Why be buried in a Catholic Cemetery?

Our faith teaches that we are made in the image and likeness of God. Catholic cemeteries are consecrated grounds and offer a sacred resting place for our physical remains, which retain special purpose, preparing for the moment of Resurrection.

Catholic burial serves as a memorable and lasting tribute to your life, allowing you to feel confident that the ground in which you will rest embraces your remains in the spirit of Christ's enduring love and devotion.

The Catholic Cemeteries of St. Margaret and St. Patrick seek to offer a peaceful place of prayer and meditation for your final resting place.

St. Margaret Catholic Cemetery North Street Neenah, WI

St. Margaret Cemetery consists of 18 acres and is nestled alongside Oakhill Cemetery in Neenah. In 1913, Frank J. Sensenbrenner donated twelve acres of land to St. Patrick Parish in honor of his mother's patron saint, St. Margaret. Use was extended to St. Gabriel and St. Margaret Mary Parishes when they formed and is jointly managed amongst the three parishes.

St. Patrick Catholic Cemetery Green Bay Road Neenah, WI

St. Patrick Cemetery covers three acres of land and dates back to the 1850's as the final resting place for the Irish Catholic Pioneers and the earliest German Catholic Settlers of the Fox Cities. In 1870, the Hogan family sold this land to the Trustees of the Catholic Church on the Island (at the time called St. Charles Boromeo.)







<u>Burial rights</u> are available individually and allow for one full burial or one cremation for each plot, unless Second Rights are also purchased.

The <u>Second Right of Burial</u> allows for a second burial to take place on a single plot.

A single plot can then accommodate either:

(1) a traditional burial plus one cremation, or

(2) two cremations.
