St. James in the 1870's (Part Three) MISSIONARY July 9, 1980

"the Ladies of the Episcopal church will..."

As St. James parish worship was being put on a regular basis by the Rev. E.R. Ward who visited weekly in the late 1870's, a second major source of strength was the Episcopal Ladies Society. In the absence of resident clergy, the women's activity provided a focus for parish life and an image to the rest of West Bend as well as a continual source of income for parish activities, especially those aimed at children.

The range of their fund raising activities was amazing:

December 1875 The ladies of the Episcopal Church will hold an "entertainment" at North School House to get money for presents for Sunday school students.

July 1876 Episcopal young ladies will serve ice cream every Saturday night.

November 1876 The Episcopal Ladies will hold a Social at Glantzs' Hotel

A Christmas Festival—dinners at the County Fair—musicales—annual picnics—recitals—log cabin quilts to raffle –concerts—Christmas Parties—decorations in the church for special

FROM YOUR RECTOR

I was thinking about what I could write as a short meditation as we approach Easter when I found the following thoughts on Facebook. The sentiments were so spot on and inspiring to me that instead of writing my own meditation, I'm sharing the wonderful meditation originally written by Travis Swords of Newborn, GA. I pray his words touch you as much as they touched me.

"The very first Easter was not in a crowded worship space with singing and praising. On the very first Easter the disciples were locked in their house. It was dangerous for them to come out. They were afraid. They wanted to believe the good news they heard from the women, that Jesus had risen, but it seemed too good to be true. They were living in a time of such despair and such fear. If they left their homes their lives and the lives of their loved ones might be at risk. Could a miracle really have happened? Could life really have won out over death? Could this time of terror and fear really be coming to an end? Alone in their homes they dared to believe that hope was possible, that the long night was over and morning had broken, that God's love was the most powerful force of all, even though the it didn't seem quite real vet. Eventually, they were able to leave their homes. When the fear and danger subsided, they went around celebrating and spreading the Good News that Jesus was risen and love was the most powerful force on Earth. This year, we might get to experience a taste of what

occasions and even a "Mum" party where guests were fined for talking. Year after year the Ladies of the Episcopal Church made the parish prosper through their work.

The names of individual women are not always easy to find, but a few stand out. Mrs. C. H. Miller seemed to be in charge of or behind everything. Many meetings were held in her home before events took place. Mrs. P. A. Weil often hostess to visiting bishops and clerics, she smothered a fire in church one Sunday when a chandelier crashed to the floor. Miss Frisby, however typifies their spirit the best. Late one October evening, she was on her way home from a Church Fair with the \$141.00 collected when two men tried to rob her. The paper reported her as telling them, "...her own money they might have, but the Lord's never!... she would die first..." Her screams brought Mr. B. S. Potter to the rescue and he escorted her and the money home safely.
