Friends, former parishioners remember Fr. Henry

This is the final installment in a three-part series of memories shared of Fr. Henry Januszkiewicz by parishioners who knew and loved him.



Father Henry was special to the Johnson family for the kindness and encouragement he gave our mother Lelia. Although she attended Mass faithfully and supported church activities, she was not fully involved in the church. Father Henry gave her the opportunity to be a

leader and to be fully engaged at Ascension when she ran the kitchen for Las Vegas Nights – one of our big fundraisers to raise money to rebuild the church. People came to Vegas to gamble, but returned week after week to taste Lelia's hot potato salad, ribs and chicken.

Father Henry would often tell the parishioners if you had an idea to help the church, it was your project. And so my mother organized and held a dance (sponsored by the extended Johnson family). She invited local leaders (Audrey Scott, our mayor) and Representative Steny Hoyer to the dance, and they came. Without Father's encouragement and belief that she could do it, she probably would not have stepped up to the plate. Every idea she had, he supported.

Because of his faith in her and her support of him, he was going to take her to Rome. She was extremely excited and happy for the invitation. Unfortunately, she died before he could take her.

My siblings and I are forever grateful to Father Henry for including our mother and family into his extended family, as he did with so many other parishioners.

Religious Education students prepare for upcoming First Penance
