HOME DONATION MATCHING CHALLENGE

At the completion of the 12th Annual Golf Tournament & Bec's Silent Auction, I was approached by long term supporters of HMI with an amazingly generous challenge. They were aware that because of the success and generosity of our sponsors and donors to the Silent Auction that we had enough matching money in place to potentially build four homes a month. This past week on our trip to Haiti, I met with the HMI construction team and asked if they thought they could build four homes per month through April 2022? Their response was no surprise and affirmative! June will be our first month building four homes.

Through this couple God has provided the anonymous gift that will make that possible. They have pledged up to \$50,000. in matching money for all donations that are received by HMI from now through the end of September designated toward home building. If you have ever considered helping build a home in Haiti or have donated for a home in the past, now is a great time if you are able to support the home building project. Donors can dedicate the home to a loved one with donations of \$3750 or more, but donations of any size will help us get to the \$50,000. needed to utilize the entire challenge donation.

God's plan for home building in Haiti has always been bigger than ours and as someone who has been blessed with seeing how these homes are changing lives it is easy to understand his plan. You cannot out give God and if the past is any indication, I have faith that our HMI donors will surpass the \$50,000. minimum needed to meet the challenge. Thank you in advance for your support. (Continuing our series on how Haiti Mission has impacted the lives of people, we have the testimony of Doug Pellegrin after being part of the Haiti Mission Trip November 2020)

After supporting HMI for several years, my wife Jennifer and I were fortunate enough to participate in the November 2020 mission trip to Numero Deux. First and foremost, all praise and glory to God for safe travels and for placing us with such a supportive group of missionaries. Jenny and I cannot thank David and Laura Fakier, Joe and Terri Cunningham, Julie Steigner, Lori Labbe' and Gabby Gonzales enough for their kindness and willingness to share their knowledge on what to

do and what to expect on our inaugural trip to Haiti. A bible passage that I wrote down earlier this year because of Covid, the societal unrest in this country and all the hurricanes was John 14:27. "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid." This passage became a focal point for us while on this mission trip. On this Haitian journey, we experienced an indescribable moment that we will never forget. One moment which occurred in the church near the statue of the Blessed Mother, left us with a calming feeling of "do not be afraid". Haiti has everything you expect in a third world country - no electricity, no running water, scarce food and medical treatment, a lean-to for a house, bad roads or no roads at all. But it is also filled with a grateful people, a sharing and loving people with big smiles and big hearts. We witnessed many smiles and tears of joy on the faces of these beautiful people. To see a family when they find out they were chosen to have a new HMI home is such a wonderful occasion! Along with dedicating and blessing of the houses, family distribution day, visiting the Missionaries of Charity, visiting and feeding the prisoners in the Jeremie jail, listening to the Creole language and singing in Mass as well as so many other daily events made this mission trip something we'll never forget. Do not be afraid to continue to reach out to your family, friends, and neighbors to share with them how HMI is changing lives by the things they do. I would like to end with a synopsis of one of Father Joe's sermons during the week: "Gratitude", be grateful to be alive, "Emanuel", God is with us, "Trust God and surrender", "Listen", you have to listen in silence to hear God's word, "Vigilance", be ready we know not the day or the hour!" Jennifer and I thank God again for such a tremendous experience. We returned home with these words resonating inside of us, "Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid."

Lighting up the Hills!

The Family Distribution is always one of the highlights of a mission trip. An average of 150 families are selected each trip to be the recipients of groceries, various supplies and \$20 in cash by way of our "Dirty Card helping Families" project. The past few years, one of the friends of HMI who visited Haiti on a mission trips was inspired to research solar lights in order that the families - especially the children - could have light to live by. Once a decision was made on the most suitable for the situation in Haiti, with both personal commitment on the part of this individual and participation by some friends, the solar light project was born. Has it ever been a success! All the families greatly appreciate what they receive from the team, but the solar lights are particularly precious. For a while, it seemed as though the lights would not arrive in time this year for the distribution. How exciting it was for the team to see the cases of lights show up in the storage depot the day before the distribution day. Thanks be to God!
