Reflections on the Advent Season



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

On the first Sunday of Advent, the Church begins her four-week preparation for the celebration of Christmas, the birth of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. The liturgical color of Advent is purple, which suggests that there is a certain penitential dimension to this season. The readings for this season stress the need to stay awake and be ready as we await the coming of the Lord.

According to the tradition of the Church there are three comings of the Lord. The first when he was born of the Virgin Mother in Bethlehem to fulfill the ancient prophecies made by God to his people, Israel. The second coming is the saving presence of Christ in each new generation of believers as they live out their daily lives in obedience to his teaching. His third and final coming will be the end of time when he returns in glory to judge and to make all things new. Our lives might be described as an Advent, as a time of waiting in faith for the final coming of our Savior.

During his time on earth Christ taught us to pray for the coming of God's Kingdom. Each of us, therefore, is called upon to play our part in building up that kingdom by what we say and do in the ordinary events of our lives.

Let us remember that Christ here and now comes to us whenever we think thoughts of peace, pray for peace and reconciliation, and follow his example of loving our neighbor as he taught. As he says, blessed indeed are the peacemakers!

The days and weeks leading up to Christmas are busy for most of us, but the wonderful season of Advent gently reminds us to stop, take stock, and to remember and make our own the great truth of our faith that the Son of Mary still knocks today at our door, desiring our company and friendship, and that he will finally return to take us home to heaven.

I encourage you to read through this newsletter and consider ways you can actively participate in and grow in faith as a disciple of Christ. Holy Family Parish has many service opportunities, extra Adoration and Confession times, and feast days in the coming months. Additionally, every person of our parish has free access to the Lakeshore Academy for the New Evangelization's (LANE) classes and resources which include "The Road to Bethlehem: Advent and Christmas Time" program. This self-paced program features a compilation of Advent and Christmas resources which include themes; to experience Jesus more fully in the Eucharist, to honor Jesus as King, to delve more deeply into Advent devotions, sounds of the seasons with music playlists, and activities focused on the Saints celebrated in the Advent and Christmas seasons leading all the way to Epiphany.

I pray that Advent may be a grace filled time for you and your families, and that you may experience all the blessings of him, who is the Prince of Peace.

Advent and Christmas time give us an opportunity to refocus on Jesus' coming in the Mass.

Holy Days:

- First Sunday of Advent: November 27th @ 5pm, 28th @ 9 & 11 am. (Adult Choir at 11am Mass)
- Second Sunday of Advent: December 4th @ 5pm, 5th @ 9 & 11 am. (Bell Choir at 5pm Mass & Adult Choir at 9am)
- Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Patronal Feast Day of the United States of America): December 8th @ 9 am & 7pm.
- Third Sunday of Advent: December 11th @ 5pm, 12th @ 9 & 11 am. (Harp Soloist Alyssa Bursch at all Masses)
- Fourth Sunday of Advent: December 18th @ 5pm & 19th @ 9 & 11 am. (Adult Choir at 5pm –Bell Choir at 9 & 11am)
- Christmas Eve Masses: December 24th @ 4pm, 7pm & 10pm. (Music will begin 25 minutes prior to each Mass-4pm-Family Choir, 7 & 10 pm Soloists and Ensembles)
- Nativity of the Lord: December 25th @ 10 am. (Music will begin 25 minutes prior to Mass)
- Feast of the Holy Family: December 26th @ 9 & 11am
- Vigil of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God: December 31st @ 7pm.
- Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God: January 1st @ 5pm.
- Epiphany of the Lord: January 2nd @ 9 & 11 am.
- Baptism of the Lord: January 8th @ 5pm, 9th @ 9 & 11am.




Obtain the King's Pardon in Confession

Part Time Positions Available

Holy Family is looking for a part-time team member for the role of the **Children's Ministry Coordinator**. This role is a part-time position which coordinates the students and volunteers within the Monday and Wednesday K-5 sessions, and through providing support for homeschooling families. The ideal candidate has knowledge and experience working with children and families, and has a heart to serve the Lord and His people. The CMC will work closely with the Director of Discipleship and faith formation staff, and should be a practicing Catholic in good standing.

Holy Family is also looking to fill the position of **Parish Care Coordinator**. This role coordinates the parish's pastoral care ministry to parishioners and their families who are sick, elderly,

homebound, bereaved, or struggling with exceptional life circumstances. Responsible for the recruitment, education, and evaluation of volunteer ministers. Establishes a network of community referral resources and oversees the making of referrals to assist parishioners in need. Coordinates the regular prayer presence and sacramental visitations for the sick and dying. May serve as a leader of prayer at wakes, meetings, community meetings, church services and nursing homes.

Faith Formation and Bible Study


Christmas Break Class/No Class dates

Faith Formation: There are no Faith Formation classes Dec. 20 - Jan. 2. Bible Study: There is no Bible Study on 12/29.


Classes resume Monday, Jan 2, 2022.
