

# Noticing God in Our Everyday Lives.

Thank you picking up a book to join us in this adventure to simply notice God in new ways that will bring a lasting impact from the book "And That Got Me to Thinking. Lent in coming to an end. It is our hope that groups might continue to meet during the weeks of Easter. We hope to work with you as our parish take on the practice of noticing God in our daily life.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. Set against the backdrop of Jesus' impending death, many elements of the raising of Lazarus foreshadow the good news of Jesus' own Resurrection. Jesus, facing the conflict with the Jewish authorities, acts in complete obedience to God. In raising Lazarus, Jesus shows his power over death so that when Jesus dies, those who believe in him might remember that and take hope. Just as Jesus calls for the stone to be rolled away from Lazarus's tomb, so too will the disciples find the stone rolled away from Jesus' tomb.

With our catechumens preparing for their Baptism at Easter, the Gospel today calls us to reflect on Baptism as a dying and rising with Jesus. In Baptism we die to sin's power over us, rising as children of God. In Baptism we join ourselves with Christ, who conquered death once and for all so that we who believe in him may have eternal life. With Martha and Mary, we are called to profess our belief that Jesus is indeed the Resurrection and the life.

### **Gospel Reflection**

Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life' wehoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do You Believe this?"

This statement is perplexing. A person of this world who does not know God or Jesus will find it difficult to fathom its meaning. A person who knows God and Christ will understand what this is all about. In God there is no death.


In the heavenly context, people of this world are intrinsically dead until they begin to know God, love Him, serve Him, praise and glorify Him. This is why when Jesus says He is the resurrection and life, He means that when you believe in Him and then die the physical death, you will continue living.

This is because He will raise you spiritually and give you new life since He is the resurrection and life. This is reinforced by the fact that our spiritual life after physical death is more important than the physical life we have right now. It still means if you believe in Jesus Christ while you are still physically alive, then your soul is alive and it will never die after the body dies.

Martha, knew too well about the resurrection of the dead, that is why she told Jesus, "I know he [Lazarus] will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." But Jesus then taught us about the different resurrection and life that He is. Jesus is not interested so much on our short-lived physical life but the everlasting life that our souls will enjoy after our physical death.

Let us realize today that Jesus Christ came to teach us about the Kingdom of Heaven, so that He can raise us from the death we are in. Let us put into practice the teachings of Christ so that we can continue knowing God, loving him, serving and praising Him. By doing so, Jesus guarantees us everlasting life after our physical death.

**Prayer:** Lord Jesus Christ, we believe that You are the resurrection and life. We ask You to grant us strength to push through the challenges of this world without giving in to the temptations of the evil one. May You, during the last day, raise us to the new heavenly life where we will praise You, The Holy Spirit and our Heavenly Father, in communion with the Angels and Saints. **Amen.** 



In today's Gospel, Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead. In doing so, he forecasts two events: his return from the dead and ours. Death, and the events that follow, are challenging and often hide at the edge of our consciousness. It drives us to avoid aggressive drivers, work harder, or hold close the ones we love at goodbyes. ### The Paschal Mystery of our Salvation

liturgy of the Church, the celebration of the sacraments, and the seasons of Lent and Easter are particular times when we pay attention to what Jesus Christ has done for us through his passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension. Yet these are not the only times when we experience **the Paschal Mystery.** It is a part of our everyday life; it is the undercurrent of all that we do and all that we are.

What does this mean? How do I *experience* the Paschal Mystery? How does it affect me on a day-to-day basis? How do I become aware of its presence in my life in a real way and not just something I know about?

First, let's look at the Paschal Mystery in general terms, without any religious lingo. The Paschal Mystery is basically the process of dying and rising, death and new life. We see this all around us and in our own lives.

For example, we experience the process of dying and rising each year as we go through the different seasons. Summer is a time of vibrancy and life, which then gives way to fall, when leaves on the trees die and fall away and many plants seem to die. Winter comes and with it the frost and chill that seem to halt all growth and life. But after winter, when it seemed as if everything had died away, spring arrives. New life surrounds us. Daffodils and crocuses begin to push through the oncefrozen ground. The bare branches of trees begin to show signs of new leaves.

We are a part of nature too. Not only do we experience the seasons and see the process of dying and rising, we also have our own dyings and risings. Sometimes these are obvious—for example, a grandparent dies or a baby is born. But other dyings and risings are less obvious. An experience of dying might be when you have an argument with a friend that leaves you feeling upset, or you see a homeless mother and child and don't know what to do to help. An experience of rising might be reconciling with someone you hurt or who hurt you, talking with your family about the homeless mother and child and discovering that an organization like the St. Vincent de Paul Society has the people and the resources to care for people who are homeless. These are some of the dyings and risings that we experience every day

Now when we look at the Paschal Mystery in the context of our religious beliefs and the life of Jesus Christ, we come to a deeper meaning of dying and rising. Jesus Christ's passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension are the ultimate event of dying and rising, of death and new life. We learn from Jesus that new life can come from death, that we can find meaning in tough times, that there really is light in the darkness. We learn that all life has this rhythm rament, Chaplet of Divine Mercy, Praises of of dying and rising and that God is with us in good times and in bad. Christ's experience of suffering, death, and new life has forever changed us and given us a different way of living. Death no longer has the last word. Plus, when we encounter tough times, we have the comfort of knowing that God has "been there, done that" and the power of hope that new life will come from death. Becoming conscious of our own dyings and risings helps us have a greater sense of compassion for others and a greater willingness to reach out.

Think about your own life. What is a dying or rising that you have experienced today, this week, this year? Reflect on that experience in light of the event of Jesus Christ's passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension.

You are invited to the Annual Celebration of

Mercy Sunday at St. Vincent de Paul Church. On Sunday, April 16, at 3:00 pm. The program includes Exposition of the Blessed Sac-Divine Mercy, Scripture Readings and Veneration of the Image of Divine Mercy.

Divine Mercy candles will be for sale, for placement at the Shrine. The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday, April 7. We will pray together after the daily 8:30 am Mass, every day except Easter Sunday (you will need to pray privately at home), until the novena ends on Saturday April 15th.
