Lent is the time before Easter during which the faithful abstain and fast in remembrance of the ultimate

sacrifice Jesus made on Calvary. It is a 40-day time of preparation before Easter, the memorial of the death and resurrection of Jesus. There are two main ways that Catholics use to focus on growing closer to God during the Lenten season: abstinence and fasting.

Who should be fasting? Those ages 18 - 59 must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (Canon 97). On such days, those fasting may eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength. However, together, the smaller meals should not equal a full meal. Eating between meals is not encouraged, but liquids are allowed.

What is Abstinence? During Lent, we encouraged to undertake some sort of personal penance or abstinence. Examples include giving up sweets, a favorite TV show or not listening to the radio in the car on the way to work. Giving up these things isn't some sort of endurance test, but these acts are done to draw the faithful closer to Christ.




Holy Family to Celebrate 50 Years in 2020!

Holy Family Parish will be celebrating 50 years in the year of 2020! Throughout this year you will see and hear many things about our parish; how it was formed, who was involved, who our founders are and many fun stories! Watch the upcoming newsletters and bulletins; we will be highlighting some of our founding families that are still parishioners today! Our second installment is below. Two of our founding families were interviewed for this article; Clem Andrusiak and Don Aldrich. We hope you will enjoy the stories of our history!

Clem Andrusiak when asked about family and the new church said in the beginning the church didn't have the kneelers in place, but it was exciting to have a new parish and new vitality amongst the parish family. Clem and Roberta Grace started their ministry in 1963 at St. Mary's. Roberta converted to Catholicism when she attended Eastern Michigan University. Roberta and I decided that we would trade off. One would be involved in church and one would take care of family. We had 5 boys and a girl; John, Richard, Michael, Joseph, Robb and Ann Marie. Roberta was involved with assisting with the census for the new church. That's how we met Bob Powers. We had just moved into the area and we would drive around the neighborhoods and see if you were Catholic. Fr. Schafer had us doing that.

Michael is the only one still remaining at Holy Family. Robb goes to St.Roberts and I have them scattered all over. There is one in Ypsilanti, one in Saginaw, John who is an organist. He was a pastoral associate and has been an organist all of his life. He started here at Holy Family in high school. Roberta played piano and encouraged John to be an organist. He still plays today. Bill Mervau said when he heard John play here that we should shackle him to the organ so he couldn't leave.





Roberta was in charge of the Altar boys at St. Mary's. Especially with all of the boys we had, we took care of a large part of it.

Don Aldrich also came from St. Mary's. They first attended St. Francis and moved to Caledonia in 1954 where they started attending St. Mary's. Don was married to Alice Bechtel and they had 5 children, Roberta, Deborah, Timothy, Denise and Jeffrey. Don converted to Catholicism in 1951, right after they got married. Jerry Anderson was his sponsor.

When asked about their involvement in the church, Don said he was involved with the building of the new parish. They first started with the survey of St. Mary's, St. Patrick and St. Joseph's to find out who was interested in the new church. Fr. Shafer spearheaded this project and Don and Alice worked with Gary Durkee, Bob Wright, Phil Joyce and Gilbert Rich. We found out that the majority of St. Patrick's didn't want a new church because they had a very deep attachment to their parish. St. Mary's and St. Joseph's did have an interest.

Don was part of the men's club that was started and met at the local American Legion Club. The K of C didn't exist in Caledonia yet. They did many of the things the Knights do now. They helped plant the sod for the new church, they hosted the Mother/Daughter breakfast, and also started the coffee after Mass. Alice started the soup suppers at Holy Family. She continued with the suppers until her health failed, over 27+ years. Alice used to bowl at Middlevilla on a women's team and that's how the Holy Family Sunday bowling league was formed and lasted for over 20 years. Don and Clem are still bowling out at Spectrum Lanes in a seniors league.

Clem was a lector for 17 years, is currently a Eucharistic Minister, was on the pastoral council and was the president 3 times. He was also instrumental in a couple of the building additions. One of his proudest memories was when he organized the burning of the mortgage party. This meant the parish was finally debt free. Clem was also a Grand Knight in 1982.

We asked about the parking lot not being completed for the first Mass on Christmas Eve (1970) and some folks vehicles got stuck in the mud. Don said he would clean the church and always had muddy footprints to clean up. Don also organized and maintained a Catholic Magazine Rack and continued this ministry for over 35 years.

After the church was built there were at least 500 families that came from St. Mary's and St. Joseph's. This church was always very friendly.

Don described the church back then as being a Holy Family "Family" and feels it still is today. They had a festival with a horse drawn wagon for rides. The festival was open to the community and was a money maker. Don and Clem both used to help with the chicken dinners and felt these were a way to help get the community together.

Clem feels that one of the roles Holy Family played in community was having the tabernacle in the chapel so that high school students could come into the church and have concerts and other activities. Holy Family was a central point of community activities back in the '70's.

Don feels that Right to Life is probably one of the biggest roles and also the 4th of July in helping serve in the community. His favorite memories of the times was him leading The Stations of the Cross and the Rosary every Sunday in May.

What does Holy Family mean to you right now? Clem's response was my mom sort of molded me and my family. We went to Mass every Sunday regardless of where we were.

Forty-Six Days of Lent?

When we count the number of days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, we find forty-six. Then, why do we say there are forty days of Lent? If we subtract the six Sundays in Lent, then we are left with forty days. Does that mean Sundays do not count as a Lenten day where we are bound to our Lenten practices? Not really.




Somewhere around the Middle Ages,

the Church required the faithful to fast* (eat only one main meal a day) and abstain from meat and eggs for forty days. On Sunday, the Lord's Day, the faithful were not bound to keep the fast. They could eat three full meals, but they still observed their other Lenten practices. For example: If a person gave up cake for Lent, he would still abstain from it on Sunday. Or if a person resolved to pray the rosary each day during Lent, he would still pray it on Sundays. The faithful fasted and abstained for forty days, but observed Lent for the duration of the Lenten season (which has varied through the years since the early Christians).

Sundays are part of the penitential season. Forty days in biblical times simply denotes an important event: the exact number of days is not intended to be taken literally. We are free to choose and voluntarily carry out our Lenten disciplines, so we can design our personal plan to accommodate Sundays, or any day, if we wish. Thoughtful consideration for our commitments during Lent can help us enter more deeply into the spirit and richness of the season. Blessings on your Lenten journey!

*(In more recent years, rather than require the fast, the Church has come to strongly encourage the faithful to fast voluntarily. Ash Wednesday, and Fridays during Lent remain the only days where fasting is required.)


