None of us are perfect, including our kids**. We have to be careful not to expect their underdeveloped brains and limited life experiences to guide them. They need our help and empathy as we figure this life thing out together.

As we watch our children grow and learn, it's easy to forget the trials and errors of our own childhoods. Emotional intelligence is learned...and not always attained. We all know adults who still struggle with emotional regulation! The development of a child's emotional intelligence is impacted by our reactions to their emotions. Teaching kids to identify their emotions gives them a framework to explain their feelings. This helps them deal with emotions in a socially appropriate way. Children also learn about managing their emotions by watching us. **Children learn what they live**. Helping kids manage their emotions begins by validating those emotions and providing an environment in which they feel safe to express them. When we teach kids that their emotions are valid, we help them view what they feel as normal and manageable. The best way to teach your child how to react to big emotions appropriately is to show them how.

Next Steps

1. **Reframe**: Rather than thinking of behavior as “bad,” reframe to think of behavior as a message that your child is struggling with something. This encourages empathy rather than punishment.
2. **Teach**: Hold children accountable for their behavior by teaching and modeling. Teach them that all choices have consequences. Teach them how to handle frustration, anger, fear, sadness, and disappointment. Teach them that it's not acceptable to be rude to people. Teach them that they don't have to react to every feeling. The best way to teach your child is to show them how to respond. If there needs to be a consequence, let it be for what they *did* while they were upset, not *that* they were upset. Let them know all feelings are okay, but not all behaviors are.
3. **Practice empathy**: Empathize with the feeling but reject the behavior – “I know you're upset that she didn't play with you, but you can't hit her.” Make them accountable for their behavior but let them know that you understand how they're feeling.
4. **Validate**: Separate emotions from behavior. It may not make sense to us, but that doesn't make the feeling invalid. The emotion is valid. The way they're expressing it is not. If your child doesn't feel heard, they won't hear you, either. They'll be too busy trying to figure out how to make you see their sides of things.
5. **Show compassion**: We aren't robots. Despite our best efforts, sometimes we mess up. Sometimes life is just plain hard, and we need a break, not a lecture. We need a hug, not a scornful look. We know we did wrong, but we're having a hard time. We just need grace. The same goes for our children.
6. **Cool down**: Times of high emotion are not the time to instill wisdom, lectures, explanations or problem-solving. Don't try to make your point then. During high emotion, kids are, quite literally, out of control of their brains. Acknowledge the emotion. “I know you're angry/sad/worried right now.” Then wait until things settle down to continue the conversation.

Kids are going to get it wrong. So will we. But mistakes help us learn. Give yourself a little grace, too—you're doing your best. After all...we're only human.
