

Did you know donating part or all unused retirement assets is one option donors can choose to give to the Catholic Ministry Appeal and their parish? However, many who could benefit from giving this way are not making the choice to do so.

"People may not know or understand how giving from an IRA works," shared Annmarie Nichter, Corpus Christi parishioner. "Many non-profits inform their supporters about giving this way. It's important to let our parishioners know our Church is a qualified non-profit and can benefit from a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) contribution".

This type of giving from an individual retirement account (IRA) is sometimes referred to as an "IRA Charitable Rollover Gift" because a donor is "rolling" a distribution directly to a charity. Distributions made directly from a Traditional IRA to a charity can be used to satisfy all or a portion of the RMD for those 70 ½ or older, (each year). Also, this type of gift can help an individual reduce federal income taxes because it is not added into their annual income, may help to avoid the Medicare high income surcharge, may reduce income tax on social security benefits, and also possibly reduce income taxes.

We encouraged you to share information regularly with parishioners about this type of giving. Thank you.

Transfiguration of Jesus

See yourself with Jesus as he takes three of his disciples up the mountain to pray. Jesus wanted to be alone with his closest friends taking some quiet time away from the crowds. Read the Gospel to see what you might find if we take some quiet time away from the noise of our busy lives in quiet prayer.


During this time of prayer, Jesus was transfigured, and Moses and Elijah appeared to him. Peter, James, and John were sleeping while Jesus was praying. God shows them who Jesus really is, and told them to listen to him.

During Lent, we slow down and seek out time for quiet prayer. In silence we can be more attentive to Jesus who wants us to follow his word and example. Our Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving help us to listen and follow Jesus more faithfully.

This LENT we encourage you to focus on your prayer life and praying with others.

There is time to join with a small group to take time out of your busy day to pray. Join one of our Book Study using the Busy Person's Guide to Prayer. Parish groups meet in the Education Bldg. on Wednesday 10 AM, or 7 PM, on Thursday 2 PM, or Friday 10 AM. All are welcome to join. Please encourage others to be part of a group.

The material for group sharing is a practical tool to use with advice; con-



sider this, try this, pray this in each *chapter*. Like chapter 5 Prayer of Friendship, *Finding faith in one another*. Chapters are short and can help one another in praying together. Time is used for teaching, sharing and prayer. You have so much to gain in praying with others. Just call and give your name, day, and time to join.

The Joy of the Transfiguration of Jesus.

Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good that we are here; let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." Luke 9:33

Peter was excited. It may be more appropriate to say that he was overwhelmed! Because he had just been given a very small glimpse of the glory and splendor of God! Jesus took Peter, James and John and they went up a high mountain together. They had no idea what was coming. Most likely while on the way they were complaining interiorly, wondering why they had to go up the mountain. The mountain is a symbol of our journey to Heaven. It takes focus and drive, commitment and resolve to go there, and it's an elevated place, a place away from the ordinary occurrences of life.

So they were on this difficult climb up the mountain and suddenly they stopped in shock and awe. They saw before their eyes Jesus changed in a glorious way, His clothing being whiter than any white they had ever seen. And Moses and Elijah, the great Law-giver and the great Prophet, were there before them conversing with Jesus. Jesus, who up until this moment had kept His divinity veiled, lifted the veil and His divinity shone through brighter than anything this world could ever contain.

These three close friends would need that taste of God's glory for the road ahead. They would need to remember what their final destiny was. They would need to hold this experience close as they endured the many crosses and sufferings ahead. Because on the summit is a glory so great that no hardship they would have to endure would ever prove to be too big.

God wants to give that message to us through them. He wants us to ponder this experience they had and He wants us to try to enter into it so that we too can willingly press on during the journey.

Reflect, today, on the glory of God that makes the crosses we endure all worth it. Take advantage of this experience and try to make their experience your own. Be consoled by God's glory and never forget that this is the ultimate promise He gives to all who press on.

My transfigured Lord, may I be consoled by Your glory and splendor. May I believe in this glory and keep it ever in my mind as I press on through the hardships and challenges I face. You travel the road ahead of me and You will lead me on my journey if I only trust in You. Jesus, I do trust in You!

The Transfiguration reveals Jesus as the Son of God—but this isn't for Jesus's sake. He knows his identity. Instead, the Transfiguration is a gift for the Church founded on His apostles. Just before the Lord's entry into Jerusalem, where He will suffer His passion and death, He gives Peter, John, and James a glimpse of His glory and the truth of who He is. It is this experience of His glory and the conviction that He is the Son of God that will sustain these apostles at their darkest hour—in John's case, at the foot of the Cross, and for Peter, in the aftermath of his denial of Christ.

The Transfiguration is a gift for us as well. We're on our own journey with Jesus towards Jerusalem, as we move into the second week of Lent. Jesus reminds of His glory, and His power

over death, just as the going can get a little tough for us—when the Lenten practices and penances we committed to so eagerly just over a week ago can begin to feel like burdens. By revealing His power and glory, Jesus shows us that He isn't a prize we'll receive on the other side of Easter, but He's a presence that will be with us throughout the journey—including in our Lenten "darkest hours!"

One practice we're emphasizing as a parish this Lent is almsgiving—especially giving to our diocesan Catholic Ministry Appeal. The Transfiguration helps us see that when we pickup our cross through our giving—even and especially when it involves some sacrifice on our part—we're not alone. We're with Jesus, the Lord of Life. Let's meditate upon the Transfiguration and see how we might be moved to give in light of the truth of who Jesus is and His closeness to us.



Lent is a time of penance as we express our sorrow for sin and seek to be reconciled to God and one another. Last week, our faith formation children preparing for their first Holy Communion received the Sacrament of Penance for the first time. The children are so blessed to have Jessie Camerieri as their teacher. Charlene Vassalli, our faith formation director, has been overseeing the different grades grow in grace each year. Father Bill and Father Dominic were available to hear confessions, absolving from sin in the name of Our Lord, Jesus Christ. We need this Sacramental grace so desperately, it is a gift. Father Bill took the children on a pilgrimage around the church teaching them. He began with the Tabernacle and Sanctuary light, and helping the child to know all the saints who circle us in prayer.
