

Let us join together to wrap them as they prayerfully await the opportunity to receive their Sacraments.!



The Eucharistic Miracle of Santarem

A woman who as living in Santarem, Portugal was upset that her husband was unfaithful. She decided to consult a sorceress who told her the price of her help was a consecrated host.

She went to Mass at St. Stephen and received the. Eucharist on her tongue, removed it and wrapped it in her veil. Before she got out of the church the host began to bleed.

When she got home, she put the bloodied host in a trunk. A miraculous light emanated from the trunk that night. She went the next day she went to confession. The priest came and took the host back to the church. The church was renamed Church of the Holy Miracle and the host remains on display still today.

Central Message of Our Faith

Sometimes today we hear of people who complain that the Mass is not relevant for them. Sadder still are those who have ceased going to Mass altogether, perhaps even priding themselves on their 'independence'.

In the new liturgy we can have difficulties with the Mass which were not there long ago. The change to the vernacular has made us more dependent on the way Mass is celebrated. Nevertheless we must keep clearly in mind that, no matter how poorly the liturgy is carried out, the Mass remains the central mystery of faith and the table of the Bread of Life. What God sets before us in the Mass is much More significant than how people celebrate it. The same miracle of God's love for the ordinary people of this world is there waiting for us, just as it waited on our ancestors. If we do not appreciate it as they did, the difference is ultimately in us, not in the Mass.



Indeed this is part of the point in saying that the Mass is a mystery of faith. Understanding a mystery is not like understanding a problem in arithmetic or geometry. With religious truth the explanation can bring us only part of the way. A further appreciation of the mystery will come only by living it, not just by talking about it. Mysteries of faith are more like the parables in the Gospel. They show us up for what we are. The meaning is revealed only to those who live them, but is concealed from those who refuse to enter into them (Mt 13: 10-15)

Most likely that is why the Mass meant so much to our forebears. It was because they lived the cross in their daily lives that they could appreciate the sacrifice of the cross in the Mass. The Mass is indeed a great wonder, a stirring truth which can sustain us throughout our lives, but it is a hidden treasure that is revealed only toward God's little ones. So if you find yourself saying that the Mass for you is 'irrelevant', be careful! Do not point the finger at the Mass. IN the first place point the finger at yourself.

From the Eucharist the Church draws her life. From this 'living bread' she draws her nourishment.

Act of Perfect Contrition:



The Holy Father has recently drawn attention to the fact that, before Easter, many faithful go to Confession to meet with God again. "However," he acknowledged, "many will say to me today: 'But, Father, where can I find a priest, a confessor, because one can't leave home? And I want to make peace with the Lord, I want Him to embrace me, that my Papa embrace me . . . What can I do if I can't find priests?'"

"Do what the Catechism says," the Pope stressed, "it's very clear: if you don't find a priest to hear your Confession, talk with God, He is your Father, and tell Him the truth: 'Lord, I've done this, and that, and that . . . I'm sorry,' and ask Him for forgiveness with all your heart, with the Act of Contrition and promise Him: 'Afterwards I will go to Confession, but forgive me now.'"

"If you do all this," Francis said, "you will return to God's grace immediately. As the *Catechism* teaches," he reminded, "you yourself can approach God's forgiveness without having a priest at hand. Think: 'it's the moment!' And this is the right moment, the opportune moment. An Act of Contrition well made," Francis said, "will make our soul become white as snow." –

Plenary indulgence for those who offer certain prayers for an end to the pandemic

This indulgence is available for as long as the pandemic lasts to any member of the faithful who meet these requirements:

- 1. Performance of the work specified in the Indulgence with the intention of gaining an indulgence:
- Offer one of the following "to implore from Almighty God the end of the epidemic, relief for those who are afflicted and eternal salvation for those whom the Lord has called to Himself":
 - oA visit to the Blessed Sacrament or Eucharistic adoration
 - Reading the Holy Scriptures for at least half an hour
 - oRecitation of the Holy Rosary
 - oPious exercise of the Way of the Cross
 - oRecitation of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy
- 2. Meeting these three conditions, or having the sincere intention to fulfill them as soon as possible:
 - a. Being truly repentant and receiving absolution in the Sacrament of Penance
 - b.Reception of Holy Communion
 - c.Praying for the Holy Father's intentions.
 - d.3. Total detachment from any inclination to sin, even venial sins.
