

Focus on the Family this Lent. These 40 days call us to spend time in prayer as a family. Scripture reading and the rosary are good family activates. The Stations of the Cross is encourage. Join us at 3:00 each Friday of Lent.

Jesus teaches us about prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. These are the three traditional "pillars" of Lenten observance. During Lent, we are encouraged to focus on prayer. This can be done by adding or increasing silent prayer time each day, taking time to pray as a family, attending Mass more regularly, experiencing Eucharistic adoration, in addition to other options. We are also asked to fast during Lent, which includes abstaining from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays, plus observing a day of fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Lent is a call to repent and believe in the Gospel. This also includes having a daily 40 practice to help us grow in holiness. The purpose of fasting is to help us be detached from the pleasures of this world and focus our attention on God. Finally, almsgiving refers to acts of charity. This can include offering more of our time, talent, and/or treasure in service of God. With all these practices of Lent, Jesus in this Gospel passage calls us to be humble and do them with the right intention of serving and worshipping God. Lent draws us to the heart of God to receive mercy and new life.

Lent – A time for Spiritual Growth

Lent gives us Forty (40) days to cultivate a spiritual training to grow in holiness. Have you noticed when you try to abstain from candy, deserts or soda; you begin to hunger even more for them and can't wait until Lent is over to return to these enjoyments?

This Lent build into your day a personal encounter with the Holy One who dwells in you. If you have a daily commute, build some prayer time into your travel. When stopped at a red light say out loud, "For the sake of His sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world." Or some other short prayer, "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace." Download an app to listen to the Bible. Or use this time to pray the rosary.

With a daily practice, you will be asking God to be there for you. First activity on waking greet the presence of God in you. Take a moment and welcome the day by offering all that will happen to the praise of God. On going to bed look back over the day, give thanks for all the blessings, and ask pardon for any failures. Sleep in peace.

The kitchen is another good place to pray. Your table is the altar of your home. Simplify your meals. Set a rice bowl on the table as an extra guest sharing a portion of your meal. Add a short scripture passage to your meal. "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God." Matt 4:4. This is another great way to pray as a family during the season.

Decide what it is you want to do for 40 days so a poor daily habit gives way to a good habit or routine. Our hope is for you to develop a new habit this Lenten season. Come up with one of your own to deepen your relationship with God. Practice this new habit on a daily basis for the 40 days of Lent and commit to it. Connect this habit to something you already do. Start small and increase bit by bit. Plan for obstacles and develop an accountability partner. Acknowledge milestones along the way and celebrate them. Finally reflect on how this new habit is enriching your life.

You will find the Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. As members of the Catholic Church, we proclaim that human life is sacred and the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society.

As a community, we can come together and provide them with basic household items for the kitchen, bedroom, bathroom, cleaning and supplies and cooking starters. The healing we all desire

"A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him, 'If you wish, you can make me clean.' Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, 'I do will it. Be made clean.'" Mark 1:40-41



Last week we read the story of Jesus healing a woman with a fever. In this weekend's Gospel, we find Jesus encountering a man with leprosy who our Lord heals of his affliction. The church and community saw leprosy as both a spiritual and physical disease. It was considered to be a punishment from God.

According to the law at the time, lepers were banned from the community. In order to be reunited, they had to prove to the local priest that they were healed. In this case, the leper knows the power of Jesus to heal if He wills it. The leper says to Jesus, "If you wish, you can make me clean." In essence, he believes Jesus has the same healing power as God. Jesus had pity and cleansed him of his affliction.

Keep in mind that this was also a spiritual cleansing, so that he can be healed in the eyes of God. Jesus orders him to go to the local priest and offer what Moses prescribed according to the Levitical law—in essence, to do penance.

This healing is the same healing we all desire, a healing from the scourge of sin. Like leprosy, sin could not be cured except by a divine intervention. We utilize the sacrament of reconciliation to relieve us and be healed of our spiritual afflictions which separate us from God and others. Have the courage to recognize your own afflictions and, like the leper, ask the Great Physician, our Lord, to bring healing to your heart, your soul and your mind. Remember, those that asked for healing and had faith received it. Making a good confession is a great way to start. **Bishop Gregory Parkes**



when. As pastors of the Catholic Church, we offer this state-

In the confessional and in our daily ministry and work with families, we have seen the corrosive damage caused by pornography—children whose innocence is stolen; men and women who feel great guilt and shame for viewing pornography occasionally or habitually; spouses who feel betrayed and traumatized; and men, women and children exploited by the pornography industry. While the production and use of pornography has always been a problem, in recent years its impact has grown exponentially, in large part due to the Internet and mobile technology. Some have even described it as a public health crisis. Everyone, in some way, is affected by increased pornography use in society. We all suffer negative consequences from its distorted view of the human person and sexuality. As bishops, we are called to proclaim anew the abundant mercy and healing of God found in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, and through his Church.
