


Jesus tells us something evident, "the blind cannot lead the blind." A disciple learns to be a good disciple from the teacher. The person who is fully trained is like the teacher who knows how to give sight to the blind. Before you can be a good disciple and teach others you must take care of yourself. Do not try to take a speck out of your brother's eye until you have taken the board out of your own. Finally, only when you have purified yourself can you produce the good works the teacher requires.

Discipleship asks us to produce good deeds. To produce them requires the integrity and purity of heart found in the teacher. When people see your good deeds they will know that this is because you have a good heart.

In order to do good deeds and be of service to others, we must have integrity and a good heart. The Catholic Ministry Appeal teaches us to understand Jesus' teachings and to examine our conscience and change our own behavior. Modeling good behavior is one appropriate way to participate in the mission of leading others to Jesus. Support children in understanding that Jesus teaches us to focus on our own behavior rather than focusing our attention on judging others. We can influence our friends in a positive way by first focusing on our own behavior and setting a good example caring for the needs of others.

This LENT we invite you to focus on your prayer life and praying with others.

The 40 days of Lent, provides one of the Church's most visible outward signs of faith when the minister uses ashes and inscribes a cross on the heads of the congregation.

Catholics know that the ashes represent mortality and penance—a reminder that our earthly lives are finite and that Lent is a season of sorrow for sins and consequent repentance. Ashes are used to mark a cross on the forehead to serves as a symbol to, "repent and believe in the Gospel."



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February 27, 2022 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks.

What we say and how we say it reveals the true intentions of our hearts. The content and manner of our speech is a window into the recesses of our souls. Our consciences, attitudes, sentiments, weaknesses, and motives are displayed. As much as we think we can hide the truth of our lives from others, we cannot. Who we really are is not only expressed on our lips but is written on our faces. Jesus says precisely this, "For every tree is known by its own fruit." What does the fruit of our lives say about us?

Because we like to play the game of hide and seek with ourselves, in pretending that we are hiding we deflect attention others may give to us by becoming more critical of others. After all, the more time one can spend analyzing others' behavior the less time one has to look at his or herself. Often, the behaviors we abhor most in others are the very ones we are guilty of ourselves. We just don't know it yet. The more we put ourselves in the role of a judge, the more

satisfaction and control we seem to achieve. Yet, what about ourselves? In



focusing our attention on the beams in others' eyes, the aridity and barrenness of our lives goes unchecked. St. Ambrose reminds us that "no one heals himself by wounding another." Bringing our brothers and sisters down by being overly critical, serves no positive purpose.

But the one who knows how easy it is to fall into sin and weakness and how quickly errors in judgment can be made, knows the depth of true compassion, mercy, and kindness. Having recognized our own poor choices, misguided opinions, negative emotions, and ability to do horrendous things, we can be more sympathetic and understanding of where others may be. We are designed to be mentors and guides to one another. In walking the journey together, we can help each other become the best we can be. Humility is the order of the day and the primary virtue that prevents us from being hypocrites. ©LPi

Peace and Quiet

In today's world it's hard to find a little peace and quiet in order to meet oneself and God. It's not easy to avoid the constant harassment of all kinds of calls and messages. The worries and hurry of each day tak up our whole attention. Not even in our own home, pervaded by television and digital

media, is it easy to find the tranquility and recollection we need to joyfully relax with God.

Have we forgotten what it means to pause, interrupt our hurry, free our minds for a few moments and let ourselves be penetrated by the silence and calm of sacred space? Often it's enough to stand still and be silent for a short time, in order to quiet the spirit and recover lucidity and peace. How much we need to find the silence that helps us to enter into contact with our very selves in order to recover our freedom and to rescue once again all our inner energy.

Accustomed to noise and agitation, we don't suspect the wellness that can

come from silence and being alone. Eager for news, images and impressions, we've forgotten how to be nourished and enriched in the deepest depths of our being.

Without some inner silence, we can't hear God, recognize the divine presence in our life and grow from within as human beings and as believers. According to Jesus, people draw goodness from the store of goodness in their hearts. Goodness doesn't blossom without help. We need to cultivate it and make it grow in the depth of our heart. How our lives would blossom if we stopped to notice what God is stirring up in our heart.



LENT gives us three extraordinary ways to draw closer into this mystery:
Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving.

Prayer: Prayer is conversation with God. It is essential for fasting and almsgiving because prayer gives us the strength to fast. Pope Francis said, "Lent is a privileged time for prayer." In prayer, we draw closer in relationship with God. Relationship with God makes us grateful for the blessings we have received. Prayer is the cornerstone of our Lenten journey and is vital to all of our actions in life. Scriptures Prayer: Zephaniah 3: 17; -John 16: 33; Philippians 3: 10-11


Fasting & Abstinence: Fasting and abstinence are old traditions in Judeo-Christian history and early Lenten practice. Found in the Scriptures, they offer a way of growing closer to God. Pope Francis reminds us, "Fasting makes sense if it really chips away at our security and, as a consequence, benefits someone else..."

The current regulations:- Individuals between the ages of 18 and 59 are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by having only one full meal and two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal

- All over the age of 14 are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent.

In addition to the above traditional forms, try fasting from social media, technology, gossip, and excessive screen time. Fasting reminds us of our Scripture References for Fasting: Joel 2: 12-14; Isaiah 58: 6-7.

Matthew 6: 16-18; Mark 1: 12-15



Almsgiving: Almsgiving (giving) is a response to God, one that we can come to through prayer and fasting. It is a way to live out our gratitude for all that God has given us, reflecting the realization that we are the Body of Christ, responsible for each other. Justice, mercy, and charity are integral elements of our baptism that call us to be disciples of Jesus.

Scripture References for Almsgiving: Leviticus 19: 9-10; Proverbs 19: 17 Luke 19: 1-10; Romans 15: 25-28 Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving lead us to the heart of what Lent is about - a deeper conversion. ~
