As we celebrate World Day for Consecrated Life (February 7), please pray for all those who have made commitments to the consecrated life, especially our own parishioners, Sister Rae Elwood and Sister Bea Snyder. May they continue to be inspired by our Lord and respond generously to God's gift of their vocation.



Sister Bea, (pictured right), shares her story below of hearing God's call:

Decades ago, I had my beginnings in Davenport, attended Holy Family Grade School for eight years, and graduated from Assumption High School. During these years, we had many talks given to us regarding religious life and how we should all consider a religious vocation.

I thought about it but not seriously. Following graduation from Assumption, I attended Ottumwa Heights Junior College in Ottumwa, Ia. The Heights was not only a junior college but was also the Mother House for the Sisters of Humility, where the retired sisters, sisters teaching at the college, and the young women in formation for religious life (novitiate) lived. I was drawn to the welcoming spirit, the humor, and the caring presence of the sisters. Seeing the postulants and novices every day was intriguing.

As the months moved forward, I found myself thinking seriously about religious life. I heard the inner voice calling me to "come, follow me." Insecurities were plenty. Would I be accepted? What would my parents say? I'm an only child and my mother wasn't Catholic. I knew they were looking forward to having grandchildren. Obviously, I was accepted and my parents, though not happy about it, supported me.

Having answered the call to "come, follow me" has been challenging, rewarding, and filled with numerous blessings. This holds true, I'm sure, in everyone's life. One blessing that I know to be true for me is my awareness of God's presence in my day-to-day journey, which has been a gift beyond measure.

My first ministry was teaching. I taught 2nd, 4th, 7th, and 8th grades in parishes in Iowa, Illinois, and Colorado. I was also a principal and Director of Religious Education (DRE). While DRE, I was introduced to a community of men and women 'committed to living simply and in solidarity with the poor.' These folks provided hospitality to homeless men and women while also operating a soup kitchen where 350 to 500 people were able to get a meal daily. Having always been interested in social justice, I was hooked on this ministry. My inner being heard the call, "Yes. I am calling you. Come, follow me."

For the next 20 years, my ministry was among God's poor. Many were addicts, mentally ill, just out of prison, victims of AIDS, had trouble keeping a job ... and so on. These people became my friends. (Getting to know a person takes away harsh judgments we might otherwise have.) During these years I was also a jail chaplain.

I found God in the homeless daily. My life was enriched beyond measure through the friends I made and my experiences. God so blessed me again with the call to "come, follow me."

From 20 years of living and working among the homeless, I was called by God through the president of the Sisters of Humility to "come, follow me" as director of the Humility of Mary Center where I would be responsible for the retired sisters living at the Center, the staff, and the building and grounds. QUITE A CHANGE! Again ... the challenges were many and I am grateful for having had the opportunity to serve God and my community in such a diverse way.

Today, I am on several committees focusing on social justice. My prayer continues to seek God's call, to hear the cry of the poor, to answer, "Yes. Here I am, Lord."

Let me ask you:

*How is God calling you?
Are you seeking God in your life?
Is God calling you to religious life?
Are you listening?
Praying?
Seeking?
Come.*

INTENTION CANDLES






Inspiration for the week



GOSPEL MEDITATION

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

If I only knew then what I know now, how different life would be. This sentiment, expressed in myriad ways, is found on every human being's lips at one point or another. Life may have brought us to a vulnerable place where we see some of the poor choices we made and the effects they are having. Perhaps we fell into some destructive and dysfunctional relationships or behaviors and are finding how they held us captive. Our zeal and passion for life may have drifted away and we are waking up to the reasons apathy has taken hold. Life can be hard. In fact, some would describe their lives as a drudgery. They walk through each day with an anxious unsettledness, wondering when their restlessness will cease. There is a temptation to believe that what I see is all I will get. Mortality and hopelessness await the dawn. If I could only have known what would come in the future, I could have made better choices and avoided all of this misery!

Really? While we can certainly give into weakness, sin, impulsiveness, and idiosyncrasies that cause us to stumble over ourselves, life is really a journey. If we don't make the mistake of wallowing in the mire of self-pity and realize the new life God is calling us to, then there are thrills, adventures, surprises, and soul-searching graces we can surely miss. We are not tethered to our past nor are we bound to the ills life can bring upon us. We are never hopeless or helpless. The problem is that our myopic vision only allows us to see the misery and misfortune that is before us, not the potential that can come from choosing healthier and more life-giving options. Jesus came that we might have fullness of life. We need to learn how to reach for Jesus' hand and let him help us to our feet.

We need to allow God into our pain and heal our past. We have to wrestle with our histories, agonize and search and cry out for the Divine healing we need to restore our faith, hope, and love. Job could not see how his story would end or trust the guidance of the God who called him. We live in that same blindness and suffer from the same lack of confidence. Once we allow ourselves to be touched by God's healing power, we begin to see that all of the pieces of our lives are necessary parts of a greater whole. Along the way of our lives, God uses our omissions and failures to create new things and possibilities. When doors close, others open and we can be amazed by the joyful and unexpected surprises we receive. Once we know the power of God's creative, healing, life-giving, forgiving, and dynamic presence, it is no wonder we want to put ourselves at the service of others and show them what life can be.

Post it, tweet it, pin it, listen to it, read it! On multiple media platforms, *The Catholic Messenger* connects you to the Good News of Jesus Christ as lived out in our local Church and universal Church. One more way to develop your faith.

That connection has proven more vital these past 10 months because of the pandemic that has required substantial changes in our ability to come together in the parish and in the community at large. The *Messenger* provides easy access to the latest developments — from diocesan pandemic protocols, online Mass schedules and event cancellations to videos, podcasts and my letters on our response to COVID-19. Check out the *Messenger's* website at www.catholicmessenger.net, which is the gateway to the publication's media platforms, including the e-edition.

"*The Catholic Messenger* entered a new age with its e-edition," says Tim Walch, who serves with me on the *Messenger's* Board of Directors. "The pages come alive with color and convenience and news of the diocese is readily accessible at the touch of the keyboard. It's hard to imagine a more attractive and useful format for such an important publication." Subscribers get the e-edition delivered to their email address.

Responding to the constantly evolving digital world and your preferences for accessing news, faith formation and inspiration, the *Messenger* completed a 13-week training with the Catholic Media Association. Editor Barb Arland-Fye said this about the training: "We have added technological tools to our tool belt. We feel energized, which moves us to build on our creativity and explore the 'what-ifs' to guide our publication well into the future. The Catholic Media Association developed this training initiative to equip our faith-based publications to continue to be a voice for the Church for generations to come."


That training took place at the same time that the derecho, a straight-line windstorm, barreled into Iowa Aug. 10 on the *Messenger's* deadline. The storm left nearly 1 million homes and businesses without power along a 770-mile path in the Midwest, according to news reports. The *Messenger's* staff managed to get the initial story online and in print — on time.

This weekend, parishes kick off the 2021 subscription drive. To help encourage more people to subscribe, all households in the diocese will receive one free edition of *The Catholic Messenger* on Jan. 28. That special issue also will include Catholic Schools Week coverage and the monthly Spanish page.

No other media, print or digital, covers the Catholic Church in our diocese with the expertise and integrity of *The Catholic Messenger*. It is a real value at \$29 per year for 50 issues — print or E-edition. Watch for the subscription drive in your parish.

My hope is that all households will subscribe to *The Catholic Messenger*. Please subscribe for yourself or buy a subscription for a friend or family member. Staying connected to our local Church and the universal Church is one way to develop your faith.

To ensure your safety, seating will be assigned for all Easter Sunday Masses. Our capacity remains greatly reduced so we encourage reserving your household's space early.





CRS RICE BOWL



Matthew's Gospel invites us to remember that we are responsible for helping all our sisters and brothers, even those who are strangers to us. When we do this, we care for Christ. The season of Lent gives us a wonderful opportunity to reflect and make room in our hearts to welcome the stranger. Through our prayer, we encounter Jesus, who is present in the face of every member of our human family. When we fast, we encounter the obstacles that stop us from fully loving God and our neighbor. When we give alms, we share what we have with others.

This Lent, CRS Rice Bowl takes us to three countries—Madagascar, El Salvador and Timor-Leste. Hunger and malnutrition, which happens when we don't get the right amount of nutrients, are challenges that too many families face each day. One out of every 10 people worldwide don't have enough to eat. Sometimes this is caused by natural disasters like floods and droughts. Other times, families don't have enough money to buy the food they need, or the food they can get doesn't have all the vitamins and minerals they need to stay healthy.

CRS helps communities find solutions to each of these problems. Farming families learn new skills and grow stronger, healthier harvests. Communities train health care workers so children can get regular check-ups and parents can learn new nutritious recipes to make sure their families get a balanced diet. People in vulnerable areas prepare for unpredictable weather that could destroy crops.

Jesus calls us to help those in need. Our Lenten prayers, fasting, and sacrificial gifts help us answer this call.




