PEACE, CONSOLATION, AND GLORY

In the Gospel Reading, Simeon is waiting in the Temple, because the Holy Spirit has revealed to him that he will meet the Messiah there. When Simeon does finally see Jesus, the Gospel tells us, Simeon had been waiting for a long time.

Waiting can be so hard. Think of the young mother waiting for lab results about her cancer, or the old lady waiting for news about her son in Afghanistan. Think of the aspiring novelist waiting to hear if the press will accept his manuscript or the scientist waiting to know if his life's work will be honored with a great prize. Peace is so often lost by such a wait. While a person is waiting, he is anxious—what if the thing he is waiting for never comes? And he is sad or sorrowful, because he does not yet have the thing he wants and is waiting for. Then there is the undeniable humiliation of having to wait. A person who waits knows that what he wants depends on things outside his own control. Having to wait brings home to him his vulnerability and neediness.

And so, look at what Simeon says when his wait is finally over, and he sees Jesus. Seeing this baby, Simeon says, lets me die in peace. This baby overturns anxiety and brings peace—not a theoretical kind of peace which has no purchase on a person's emotions, but real peace, the kind that brings with it easy breathing. And why peace? Because, as the Holy Spirit revealed to Simeon, this baby is God's consolation for all his people. If God himself gives a person consolation, he will have God's peace as well. And, finally, this peace is not the kind of peace that makes a person ready with resignation to accept defeat. No, on the contrary: it makes a person rise to glory. That is why Simeon says in his prayer that this baby brings glory to God's people.

And so here is the thing for us to think about at Christmas. In our anxieties, in our sorrows, in our defeats and humiliations, can we turn and look at this baby? No matter what anxiety, sorrow, or defeat the world has given us, nothing can take this baby away from us. Our consolation, our peace, and our glory lie with him.

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

The topic of family links today's Scripture passages. The reading from Sirach instructs us: Whoever honors his father atones for sins, and those who respect their mother store up riches. Those who care for elderly parents are not forgotten, and their kindness is firmly planted as an offering against sin. In St. Luke's Gospel, the evangelist retells of Jesus' presentation to the Lord in the Jerusalem Temple. This is done in accordance with Mosaic Law. Jesus, Mary, and Joseph then return to Nazareth, where our Lord grows in strength and wisdom. In St. Paul's Letter to the Colossian community, he emphasizes bearing with one another and forgiving one another... as the Lord has forgiven you. Christ's peace must reign in our families' hearts. As Pope St. John Paul II pointed out, the family is the "Domestic Church." Vocations are born and nurtured in families that embrace the Catholic faith by making Jesus the center of their lives. May we, as Christian stewards, continue to strive, build, and pray for solid Christian families in an increasingly antifamily attitude found today in secular society. To strengthen your family, make time daily to pray and eat at least one meal together. Most important, attend Sunday Mass weekly as a family and partake of Holy Communion.

Together, we bishops affirm that the imminent Pfizer and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines are morally acceptable, and we encourage everyone to receive the vaccine when it becomes available."
