From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend we conclude our Easter season with the celebration of the great feast of Pentecost—the sending of the Holy Spirit.



Originally in Jesus' time and culture, this moment was one of the three pilgrimage feasts of Judaism. Passover was the feast of unleavened bread; 50 days later was Pentecost or the feast of weeks (seven, to be precise) that coincided with the first reaping of the wheat crop, and finally, the feast of Tabernacles or Booths which was the harvest feast. So Pentecost, as an agricultural pilgrimage feast, celebrated the first-fruits being harvested and then offered to God collectively, as a community. If we recall the intimate partnership of the Hebrew understanding of God's blessings, we see the very central role that God's grace plays in growing crops and reaping a benefit from them. While human beings toil to plant, water, and fertilize, God provides the sunshine and rain and causes the otherwise lifeless seeds to germinate and grow. The only proper response to the first harvesting of any crop is to offer it back to God as a recognition of our utter dependence on God's goodness and beneficence. In other words, while we may work really hard at trying to grow the food we need, it really is all about God's goodness to us.

In the early Church, the celebration of Pentecost and the sending of the Holy Spirit took on even greater significance when we use the lens of the Christ-event as the new Passover. Recall from the Book of Exodus that the original Passover was the deliverance of the People of Israel from slavery in Egypt to freedom and the Promised Land-all under God's protective care. Reluctant to let God's Chosen People go, Pharaoh and the Egyptians were made to suffer a number of debilitating plagues to encourage them to reconsider. The last and greatest of these plagues to be visited upon the Egyptians, the angel of death literally "passed over" the doorstops of the Hebrews that were marked with the blood of a sacrificed lamb and instead took the lives of the firstborn sons of the Egyptians. Finally, Pharaoh then freed the Hebrew people and allowed them to exit from Egypt through the Red Sea. When Pharaoh later changed his mind and tried to pursue the Hebrews, he and his army met their own end at the bottom of the sea when the flood waters that had parted for the Hebrews came crashing down upon them. Thus did God deliver Israel from bondage to freedom. Christ went down into the waters of death and rose to new life in the joy of the Resurrection freeing us from our bondage to sin and death. Jesus Christ is the Lamb of God-whose blood was sacrificed so that we might pass-over from death to newness of life.

In this light, Jesus Christ is the new Passover—it is through His death on the Cross that we have been delivered from the slavery of sin to new freedom in the resurrected Christ.

Thus, 50 days or 7 weeks after Easter, we mark Pentecost. In the account from the Acts of the Apostles, St. Luke tells us of the experience of a great gathering from all over the world—and how each person heard what was being said in their own native tongue, even though they came from every corner of the known world. This is a foil to the passage from Genesis 11 that paints the picture of God confusing human speech when people had sought to build a tower to the heavens to make a name for themselves (it was all about them) and thus attempt to achieve some parity to God. The result was confusion and scattering.

So, in the Christian Church, Pentecost reminds us that a). it is all about God, b). it is God who scatters and gathers, c). it is God who causes growth and that d). real and lasting freedom comes from God's action in Christ, not by any effort of our own. Thus, we celebrate the unifying action of the Holy Spirit to bring us together despite our diversity, to enable us to act boldly to build up God's Kingdom (not limited or even primarily found in this earthly realm) and that to accomplish this, God will overcome every obstacle and roadblock. The confusion of tongues becomes a unity of voices from around the world. Tongues of fire come from above, signifying the divine action of God descending among us to build us up properly for His purposes. We are made into the likeness of the divine, not by our own efforts and actions, but by Christ's. What is harvested then, is not human grandeur, but God's glory. It is about recognizing and celebrating God's rightful role and salvific action within our lives and community. The confusion of Babel is replaced with the unity of one voice and purpose. The freedom from earthly servitude is superseded by the divine deliverance from the ultimate slavery to death and sin. Jesus Christ is the new Moses. We are the new harvest. the Church.

Through the action of the Holy Spirit in our midst, may we come together to praise God with one voice and truly become a worthy offering back to the Father for all that He has given us.
