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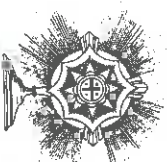

2020 has been an unperceivable year. It seems like everything that normally happens annually is being canceled due to Covid-19. As you may have noticed, the Council of Catholic Women did not even do their annual membership drive in September. We were not able to have our spring or fall thrift sales, no spring luncheon and we probably will not have our Christmas luncheon either. All the Deanery and Diocesan meetings and conferences have also been canceled. We are not able to have our monthly meetings. We just need to be patient until next year.

One thing we have been able to do is the annual Appalachian Christmas project, even if it appears different than it has in the past. Previously we would get names of families and CCW members would buy and wrap Christmas gifts for each member of the families. This is done by the entire Diocesan CCW. All the gifts are collected in Brainerd and someone with a large truck volunteers to drive the gifts down to Kentucky. The priest there delivers them to the families along with a ham and all the other fixings for a Christmas dinner. Due to Covid-19, we just sent money down to their priest who will purchase gifts for the families from Walmart this year and see that they are delivered. Thank you to all those who participated in this year's Appalachian Christmas project.

All women are welcome to join St. Anthony's Council of Catholic Women. We usually meet the 4th Tuesday of every month (January, February, March, April, May, August, September, October, and November) at 1 pm in one of the classrooms in the fellowship hall. In the spring and winter, we usually have a luncheon. Even if you do not think meetings are for you, come and try it at least once. (who would later become Pope Francis, after a tenure as Archbishop of Buenos Aires), brought a postcard of the above painting to Argentina in the 1980s after seeing the original while studying in Germany. The devotion reached Brazil near the end of the 20th century. Bergoglio had this image of Mary engraved on a chalice he presented to Pope Benedict XVI and another chalice bearing her image, the work of the same silversmith, was presented to Pope Francis on behalf of the Argentine people.

In the October issue of Give Us This Day Valerie Schultz said the following about the prayer below written by Pope Francis, "The sweet poetry of this simple prayer calls us to multitask like Mary: to find God in all things, to place our hearts in God, and to serve God in our sisters and brothers, unfettered from our stubborn knots by God's grace."

From Deacon Don Klick

The late Father John J. Dietzen was a question and answer columnist for Catholic News for over 35 years. The following question and answer on our Catholic faith is from his book titled: "Catholic Q&A Answers to the Most Common Questions about Catholicism".

Form of marriage vows

Question: Our family attended a wedding with wedding vows I have never heard before. The couple said something rather long about their love and how they wanted to live together for life, but no other vows. Is it possible now for a couple to use their own words and make up their marriage vows?

Answer: The ritual for marriage in the Latin rite of the church contains one form of consent at a wedding: "I, Joseph, take you, Jane, to be my wife. I promise to be true to you in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health. I will love you and honor you all the days of my life." Instead of a statement by the couple, the priest (or deacon) may put it in the form of a question, "Do you, Joseph, take Jane."

In November, 1969, the American bishops approved a second form with which we in the United States are more familiar: "I, Joseph, take you, Jane, for my lawful wife, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for better or worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health until death do us part." If the couple prefer, this form may also be put as a question asked by the priest (or deacon). One of these forms must be used at all marriages of Catholics in the United States; the bride and groom, therefore, are not free to compose their own vows, nor does any priest (or deacon) have a right to compose his own.

The reasons for this should be obvious when we realize that marriage vows (anytime, but in a special way between two Christians) are not a private affair between the couple; they have importance and implications for the whole community.

The U.S. Bishops Committee on the Liturgy explains it this way: "While the couple may well find language of their own to express very profoundly the consent and covenant which they undertake, this is a central ritual and ecclesial act and they have a responsibility to the community of believers assembled, that is, the church before which they manifest their consent, to use language clearly and certainly conformable to the church's faith and understanding of the sacrament."

In practice, this requirement works no hardship on the couple, since there are numerous other chances for them to express their faith and understanding of their vows during the wedding ceremony. One most obvious and frequently used is the opportunity for the couple to compose their own prayer to be recited together or separately either shortly after they declare their vows or during the meditation period after Communion. This may be what you heard the couple say.

If a couple unexpectedly employs other language of consent or commitment than that provided in the rite, no matter how appropriate that language may be, the presiding priest (or deacon) should see that one of the approved forms is used also.

He might do this very simply by using one of the two question forms I mentioned above. (Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy Newsletter, August – September, 1981)

MISSION CIRCLE

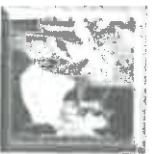

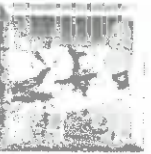

Those who find the rosary difficult to pray or for those who are new to the Rosary, pray at least one decade of the Rosary daily. During this month and in the months to follow, may Mary intercede for our church, our nation, and the world.



The Joyful Mysteries of Mary

The Joyful Mysteries are taken mostly from St. Luke's Gospel in the New Testament. They involve the joyful events of Jesus' childhood. The most joyful event in all of human history is the Incarnation or when God became man and dwelt among us.

How to pray the Rosary?

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

O God come to my aid;

O Lord, make haste to help me.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

At the beginning of each decade, announce the "mystery" to be contemplated, for example, the first joyful mystery is "The Annunciation".

After a short pause for reflection, recite the "Our Father", ten "Hail Marys" and the "Glory be to the Father".

An invocation may be added after each decade.

At the end of the Rosary, the Loreto Litany or some other Marian prayer is recited.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us, and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Hail Mary, Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now, and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen..

Joyful Mysteries

First Joyful Mystery: The Annunciation

"In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary" (Lk 1:26-27).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Second Joyful Mystery: The Visitation

"In those days Mary arose and went with haste into the hill country, to a town of Judah, and she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. And when Elizabeth heard the greeting of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and she exclaimed aloud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!'" (Lk 1:39-42).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Third Joyful Mystery: The Birth of Our Lord

"In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be enrolled. This was the first enrolment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be enrolled, each to his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the lineage of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered; so she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn" (Lk 2:1-7).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Fourth Joyful Mystery: The Presentation in the Temple

"And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb. And when the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every male that opens the womb shall be called to the Lord') and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons'" (Lk 2:21-24).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Fifth Joyful Mystery: The finding of Jesus in the temple

"Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the feast of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up according to custom to the feast; and when the feast was ended, as they were returning, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His parents did not know it. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers,

First Mystery of Light: The Baptism in the Jordan.

"And when Jesus was baptized, he went up immediately from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and alighting on him; and lo, a voice from heaven, saying, 'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well-pleased'" (Mt 3:16-17).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Second Mystery of Light: The wedding feast of Cana.

"On the third day there was a marriage at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there; Jesus also was invited to the marriage, with his disciples. When the wine failed, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'O woman, what have you to do with me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you'" (Jn 2:1-5).

Our Father, 10 Hail Marys (contemplating the mystery), Glory be to the Father.

Third Mystery of Light: The proclamation of the kingdom of God.
