

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Brothers and sisters: I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." SEQUENCE FOR CORPUS CHRISTI - A sequence is a chant or hymn sung before the recitation of the Gospel during the form of the mass. It was an early form of liturgical expression and a place for poetry to be inserted into the liturgy. However, by the time of the Council of Trent, which served to address many of the complaints of the Protestant reformers, there were thousands of sequences that had been added to liturgies written on subjects both sacred and secular by poets and musicians of all types. In 1570, the missal of Pope Paul V, abolished all but four sequences, the one for Easter, Pentecost, Corpus Christi and the Funeral mass. The Stabat Mater was added back into liturgical usage later for the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows.

Luke 9:11b-17



During the Middle Ages it was sung at the elevation of the Host during the consecration.
