

## Palm Sunday Year A

There was an elderly man one time who used to meditate every morning under a big tree on the bank of the River Ganges in India. One day, after he had finished praying, the man opened his eyes and saw a scorpion floating helplessly on the water. As the scorpion washed nearer to the tree the man stretched out his hand in an attempt to save the drowning creature. As soon as he touched it, the scorpion stung him. As we go through uncertainty of these times due to the Coronavirus COVID-19, many of us are anxious and afraid and troubled. So many unanswerable questions and concerns. All we can do is take things one day at a time. Stay close God. Walk with God this week-even if you have never participated in Holy Week services before or not for a long time.

Remember that its in God’s nature to love, to heal, to forgive, protect and save. That’s exactly what the coming week is all about. Jesus invites our participation. I plan on being there. I hope many of you can join me..
