THE INSTRUCTION MANUAL

In the First Reading, God gives Moses and the Israelites the Ten Commandments. These are God's basic instruction manual for life. In Christ's Sermon on the Mount (Mt 5 through 7), that basic instruction manual is supplied with more details. The Ten Commandments forbid murder. The Sermon on the Mount commands you actually to love your enemy, turn the other cheek to him, and so on.

The rules of God's instruction manual for us are helpful; but, as we all have learned, it is hard to know in what circumstances they apply. Suppose you take the commandment about turning the other cheek to apply to someone who is beating his wife. If you apply it to mean that you should not try to stop him, you will simply be cooperating with his evil.

The trick is to see that the commandment about turning the other cheek has to be applied in the context of the broader rule: love your enemy. If you enable your enemy to become more evil, how have you loved him?

Elsewhere in the Gospel (John 2:15), Christ uses a whip to chase the moneychangers out of the Temple. In doing this he helps us understand how to apply the rules. In cases where turning the other cheek would make your enemy worse instead of better, loving your enemy requires helping him to stop his evil in some other way. And that is why the same Christ who gave the Sermon on the Mount drives out the moneychangers. If he had turned the other cheek to them, he would have been an enabler of their evil. Instead, it is good for them, as well as for others, that they stop the evil they were doing. And so, Christ uses force to get them to stop.

Here is the thing to notice, then. God's instruction manual for life is not limited just to the sets of rules in the Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. There is a medieval saying: every act of Christ is a teaching for us (Omnis Christi actio nostra est instructio).* Christ's life and actions, as they are set out in the Gospels, are our best help for seeing how to live our lives well. Our best instruction manual is Christ himself.

Le respect c'est plus qu'une question de bonnes manières, c'est un témoignage d'estime, d'intérêt et même d'amour. C'est aussi une condition essentielle pour que règne la paix dans la communauté. Le manque de respect conduit à l'injure, l'insulte, le mépris, l'intimidation, le ridicule, le rejet et l'exclusion. Est-ce que j'ai vraiment du respect pour Dieu, pour mes parents, pour la famille, pour les faibles, pour les étrangers, pour ce qui appartient aux autres.

La Loi du Seigneur est en notre faveur et non contre nous. Elle ne veut pas limiter notre liberté mais lui permettre de s'épanouir. Cette Loi du Seigneur touche au quotidien, au profane de la vie : la famille, les rapports sociaux, le monde du travail, la vie de tous les jours. Si la Loi nous empêche de profiter de la vie, c'elle est mal interprétée!

Les commandements qui nous sont proposés aujourd'hui deviennent un chemin de liberté, de respect, de partage et de fraternité. Et le temple, la maison du Seigneur, est l'endroit où nous célébrons ce cadeau, ce don de Dieu. Il a donc droit à tout notre respect : «Ne faites pas de la maison de mon Père une maison de commerce.».

Third Sunday of Lent



Our readings call us to roll up our sleeves and persevere through the remainder of Lent by committing to a more faithful life with Christ.

In today's Gospel, Jesus purifies the temple area because it is being misused as a marketplace. He becomes angry at their lack of reverence for God. He spills the coins of the money changers and overturns tables, saying, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace."

Jesus witnessed the way people mistreated the temple — the place to worship God and God alone. He drives out evil and works to purify all that is sinful in that place. This is what Jesus wants to do for us this Lenten season. He wants to remove all impurity and evil in our lives and hearts so that we may have a proper dwelling place for the Holy Spirit. Let us ask ourselves, what areas of our life need cleansing? Let us name those areas and invite Jesus to purify us. He became a man to carry our burdens and wipe away our sins. He has given us boundless mercy, but we must do our part to seek it and commit to living a more faithful life as a disciple of Christ. With this knowledge, let us seek to be purified from our sins so that our hearts might be a true temple of the Holy Spirit.

This season of Lent is only halfway done — there is still time to work through our shortcomings and purify our hearts for Easter morning. But let us not waste another moment. Let us name our shortcomings, seek God's mercy, and invite Him to transform our hearts
