A letter from our pastor, Father Matt/Una carta de nuestro párroco, Padre Mateo

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We are approaching our Passover: Easter. On the first Feast of Passover, the Hebrew people were enslaved by the pharaoh in Egypt. As Moses pleaded with the pharaoh on behalf of his people to let them go, the angel of death passed over the houses of the Hebrew people who had sprinkled the blood of a lamb on their

doorposts. This event led them to be freed from slavery to the pharaoh and, guided by God, begin their forty year journey to the Promised Land. Jesus' betrayal and death occurred on the Passover in order to fulfill it. Jesus Christ is the Lamb of God, our lamb, whose blood was poured forth upon the wood of the cross. By Jesus' death and resurrection, death has passed over us and we have been set free from slavery to sin so as to journey to the Promised Land of Heaven. Just as the Passover is the most sacred feast that reminds the Jewish people of their identity, so, too, Easter reminds us of who we are and where we are going. We have been given a great gift, a gift more precious than anything the world can ever give. The Creator Himself, God, has given Himself to us so that we can have eternal life. I can't earn eternal life by my own merits and actions. I am only human, but God has chosen to unite humanity to Himself, and, in a perfect act of love and mercy, has conquered sin and destroyed death so that we might have life and have it in abundance in the Promised Land of Heaven.

Today, tomorrow, and Tuesday, we have the opportunity to grow deeper in our prayer lives and in friendship with God. Fr. David Peck will be presenting our parish mission, and the topic is "Talking to God". I encourage you to attend.

I also would like to bring to your attention that Wednesday, April 3rd, is Life Advocacy Day. There will be buses leaving for Springfield from Corpus Christi Church in Carol Stream to advocate for the innate dignity of human life and against two particular bills that would repeal bans on partial birth abortion, conscience protection, certain clinical regulations, and parental notification. You can register to participate at dioceseofjoliet.org/life. Do not hesitate to contact our representatives, and please continue to pray for our lawmakers, and let us pray for and accompany those who find themselves in crisis pregnancies.

Know of my daily prayers for all of you, and let us continue to pray for one another.

Assistive Listening Devices

Our church is now equipped with an assistive listening system to aid those with hearing aids or those who do not have hearing aids but have trouble hearing. If you have a hearing aid with a t-coil, turn it on and wear one of the two neck loop lanyards with battery pack that we have. If you do not have a hearing aid, we have three universal ear speakers with battery pack that you can use. It fits over your ear with a clip (it doesn't go inside your ear) and has a little speaker. The volume can be adjusted to meet your needs on all the units. If you would like to try one, please see an usher prior to Mass.

Lenten Regulations

- 1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- 2. All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.
- 3. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.



ILLINOIS BISHOPS WARN AGAINST EXTREME ABORTION LEGISLATION IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, misnamed the Reproductive Health Act, include so many harmful provisions the full effect of these bills can hardly be imagined. We know the legislation:

- seeks to define abortion as health care and a fundamental right;
- removes abortion clinics from a regulatory framework designed for significant medical procedures;
- attacks a carefully constructed agreement in law on how hospitals care for the victims of sexual assault;
- repeals the ban on partial birth abortion;
- repeals legal protections for doctors and hospitals who decline to participate in abortions;
- requires private health insurance in Illinois to fully cover the cost of abortion;
- removes the requirement that only doctors can perform abortions;
- as well as many other changes that in totality require us to treat abortion as a celebrated right instead of a heartwrenching tragedy.

Abortion is not health care. It is the intentional taking of innocent and defenseless human life. Moreover, provisions in the law that allow healthcare providers to live and work in accordance with their sincerely-held moral beliefs are not wrong. Freedom of religion and conscience protections are fundamental rights, enshrined in our state and federal constitutions, and they must be respected.

House Bill 2467 and Senate Bill 1594 seek to repeal the Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, which has been in statute since 1995 and enforced since 2013, ensures parents are involved in profound medical decisions involving their children. Every other state bordering Illinois – Wisconsin, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri and Iowa – requires at least parental notification. It is a broadly-supported, reasonable safeguard that allows parents to properly exercise love and care for their children. Our government should support families, not undermine them. Opposition to these bills do not require one to assume a pro-life political position. Opposition should be the natural result of applying reason, fairness and a basic respect for human dignity to the examination of their contents. We cannot further devalue human life to the extent proposed in this legislation without dire consequences for ourselves.

Please continue to pray for the babies and moms. After only 5 days into the 40 Days for Life campaign, 31 babies were saved that they know of. How many more that our prayers saved will only be know when we meet our Lord in heaven.

Each year on December 25 we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. For centuries the Church has also celebrated his conception on March 25th, the feast of the Annunciation. Our parish Respect Life Committee invites you on March 25th to begin a nine month commemoration of the gestation of the Child Jesus in Mary's womb, and to Spiritually adopt a baby that is in danger of abortion. Around the 25th of each month in the bulletin will be a bulletin article explaining the growth of the babies. Choose a name for your baby and pray for them and their parents using Archbishop Fulton Sheen's prayer below and pray for them daily. There will be prayer cards on the tables in the narthex of the Church and Chapel and by the baby poster in the Church. Jesus and your adopted baby are counting on you.

During this first month of pregnancy, the baby's heart is beating, and by the 20th day, the brain, spinal cord and nervous system are developed. He has arms, legs, eyes, ear, kidneys a liver, a mouth and an umbilical cord. A placenta forms as a barrier to keep his mother's blood separate, while allowing nourishment and oxygen to pass through. The awesome news that a mother is with child can be greeted with great joy or dread-filled sorrow. Each year in the U.S. some 1.7 million mothers and fathers choose to still those beating hearts and reject those budding lives. Pray for all mothers and fathers that they may choose life for their unborn children.

As you may recall, in our Diocesan paper, **Christ is Our Hope**, there was an article about Catholic Charities. It shared the story of the numerous homeless children having to sleep on the floor, in sleeping bags, in the dining room in their Day Center in Joliet. Sleep on the floor-can you imagine that?

I challenged the kids to think of what it must feel like to have no bed, no soft mattress, no sheets or blankets to call their own. I challenged them to sleep on the floor in their dining rooms, in sleeping bags, for the nights during lent, and then they would know what it means to have nothing of their own. Then I challenged them to take this challenge seriously-to not spend their money on items they really do not need, but to save it for these children who have nothing. To hear the words of Jesus, saying to all of us, "Do unto others as you would have done for yourself"!

I challenged them to do extra chores and if paid, to put that money into the plastic bag. To possibly cut an activity out of their normal routine, save that money for these homeless children. In other words, give of themselves so others can live a wee bit better!

This challenge is not restricted to the children-it is for every-one! Maybe it is skip the Starbucks-give the 5 bucks to Catholic Charities. Maybe it is skip the pizza night, and have a "soup and bread" meal-give that money to Catholic Charities. Maybe it is stay home instead of going out to dinner, give that money to Catholic Charities. It can be "your sacrifice" – give it to Catholic Charities!




