



This Sunday, please be generous to The Peter's Pence Collection. June 29 is the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, a sign that Catholics around the world are joined together in support of the Holy Father.

A Concrete Sign of Mercy The concrete participation in the needs of the universal ecclesial community by the individual faithful or entire local churches raise awareness that all the baptized are called to materially sustain the work of evangelization and, at the same time, to help the poor in whatever way possible. By doing so, we build up the Church so that it will continue to minister to all for generations to come.

During his visit to Bangui in the Central African Republic, Pope Francis visited the city's pediatric hospital with a donation of medicines and a promise that he would not forget the country's children. With contributions raised to support Peter's Pence, the Holy Father kept that promise to the children of Bangui by constructing a new facility specifically for malnourished children. A Tradition of Support for the Holy Father for such papal efforts has its roots in the scriptural message to take care of the poor and is an expression of unity with the Holy Father. Peter's Pence expresses this unity through the ongoing activities of the Holy See and through the charitable works of the Holy Father on behalf of those most in need.

Carry your cross with faith

"Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction." Mark 5:34



As a priest and Bishop, I have encountered many people who are suffering. I've celebrated many funerals and witnessed the pain of a parent losing a child, a spouse losing a loved one and in my own life, the loss of my parents and older brother. Losing a friend or loved one is never easy, but we put our faith, our trust, in God - that He is in control and is holding those loved ones close to Him.

This weekend's Gospel finds Jesus encountering two different people who are suffering. First, He encounters a temple official, Jairus, urging Jesus to bring healing to his daughter who is at the point of death. It is interesting that the writer mentions the synagogue official four times. He is not a carpenter, a fisherman or other tradesman; He's a religious leader. Jairus obviously has heard of the miraculous works of Jesus and is desperate to save his daughter, and therefore, turns to Jesus in his time of need. Ironically, it would later be synagogue officials who would persecute Jesus and call for his death. But Jesus goes to the family in their time of desperation and heals the young girl.

On His way there, a woman, suffering from years of hemorrhaging, touches His cloak with the belief that He has the power to heal her. Jesus senses this and asks who touched Him. The woman admits to doing so, and Jesus said to her, "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction."

Two healings through faith in Jesus. Suffering and healing can come in many forms. Suffering from physical or mental illness, emotional strain, and heartache from a loss, just to name a few. During these trying times, we pray to Jesus to bring healing and peace to our lives. But, sometimes it seems that the prayer goes unanswered. The healing and peace don't come, at least not in the way that we want or expect them. We must remember that it is the will of God that prevails, not our own. Even our Lord Jesus, God's only son, the Savior of the world, had to suffer and die. It wasn't easy.

Life is not always easy. At times we endure pain to better understand and appreciate the love, peace, joy and hope that comes from the Lord. Pray that you have the strength to keep the faith and ask Jesus to walk with you as you courageously carry your own cross in life.



This initiative of the National Institute for the Family, serves as a clearinghouse for effective pastoral practices of the universal Church that address violence in the home. Contact dosp.org for information.




Making our way back to Mass and reception of Holy Communion.

Put Your Faith Into Action

If you are outside playing and fall and cut your knee, a band aid could be very important to you. If you reach into a knife



door and accidentally cut your finger on a knife, do you believe a band aid would help you? It would. A band aid could help to stop the bleeding. It would help to keep your cut clean. But in order for the band aid to work, what do you have to do? That is right. You have to put it over your cut or scrape. You can believe a band aid will help, but it can't until you put what you believe into action by placing a band aid on your wound.

We just heard two beautiful stories of people putting their faith into action. First, there was a woman who was sick. Everyone tried to help, but they could not make her better. She believed that Jesus could help. So she put her faith into action and reached out and touched Jesus' robe. Jesus tells us that it was her faith that healed her. Her faith put into action. The second story was about a man who had a daughter who was dying. He believed Jesus could make a difference. He became afraid and was losing his hope. Jesus told him not to be afraid but to have faith. Jesus brought his daughter back to life. Both the woman and the father had faith and put it into action by going to Jesus.

When we come to church to worship, or bow our heads in prayer, or tell someone about Jesus, or say grace before we eat, or choose to forgive and to love even someone who has hurt us, we are putting our faith into action. Then you will know that your faith is real. Then you will put your faith into action. And Jesus will do wonderful things in your life.

Prayer: Children, let us unite our hearts and hands in prayer. Lord Jesus, helps us to always look to you in life. May our faith call us often to worship and prayer. May our faith cause us to love you above everything else and to love each other as you love us. Jesus, in your name we pray and say, "Amen."
